



Labor and the Tariff.

The tariff committee of the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress has called. upon all labor organizations to resist an increase in the tariff. In the circular letter sent out by the committee the abstract merits of free trade or protection are not discussed. The ground is taken that the tariff is high enough, and several arguments are advanced why it should not be higher. With the statement that the country is prospering under present conditions no one can Oct. 2, 1905. disagree. The committee reasons that the selling price of a protected commodity will increase with an increase of the tariff, but that wages will not rise, and workingmen will not share in the greater profits, except by a struggle. The first part of this proposition will not be disputed. It is usually the case, too, that wages do not rise as & SONS, 593 Richmond St. 'Phone 997. rapidly as prices. A large increase of profits does not necessarily mean that though the manufacturers are in a position to pay higher wages. In some cases they do so voluntarily; in the majority of cases they do so under pressure, claiming that profits would otherwise go to the extension and development of their plant, thus affording more employment for labor. Assuming that both employer and workmen benefit by an increase of the tariff the committee asks whether this would not be making the public pay for the advantage of the few. Perhaps so, but it is doubtful whether many manufacturers would deny themselves more profits, or many laborers more wages out of sympathy for the public. In until it is far advanced. this connection the tariff committee of the Trades Congress rises to a height of altruism where few will follow. The committee might have argued, with more force, that an artificial increase in the price of commodities, whether by tariff or monopoly, decreased the purchasing power of the wages of labor.

In the past the manufacturers have succeeded in persuading the majority of the workmen that the interests of the two classes were mutual with respect to the tariff. At least there is no doubt that the majority of factory employes supported the National Policy. At present they see Canadian industry everywhere flourishing and cannot be so easily induced to believe that their bread and butter is denendent upon any further favors to manufacturers. The abounding prosperity during the past eight or nine years has relegated the tariff to the background, and it will not become burning issue again while good times' continue. It it likely that workingmen as a whole will view the next revision with comparative indifference, whether it is upwards or downwards.

Cape to Cairo.

The Cape to Cairo Railroad, according to the London Spectator, is 150 miles north of the Zambesi River, and moving northward at the rate of a mile a day. New Combination Chemical and Hose Wagon Added to the Equipment.

The new combination chemical and hose wagon, which is to be placed in the South London fire hall, was given a thorough test on the market square yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock. In the first place a large bonfire was started, and after it was burning fiercely the chemical apparatus of the new wagon was set to work. At the end of 37 seconds the blaze was extinguished. That, however, did not end the test by any means. With nearly 800 feet of hose and half a dozen firemen on the rig, the fire chief drove over some of the roughest roads in the city-not at an easy gait, but at the rate of speed that will be attained when an alarm is being responded to. 
