Now we are beginning to get a little darkness in the nights, commencing say about 10 o'clock and getting bright about 2 a. m., but the nights are stretching out at from 7 to 9 minutes

rain which is unusual but taking it all around the summer weather is felightful. Perhaps a little legal news will interest you. We have about 29 or 30 lawyers, among whom are four Q. C's. The great majority are young men. When a case is taken they get a cash retainer, like the American system, and it varies in size according to the amount involved. Judge Dugas was the only judge till the advent of Judge Craig, the former is now on the outside and will not return till the middle of September. Business accumulated till there were 125 to 140 cases undisposed

per night. We have had considerable

of and a large volume of criminal business. Although it is vacation trials have been proceeding and Judge Craig, bringing Ontario methods with him, will make a big hole in the docket before the middle of September, when vacation will be over. We hold Chambers on Monday and Friday and trials Tuesday, Wedner ay and Thursday. Gowns and white ties are worn and as much decorum as with you. No juries are ever asked in civil cases, all parties preferring the judge, and it is needless to say that most of the contested busi-

ness arises out of mining claims.

The juries consist of only six, our system being the same as in the N. W. Territories. One case of murder and one of attempt have been tried; in the former the man hangs on October the 2nd, and there are two murder cases pending. My duties keep me very busy. This year already 509 writs have been issued besides capias orders, garnishees, attachments and replevins. I have power to make capias; garnishee and replevin orders. I am also accountant special examiner, and Regcountant, special examiner, and Registrar of the Admiraity Court. I take all references as well. I have only one clerk but when Judge Dugas returns will have another, as the two judges will be sitting at the same time;

my hope is to but a clerk to sit in each my hope is to but a clerk to sit in each court while I attend to the office.

I get on nicely with the bar, as they appreciate the services of a professional man, my predecessor having been a layman. The sheriff's office and my own are in the court house; our quarters are not large enough but will have to answer this wincer. The adquarters are not large enough but with have to answer this wincer. The ad-vocates' tariff of fees is much higher than with you, being especially for the Yukon; it should be higher as every-thing else is in proportion. Witnesses thing else is in proportion. Witnesses are paid \$3 per day and jurors \$5; breathing is the only thing that does not cost money.

The jail and the penitentiary are in the hands of the Mounted Police; prisoners are constantly at work everywhere under an armed guard, long term prisoners wearing the ball and chain. The crier and court orderlies are all policemen; they also do all police duty in the city and territory and I need not say their work is well done. The officers are the J. P.'s and hear all preliminary trials and also dispose of preliminary trials and also dispose of all wages cases, no matter what the preliminary trials and also dispose of all wages cases, no matter what the amount may be. The local government is in the hands of the Yukon Council, all up to the present time nominated by the Governor-General-in-Council, but now two are to be elected by the people. In all legal matters here quick action is needed.



Manufacturers are Kicking on the Present Tariff.

Their Association Passes a Resolution Condemning the Government for Breaking its Promises.

Toronto, Aug. 31 .- At the annual meeting of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association yesterday, the report of the tariff committee was presented by George Hees. It states that when the new tariff was announced the association forwarded to the Government a resolution favoring a reason-able preference on goods imported ture came along and swiped the bunfrom Great Britain, so long as the minimum tariff was high enough to afford adequate protection to existing Canadian industries. It was urged that as the increase in the preference would affect some industries injuri-ously, the duty should be raised on products competing with them. Lat-er, recommendations urging certain tariff changes were made, and two delegations waited on the Government to urge their adoption. The report concludes thus: - "Your committee, however, regret to report that, although a promise was received from the members of the Government of careful attention to this matter, nothing has been done, although in many lines the redress asked for could have been got by lowering the duties without injuring any other Canadian in-dustry. The Government's policy evi-dently is that they will watch the ef-fect of the tariff for at least a year without making any change, unless it is found, as an actual fact, that some industries are being injured." Mr. Hees explained that the changes asked for affected the woollen indus-

K. McNaught added that the Gov-ernment had been informed that the manifacturers wanted adequate pro-tection against not only every coun-try, but even against the motherland. Samuel Coulson, of Montreal, ex-pressed himself as well satisfied with the tariff on iron, and said the Mon-treal manifacturers if they had griev-ances would have been at the convention in large numbers. His house had been in business for forty years, and never had the tariff worked so smoothly as at present After some further debate, the tariff resolution was adopted unanimous

THE BRANDYWINE'S STORY.

