London, Nov. 18.-The Bolsheviki claim the capture of ten generals and more than 100 other officers at Omsk, according to an official statement issued today by the Soviet Government at Moscow. Kolchak's army is being pursued in an easterly direction, the statement adds.

The text of the communication says: Ten of Kolchak's generals and over 100 other officers are among the prisoners at Omsk, where the defeated remnants of Kolchak's army are being driven eastward. Royal Visitor Is Given Enthusiastic Reception by Thousands.

OFFICIALLY WELCOMED

Mayor Hylan Extends City's Freedom To Heir To Britain's Throne.

New York, Nov. 18.—The name of Edward, Prince of Wales, was added today to the long roll of famous and illustrious men who have been honored by New York with the freedom of the nation's metropolis. The prince landed at the historic battery and drove to the city hall amid cheering throngs, who packed the sidewalks, and filled every window in the skyscrapers of Lower Broadway. At the city hall he was welcomed to the city by Mayor Hyland, who conferred the freedom of New York upon the royal visitor, and by Secretary of State Hugo, who presented him with a magnificent American silk flag.

"I am very proud to have been made a freeman of the city of New York, and I thank you most heartily for the high honor which you have conferred on me. "I have already the privilege of being a free man of the City of London; and it is a special pleasure to become a free man of the City of New York, because London and New York, both great business centres, are so closely connected with the business of the world. Upon the stability and prosperity of these two great cities depend to a great degree the wellfare of all countries. Were their inter-communication to cease for a single business day the affairs of the entire world would be upset.

Readiness of People To Buy Taxable Bonds Proved by 1919 Loan.

[Special to The Advertiser.] OTTAWA, Nov. 17.-The moral of the OTTAWA, Nov. 17.—The moral of the present Victory Loan, which has been heavily oversubscribed, would appear to be that because of a mistaken or a deliberate policy pursued in connection with past domestic loans, millions of dollars have been lost to the Dominion. 

Critical Session.

The coming session under all the circumstances promises to be a critical one for the Government. A franchise act will be brought down, but on the Government's own side there are wide differences of opinion on the question of perpetuating through it any of the controversal provisions of the former war-time elections act.

The Opposition, while comparatively weak in the House, has not the same difficulties to face as the Government. The farmers' movement (in federal politics at least) is not likely to spread in the province of Quebec, and unless there is a change before the next election it would not be surprising at all if Ernest Lapointe, as federal Liberal leader in that province, would bring back with him an almost solid block of from 60 to 65. In the Maritime Provinces also party lines have not been broken as they have west of the Ottawa, and a considerable Liberal representation may be expected from that region, as also from Ontario. More Cabinet Changes.

Further cabinet reconstruction may be expected, but not immediately. That Sir George Foster will shortly leave for England to become Canadian high commissioner is anticipated. That Lløyd Harris, chairman of the overseas trade commission, will succeed Sir George as minister of trade and commerce is rumored. Hon. Martin Burrell, secretary of state, will go to the Senate and H. H. Stevens, Centre Vancouver, will succeed him. There is talk of the formation of a ministry of mines, and Dr. Thompson of the Yukon are both mentioned in connection with it, but new ministers involve new by-elections, and by-elections at the present time are not a popular pastime with governments.

Now that the Victory Loan has been safely floated and doubly subscribed it is hinted that Sir Henry Drayton will at once embark on that unpopular form of statesmanship known as retrenchment. It is said that he will set his face resolutely against any further demands or raids upon the treasury, and that even in connection with works already projected he will adopt a policy of hastening slowly.

With approved expenditures totalling over \$800,000,000 for the current fiscal year, however, the task of Sir Henry would appear to be a somewhat discouraging one.



Field Marshal Ludendorff, in his story of he war, says Germany was beaten largely by the propaganda of the British Government, By weakening the morale of the German peopleconvincing them that they could not win-the propaganda sapped Prussian courage and confidence. Civilian and soldier alike became convinced that the Allies could not be defeated. and with that spirit ruling there could be but one ending to the struggle. Probably Ludendorff is exaggerating somewhat the effect of the propaganda. To put defeat down to mental and spiritual deterioration is less humiliating than to confess that they were outmanouvred and outfought, that Allied steadfastness, resourcefulness, daring and pluck were superior to the wonderful German military machine; but allowing for this, it is certain that the propaganda of the British performed a service of not much less importance than the blockade, or the hammer blows of Foch, Haig and Pershing, A great German newspaper commented

'At every step and turn we meet despondency, discontent, depression, hanging heads, grumbling. Whence came they? Who brought them to us? Today we know. Today we can recognize the origin of this depression of German will-power. was the long-advertised publicity offensive of the Entente, directed against us under England's lead, and under the special direction of that unprincipled, unscrupulous rascal, Lord Northeliffe."







