The New School-house.

To the Editor of the ACADIAN.

DEAR SIR,—Having had the pleasure of attending a meeting of ratepayers, called for the purpose of taking into consideration the question of providing your new school with a system of ventilation, which was I think very wisely suggested for a week to give the citizens an opportunity of looking into this important question, I venture through your columns to address a few lines on this important subject to the citizens of this interesting and thriving town. At the outset I would say that I believe the people of Wolfville, realizing as they must that their town is looked upon as a centre of education, have decided to build a school building which will be in keeping with that position and which will be a credit to the town and to some extent a model to the surrounding towns and country; and I feel sure that if the citizens realize the amount of attention that is being paid at the present time to the subject of ventilation and the sanitary equipment of schools they will see that it would be a fatal mistake to erect such a building without providing it with an efficient system of heating, ventilation and sanitary appliances, such as is being placed in all the modern school buildings in the United States and in the more progressive parts of Canada. But this subject is of more vital importance to the inhabitants of this town than even the fact of having a fine building well furnished and equipped. Practice and experience during the last twenty-five years have proved that the health and vigor of teachers and children depends more on having schools properly ventilated than upon anything else, and when you consider that children between the ages of five and fifteen spend on an average one fifth of their time in the school-room breathing the air given off by about fifty pairs of lungs and the exhalations from fifty active but not always healthy little bodies, any reasonable man will admit that the subject assumes some importance. Eminent medical and other authorities tell us that "the depressed state of the organism under the prevailing condition of a badly ventilated school room not only predisposes to epidemic diseases but the liability and danger from all diseases are intensified; and doubtless much that is attributed to the season of the year supposed to be predisposed to scarlet fever, measles, whooping cough, diphtheria and some other common affections of children is due to the same cause." Dr James Johnson, in his work called "A Diary of a Philosopher," says, "The deaths resulting from fevers are but a drop in the ocean when compared with the number who perish from bad air." Prof. S. H. Woodbridge, of the Mass. Institute of Technology, in his notes on "Ventilating and Heating," makes clear the effects of the introduction of a system of efficient ventilation, when he tells us that by this means "Death rates have been reduced in children's hospitals from fifty to five per cent., in surgical wards of general hospitals from forty-five to thirteen per cent., in army hospitals from twenty-three to six per cent., and in prisons, from eighty to eight per cent." Reliable teachers who have had an extended experience of teaching in badly ventilated as well as well ventilated schools have told the writer that they can accomplish more work with less fatigue and get more work out of the children in a well ventilated room than a poorly ventilated one. Now a word as to what good ventilation is. It is clear that fifty persons in a perfectly tight room for five hours would vitiate the air as much as one person would if shut up in the same room for 250 hours or 10 and 5-12 days, and it is quite evident that in either case if the room were perfectly tight the occupants would be dead before the time had expired. Fortunately we have no buildings which are perfectly tight; there are spaces around doors and windows and even the walls are porous, which with the opening and shutting of doors and windows gives sufficient circulation of air to prevent any immediately fatal results. But we have sufficient evidence, in the frequency of headaches, want of appetite and loss of energy among both teachers and school children, that this imperfect ventilation or slight dilution of the air is insufficient to give even a moderately healthy atmosphere. It has been determined by careful experiments and experience that it is necessary to have the air of a room within 6-10,000 of the purity of the outside atmosphere, and to maintain this standard of purity it is necessary to supply 30 cubic feet of fresh air per minute to every occupant of the room, i. e., to a school room occupied by 50 scholars it is necessary to furnish a supply of 1500 cubic feet of air per minute, which is equivalent to filling the school room with fresh air every 7 or 8

minutes. In the United States it has become customary to provide every new school building with an apparatus which will accomplish this work, and the state of Massachusetts attaches so much importance to the subject that this matter of ventilation has been placed directly under government inspection and the quantity, quality and temperature of the air supply fixed by law. The effect of this is that manufacturing concerns have designed and introduced heating apparatus especially intended for schools, which they are able to guarantee to do this work satisfactorily at the minimum expense for apparatus, fuel and attendance, and giving the maximum of comfort, regularity and satisfaction to the teachers, children and those most interested in them—their parents. It is such a system of heating and ventilation that has been adopted for the new school buildings at Amherst and Yarmouth and that your school trustees propose to give you here.

Your School Board have already ascertained that this apparatus can be placed in the building at a moderate cost in excess of the amount necessary to heat the building by old fashioned methods which do not give any ventilation. And reliable firms offer to furnish full guarantees and take all the responsibility of doing the work so that it will give the results claimed. Outside of any selfish interest I may have in the matter I feel deeply interested that Wolfville, of all places in Nova Scotia, should not make the mistake of building a good school and leaving out this prime requisite—good ventilation and sanitary apparatus.