More than thirty years since, a

Tis those who in the ranks of life,

Near thy laughing water's roar. Here beside thee when I'm sleeping Tendrils green my harp shall twine Thou for me wilt then be weeping-

Thou alone, fair Brandywine!" But the story of the Brandywine is an inspiration to achievement rather than sentiment. Labor and patriotism are the warp and woof of its romance, and among the lesser streams mentioned in American history its place is

The Brandywine finds its way through the Christiana to the Delaware, and is navigable but one mile from its mouth. Close to its confluence with the Christiana, the Swedes landed in 1638 and founded a colony. Here they built a fort and subsequently a stone church, with tower, belfry and tile-paved chancel. Seventeen years later the fort was demolished by the Dutch, but the "Old Swedes" Church" with its ivied tower-the cher ished monument of a pious and indys trious people,-still survives and is nearing the close of its second century in a fair state of preservation. It stands near the Brandywine, within the limits of Wilmington, which, in the last century, was called Willing's Borough, but under Swedish and Dutch dominion was known as Christiana-

Here in the quaint old burial ground surrounding the church, the late Ambassador to England, Thomas F. Bayard, was recently laid to rest, side by side with his father, Senator Jas. A. Bayard, and his grandfather, Jas. A. Bayard. Sr., who was one of the Commissioners who formed the Treaty of

ham.

Ghent, at the close of the war of 1812. Above the Swedes' church, at the head of tide water, both banks of the Brandywine were sentineled by the Dutch with grimly-frowning gristmills. built of stone. The march of progress. ith its serried ranks of red brick dwellings, has spared but one of these outposts of the quaint old borough Rising sheer from the water's edge. with one shoulder thrust into a street and the other under the bough of a friendly forest tree, the old mill appears, in its massive masonry, its wide shipping-gates and its beetling crane that glasses itself in the foamy water. like a picture from Holland, etched into the mossy bank and totally foreign to its surroundings. It is still used for some purpose; and to the fanciful, a drowsy humming that proceeds from within might suggest the struggles of Rip Van Winkle to emerge from the torpor of his twenty years' sleep.

As early as the period of the Revolution, this particular mill had passed into the hands of a Quaker; and during that dark winter at Valley Forge. Washington himself visited the Quaker

"Friend Washington," said the miller. "I am a man of peace and cannot help thee fight. But," he added slowly, to save human beings from starvation is another matter. I will do what I Accordingly, the disciple of Penn sent food to the famishing sol-

diers. Westward from the old mill to the foot of King's Road is less than a mile. Here we come upon a dilapidated dam, whose wide rents are choked with the debris of freshets. With shattered breast and blackened logs, thrown awry, it looms through the mist like a spectral giant, half submerged and horribly distorted in an effort to catch the elusive stream, while the latter darts hither and thither, and tumbies down a hundred falls with rippling laughter at its merry escape.

On a grawy slope near the dam, a broken buhrstone marks the site of the "barley mill." once owned by a Scotch patriot, whose small, hip-roofed dwelling is yet standing, just beyond the mill-race. For a number of years this humble roof gave shelter to the Irish exile, Hamilton Rowan.