COMPROMISE ON Is Sworn In in TREATY ISSUE IS ONLY HOPE NOW

Hitchcock Says It Will Not Be Ratified With Reservations.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 17 .- On the eve of a final vote on the peace treaty, President Wilson gave the Senate to understand today that unless

Tomorrow the Senate will remain in session until it has cleared away all proposed reservations, leaving nothing to do but act upon the reservation resolution itself. Four reservations two of them proposed by the foreign relations committee, were voted down today, and one was adopted.

Expects Compromise.

The president's determination was made known at the White House conference with Democratic Leader Hitchcock, who declared afterwards that Mr. Wilson never would have an opportunity to pocket the treaty, because his supporters in the Senate would vote down any ratification resolution that contained the unacceptable reservations. The Senate leader reiterated his belief that once such a resolution was defeated there would be a compromise that would keep the treaty alive.

Hope of such a development had a setback later in the day, however, when a number of the mild reservationists among the Republicans agreed to vote with Republican Leader Lodge against consideration of any alternative resolution of ratification after the first one had been rejected.





Conservative, Moderate and Nationalist Elements Secure 494 Seats.

Paris, Nov. 18.—Complete returns from the French elections show that the Conservative, Moderate and Nationalist elements hold 494 seats in the chamber of deputies, while the Extremists will have 54 members of the new chamber. Of this number, 221 were former deputies, while 327 are men who have not hitherto been members of the chamber.

Little success was achieved by the Flemish activists while the Nationalist party of regeneration, as well as the middle class party elected no representatives. This is considered significant, as the latter organization had the support of the accoholists league, or the anti-dry partisans. The Catholics still retain a majority of the seats in the senate.

SOCIALISTS LIKELY TO CONTINUE OPPOSITION TO NEW GOVERNMENT

Paris, Nov. 18.—While some Paris newspapers, in their comment on the result of the French elections, express satisfaction over the defeat of the Socialists, which they say demonstrates an overwhelming sentiment against Bolshevism, Socialist organs declare the members of that party will maintain their opposition to the Government and defy the majority in the chamber to carry out the policies enunciated during the campaign. Some attribute the defeat of the Socialist group to its own mistakes, and assert that the party will understand its error and turn back to the real doctrines of the organization.

VON HINDENBURG AND LUDENDORFF TO GO BEFORE

Military Authorities Ready To Cope With Expected Demonstrations.

BERNSTORFF TESTIFIES

Declares U. S. Could Easily Have Been Kept Out of the War.

Berlin, Nov. 17 .- Field Marshal von Hindenburg and General Ludendorff will attend tomorrow's meeting of the sub-committee of the national assembly investigating responsibility for the war. Military authorities have made comprehensive provisions to forestall any demonstrations, but the feeling in both the reactionary and the Liberal camps is tense.

Interrogation of Dr. Karl Helfferich, former German vice-chancellor, was completed by the sub-committee today During the final session Herr Wermuth suggested that the former vice-chancellor's protest against the fine of 300 marks assessed against him on Saturday for refusing the suggest of page 150 marks assessed against him on Saturday for refusing the suggest of the sug urday for refusing to answer a quibe read to the sub-committee. deliberating half an hour, Herr muth's suggestion was rejected, but the penalty was confirmed. Attempt to Fix Blame.

An attempt was made to fix the blame for the sending abroad of the text of former Emperor William's speech in Alsace on the eve of the speech in Alsace on the eve of the German peace proposals in December, 1918. This resulted in the discovery that the original order issued to the Wolff bureau was destroyed during the occupancy of that organization's office. by the Spartacans last winter. The sub-committee desired to run down the sub-committee desired to run down the responsibility for publishing the former emperor's declaration that Germany would be satisfied only with a "Victory peace." At the moment Dr. Theobald von Bethmann-Hollweg, the then imperial chancellor was planning a peace proposal, and a controversy ensued between Dr. Helfferich and Deputy Bonn, the latter charging the German Government with a failure to "cultivate" President Wilson, who, it was said, "was a different individual later, but at that time might have been won over to the attempted peace action."

Could Have Kept U. S. Out.

"Count von Bernstorff, former German ambassador at Washington, declared the United States would have re-

man ambassador at Washington, de-clared the United States would have re-mained out of the war if President Wilson's mediation had been accepted, whereupon von Bethmann-Hollweg ex-claimed: "Even the United States in the war did not make the Versailles peace necessary. I did not desire to participate in a battle for the soul of President Wilson, and in view of all elements entering into the situation. I could not conscientiously surrender elements entering into the situation. I could not conscientiously surrender Germany unconditionally to the president's promised peace undertaking late in 1916 and early in 1917.

Finally, in a broad, impassioned statement to the sub-committee, von Bethmann-Hollweg declared his procedure "after such an ending of the war" was an easy matter, but he asserted he had based his action on the world situation at that time after calefully weighing all considerations.






