BOERS GO NORTH.

Though President Kruger Still Sticks to the Railway.

Boths Claims to Have 15,000 Men of Whom 3,000 Will Fight to the Death.

Lorenzo Marquez, Aug. 31.—The British prisoners at Nooit Gedacht have been released by the Boers, and are marching to join Lord Roberts' forces at Watervalboven, near Machadodorp.

President Kruger and his chief officials are at Nel-pruit.

The attempted British enveloping movement at Machadodorp is apparently not successful. Gen. Botha has gone north by the Lydenburg road open. Gen. French is nearest to him, with better mounts than he had hitherto in the campaign, and there may be an exciting pursuit. The country is difficult, and fever is following the rain. Gen. Botha claims to have 15,000 men, of whom 5,000 will fight to the death. President Kruger is reported to be at Watervalboven sticking to the railway.

The force of Gen. Baden-Powell and Hickman's Mounted Infantry are holding Warm Bachs, 90 miles north of Pretoria. Gen. Ian Hamilton and Col. Mahon have arrived here with their troops. Col. Mahon had only two days' rest last month. He made many long marches, and took 12 prisoners a day on an average.

KNOCKED HIM OUT

Took Corbett but Five Rounds to Finish McCoy.

A Battle in Which Much Science was Displayed but Slugging Decided the Result

New York Aug. 31.—The long-promised and long-looked-for meeting between James J. Corbett and Charles "Kid" McCoy took place under the auspices of the Twentieth Century Club at Madison Square Garden, and in less than five rounds Corbett proved himself to be the better man. Keen judges of the game who saw last night's fight declare that it was the clearest exhibition ever witnessed in the ring. Up to the moment that the men stepped into the squared circle opinions as to their respective ability were widely divergent. Many claimed, and rightly, too, that Corbett would prove to be the stronger, as well as the cleverer, and it was through his superb feinting and heavy slugging that he put McCoy down and out.

McCoy's friends all along have claimed that he was equally a destroyer with his hands, eyes and feet as the former champion, and in addition to this they said that the "Kid" could hit harder than Corbett. Last night, however, while McCoy landed some stinging jabs, he did not cut Corbett's skin, nor did he land a single heavy right-hand blow during the contest. On the other hand, Corbett, when he dropped science and began to slug, landed hard rights and lefts, which simply took McCoy's guard away and when Corbett found a vulnerable spot on the region of McCoy's heart, two lefts, divided by a right, ended the battle.

In the opening round, McCoy showed up to much better advantage than did Corbett. McCoy seemed very confident, though careful, while Corbett was nervous and ill at ease. McCoy started out with his usual confidence, but Corbett landed some of the cleverest and sparring on McCoy's part, while Corbett's work left very little to be desired. In the second round Corbett came up in his true form, and his uneasy feeling had evidently left him, and he gave an exhibition which could only be given by a man thoroughly posted in the innermost points of the scientific art of boxing. While not a blow was landed by either in the first round, the great part of the second was equally as unfruitful of damage to either boxer. Corbett frequently endeavored with rights and lefts to reach the "Kid," but the Hoosier fighter was too nimble

THE DREADED PLAGUE

The Disease is Still Spreading in Glasgow.

Glasgow, Aug. 31.—Eleven persons are now suffering from bubonic plague, and five others have some symptoms of the plague. The post mortem examination of the body of the person who died from the plague August 27 establishes it to be bubonic plague. This has been officially announced by Dr. Chambers, the chief medical officer, and is supported by Professor Muir and Dr. Brownlie. The foreign consuls are in communication with the medical authorities, and all Glasgow ships may be quarantined.

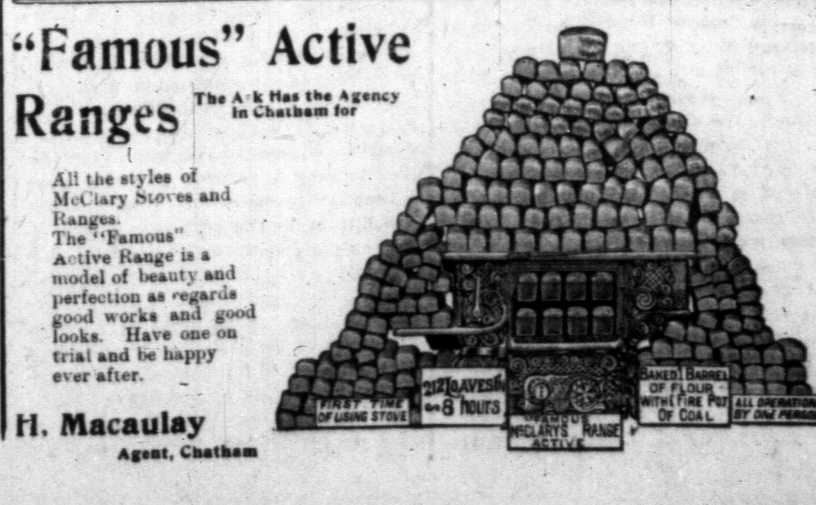

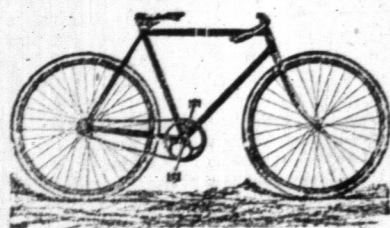