Rowan's romantic escape from an Irich prison to America, and the large reward offered by the British crown for his capture, caused the few who knew him to view with curious interest his tall form and melancholy features. But not until the year 1798, when the scourge of yellow fever swept over the neighboring borough, did the generous soul of this "exile of Erin" reveal itself to those who had befriended him in adversity. Day and night he ministered to the sick, comforted the dying and aided in the burial of the Strange to say, he walked through the pestilence unscathed, and live to receive from England a formal parodn which restored him to his fam-

Glancing back at the wooded heights above the rocky gorge, we see the plateau where Washington reviewed the echelons of Sullivan, and where he gravely lifted his hat at the cheers of Wayne's men, who clamored for battle as he rode down their lines. The impetuous Pulaski was there; and farther north was posted the division of General Green, from which was thrown young recluse known to his friends as out a strong detachment under comthe bard of Brandywine," charmed by mand of Maxwell to guard the passage at the ford.

Just here, where the shallow stream purls round its mossy rocks with a retrospective murmur, the brave Maxwell charged the Hessians again and again. while the roar of Kuyphausen's cannon shook the hills. After a partial success, the unsupported patriots were forced back by the flerce yagers. Then followed a mortal struggle, under a canopy of thick smoke, where the wounded fell with the slain and their er ing life-tide suffused the limpid wa-

Yonder, on a circular eminence stands Birmingham meeting-house which was used by the British as a hospital; and a little to the southwest a low shaft, recently erected by the school-children of the neighborhood, marks the spot where Lafayette fell, wounded, and where Washington said to the surgeon, in his impressive man-

"Take care of him as if he were my own son."

In the summer of 1825, near the close of Lafayette's last visit to this country, he reached Wilmington from Chester in an open barouche drawn by four white horses. Crossing the covered bridge which then spanned the Brandywine, the old hero was moved to tears by the appearance of a bevy of white-robed schoolgirls, who sang songs of welcome and strewed flowers in his way. He was royally entertained by the town authorities, and was the honored guest at a brilliant wedding in the evening.

The next day he rode out to the battlefield, where, in the shade of a grove, a rustic banquet was spread. On that occasion he delivered a toast, the words of which are now inscribed upon the shaft above mentioned. Lafayette said:

"The honor to have mingled my blood with that of many other American soldiers, on the heights of the Brandywine, has been to me a source of pride and delight. May the blood spilled by thousands, with equal merit in the cause of independence and freeom, be to ensuing generations an eternal pledge of unalloyed republicanism, federal union, public prosperity and domestic happiness."

On his return from Chadd's Ford, Lafayette spent several days at the residence of his friend and compatriot. Eleuthere Du Pont, and while there. at the request of a daughter of his entertainer, he wrote in an album the following lines:

After having seen, near half a cen tury ago, the bank of the Brandywine a scene of bloody fighting, I am pleased now to find them the seat of industry, beauty and mutual friendship. LAFAYETTE.

July 26th, 1825. Soon after the above lines were written, the nation's guests proceeded. to Washington; and it will be remembered that in the ensuing autumn, he embarked for France on board a sailing vessel that floated "the stars and stripes" and bore the name Brandywine .- John Wickliffe Jackson.

A Luminous Sea Crab

One of the marine curiosities re cently fished from the bottom of the Indian ocean by a dredging vessel in the employ of the Calcutta Society of Natural History was a mammoth sea crab which continually emitted a bright white light, similar to that seen in the spasmodic flashes of phosphorescent luminosity kindled by our common glow worms. The oddity was captured in the day time and placed in a large tank, nothing peculiar except its immense size being noticeable in the broad glare of the tropical sun. At night, however, when all was pitchy darkness, the crab surprised the naturalists by lighting up the tank so that all the other sea creatures great and small, could be plainly seen.

There's Nothing New.



AN OPEN QUESTION.

uch Study Demanded at Rome Fren Growing Boys and Girls.

It is an open question with many thoughtful people whether there is not a screw loose in the system which demands and exacts so much study at home from growing boys and girls. At precisely the period when the physical life is most imperious in its claims, when the lad is shooting up like a weed, when the girl is all legs and arms, and both are in the greatest need of play, of rest, of sleep, of exercise, they must spend five or six hours of daylight in school, brain and nerves under high pressure, stimulated to intellectual activity at every point. It is little wonder if they are correspondingly listless and languid when the hours of recitation are over. and not altogether ready to give any portion of the afternoon to the prepar-

ation of the next day's studies. I fear the expectant attitude of American parents in general reinforces that school boards and trustees, since few fathers and mothers have patience with a dull child, or sufficient common sense not to be cruelly mortified if their sons and daughters do not make

rapid progress.

The doctor interferes now and then, lays an arresting hand on the home work, cuts short the hours of school attendance, or advises a cessation of school for a while, but the doctor is obeyed under protest. Most of us would be deeply humiliated if our children were not regularly promoted every half year, or if our neighbor's

children took prizes, and not ours. In the mean time, if we sit down to render what assistance in the evening's labor may be within our power, we find our cheeks mantling with the blush of shame. We still can spell, but it is extremely doubtful whether we can pronounce, both Latin and English having suffered a change since our day. Our attention is bestowed elsewhere-on bread-winning, if we are fathers; on sewing, mending, visiting and housekeeping, if we are mothers. Yet we expiate many a sin, since here is an obligation which we can-

not shirk. The probable reason for the situa tion is that we attempt too much in primary, grammar and preparatory In the first fourteen years of lile the effort should be to keain a child so that he or she may know how to pay close attention, how to learn. A very few subjects thoroughly mastered are of more value than many merely glanced at and superficially discerned.-Harper's Bazar.

Relie of the Revolution.

In the possession of Mrs. Sarah Striker, of Tribes Hill, there is a massive copper kettle, which dates back to the Revolution. It belonged to Adam Fonda, whose father was killed and his house burned during Sir John Johnson's raid. Adam Fonda's house, too, was burned, and probably one of the Tories engaged in the raid was moved to covetousness by the great copper kettle, and thriftily filling it with fresh butter, hid it under the Cayadutta bridge. He never came back after it, and it was found years later by children at play. The kettle was the only article saved from the wreck.

The above, which is taken from an Amsterdam paper, requires some ex-planation, says a correspondent of the Mohawk Valley Democrat. The Adam ferred to was lieutenant colo nel of the Tryon county regiment which won the bloody battle of Oriskany. His only surviving granddaughter is Mrs. Sarah Striker, of Tribes Hill, who values the tea kettle not only as an heirloom, but also from its historic associations. Mrs. Striker well remembers the description of the raid given by her grandfather. The enemy took Lieutenant-Colonel Fonda prisoner and then proceeded to burn his house, and the family fled to the woods. Eventually it made its way to Schenectady, where it remained until the close of the war. The tea kettle was recovered in the above-mentioned manner. Lieutenant-Colonel Fonda was taken to Canada and suffered a painful captivity, till peace was restored, when he returned and built a house for his family and that house is still in use, though' much altered. In the same raid, the Visscher house was burned, and Colonel Visscher, alsohero of Oriskany, was tomahawked and left for dead. He survived, however, and after the war rebuilt house which is occupied by Alfred De-Graff, his lineal descendant. The above-mentioned tea kettle is one of the oldest in existence. It was probably made in Holland at least 150 years ago, and is one of the most interesting relics of the days that tried men's souls.

From time immemorial it has been crushed and squeezed into an unyielding case of hard leather, rarely as large as the foot itself when in a natural position, and occursequence come all the diseases and deformities to which the foot is heir, such as corps callonges. such as corns, callouses, enlarged joints, bunions, ingrowing toe nails and the breaking down of the arch of

the foot.

A healthful condition of the feet is an essential to perfect general health. A connection exists by means of the nerves between the feet and all other parts of the body, including the brain itself. Dr. Brown-Sequard, in fact, tells of a patient who, whenever he bore the weight of his body on the right toe, became violently insane. Almost everybody can testify to the miserable sick-all-over feeling which accompanies the effort to walk in a " ut boot. A celebrated oculist not long since discovered that an abstinate case of sore eyes was caused by wear-ing tight shoes. When the feet were properly cared for the eye trouble entirely disappeared.

Each foot contains twenty-six bones. In health it is a marvelously hardy member. Such violent exercises as leaping, running, etc., cause it no discomfort. To prevent the grating or jarring of bone with bone each one is covered with an elastic cartilage.

Many people have to give up taking peneficial active exercise owing to the condition of their feet. It is an every lay occurrence to hear a woman say 'I have to give up walking, my feet hurt so." A person who never exercises cannot long remain well and healthy. Indigestion, bilious liver and pulmonary complaints set It, old age and decreptitude are hurried on apace. The beginning c'all health and unhappiness can often be traced to wearing uncomfortable shoes.

The human foot should be just as sightly and free form deformity as is the hand. How rarely this is so is exemplified by the exclamation of a celebrated humorist when watching men bathing one day at the sea-shore. "The ugliest thing in art.or nature is the human foot," he said.

It was said some years ago that managers had great trouble trying to find actresses to take the part of Trilby, so ugly and deformed were their feet. Mothers often allow little ones' feet

to be cramped and squeezed into tiny shoes, not remembering that the little bones are soft and easily deformed. Happily, nowadays both bootmaker and customer seem to be growing more sensible, and the well made, well cut, broad soled shoe is gradually pushing out of the market the monstrous toothpick, high heeled article. Consequently, women are taking far more exercise especially walking more, than former-

ly, with accruing benefit to their general health, happiness and well-being Following are some excellent rules for the proper care of the feet: The feet should be thoroughly washed every morning and evening, and wiped carefully dry, especially between

the toes, that hotbed of soft corns. The toenails should be cut regularly, but not too often, and never shorter than ends of the tues.

When buying shoes all freedom for the toes, have the breadth of the foot measured while you stand on it, and allow fully half an inch to an inch more than the length of your

Have no tightness anywhere. What slight pressure there is should be be-neath the instep and on its sides, which parts are sometimes spoken of as the

'waist" of the foot. Have the sole thinnest and na rowest at the "waist" and broadest at the

Don' be ashamed of the size of your foot. A well formed large foot is much better to look at than a small distorted one, and remember that well proportioned parts always look smaller than

they really are. It is only a mistaken standard of as disproportionately small. The best antique standards of beauty show the perfect foot to be about one-sixth of the whole height.

To obtain health and comfort for the oot it is by no means necessary to wear ugly boots or shoes. The bootmakers are now making footgear that combines admirably both beauty and comfort, while people are gradually beginning to understand that the foot itself is more worth caring for than is its covering.

High heels, placed far under the instep, are now rarely seen in the street, though still worn in the house. They are extremely injurious, as they throw the body forward in an unnatural position , which affects the spine, the knees and the nervous system.

Chiropodists all say that if men and women gave up wearing ill fitting boots and shoes the next generation would know noticed of deformed and diseased feet.

The Virtues of Rhubarb,

Ar. Hutchinson, European Buyer For Northway & Co.,

Returns From England and Germany - Pleasant Chat About His Experience.

Henry Hutchinson, European buyer fo Northway & Co., returned on Tuesday from a purchasing trip to England and Germany He had a very pleasant trip, the water of the ocean being smooth both going and returning. England had the same experience with heat during August that Canada had. The thermometer stood at from 85 to 92 in the shade for two or three week in London. The old city was crowded with visitors and partly through this and partly by reason of the heat unfitting the horses for work, it was very difficult to get around the city.
About 25 per cent. of the cab and bus horses were off duty.
One product of the hot weather was sunbonnets for the horses. Great novelties in

the way of sun protection for the equines were used and some of the horse millinery looked exceedingly cute. Many of the bonnets were built high so that a wet sponge could be placed just over the horse's head.

A new underground electric railway had heen constructed and was just put in opera-tion this summer. Owing to the horses be-ing laid out by the heat, the road proved very effective and relieved traffic to a great extent. The road is 60 or 70 feet underground and is reached by means of immense
elevators. The temperature is exceedingly
cool and on descending from above ground,
one seems to have made a transition from
summer to winter. The cars are beautifully summer to winter. The cars are beautifully lighted and you can see to read your paper as comfortably as in your own sitting room. The trains go up one tunnel and down another and the block system is used so that it is practically impossible for an accident to occur. The road makes a wonderful difference to the traffic in the west end of difference to the traffic in the west end of London and especially on Oxford street. It is proving very convenient for people living in the suburbs. It formerly required an hour and twenty minutes for them to reach it in twenty minutes.

The manufacturers were exceedingly busy but there was a general complaint of duli ness from the retail merchants and the wholesalers. The stagnation seemed to be due to the war, the Paris exposition and the vacation season. The English, however, are not at all enthusiastic over the Paris exposition and one scarcely hears it mentioned even by those who have visited it.

this trip. He, however, always visits the gay city when he goes over in the winter to purchase spring goods.

Russia and the United States Anxious to Quit China.

Proposals That Will Look Like Weakness in the Eyes of the Celestials

London, Friday, Aug. 31, 3.20 a. m.-The Russo-American "surprise," as it called, is the chief feature of the morning papers. While Russia's part in the proposal is regarded with considerable suspicion, it is generally recognized that the flight of the Empress Dowager and the Emperor renders the situation extremely difficult and, therefore, that it might be wis to adopt the Russo-American pro-gram as the best solution of the prob-lem. At the same time a very strong feeling is displayed in favor of a more vigorous line of policy.

The following is the telegram sent to the representatives of the United

to the representatives of the United States in Berlin, Vienna, Paris, Lon-States in Berlin, Venna, Paris, London, Rome, Tokio and St. Petersburg:
"Department of State, Washington, laug. 24, 1900.—The following note was received by us from the Charge of the Russian government at this capital, Aug. 17:—
"I have just received a communication from the imperial government informing me of the resolution of the admirals of the altied fleets interdicting the plenipotentiary of the Chinese

ing the plenipotentiary of the Chinese government, Li Hung Chang, from all communication with the Chinese admitting his (Li Hung Chang's) ser vices in the eventful negotiations for peace, and especially because it: be impossible for him to fulfil his mis-Mr. Hutchinson looks well and seems to have been much benefitted in health by his trip. The Daily Graphic says:—"The United States are almost morbidly anxious to wash their hands of the Chinese embarrassment. This has long been apparent. But it is rather surprising to hear that their anxity is shared Russia. With the possible excepby Russia. With the possible excep-tion of Germany, then is probably not another power that would seri-ously object to the evacuation of Pekin." The Daily Mail observes:— "Probably Russa,, with the assistance of the United States and France, hopes to dictate to other powers a far east-ern policy, ensuring the accomplish-ment of Russian designs, which would be greatly facilitated by the accept-ance of Li Hung Chang as plenipotentiary. The powers should refuse to accept any intermediary or to evacuate Pakin, which would be inerpreted as a sign of weakness." Daily Express and the Daily Chronicle totest against placing any reliance on the professions of Li Hung Chang or of the change of the Hung Changer of the change of the Standard tyst—"It is not easy to overrun the morreance of the decision of the United States. This desire of both Washington and St. Petersburg to withdraw from Pekin is very intelligible. Public enjoiner in America is gible. Public opinion in America is adverse to foreign complications, while Russia has discovered that conditions are not propitious for her schemes of

conquest. She lacks the necessary army, and wants the trans-Siberian railway completed before she can stretch her arms over Northern Asia. The powers must, however, retain their hold on the capital. Withdrawal although consistent with the dignity of the Washington government, would be quite impracticable for the others. It would be counted as a triumph by the anti-foreign party in China,
