THE MIDDLE SCHOOL

University School

VICTORIA, B. C.

THIS SCHOOL has been founded by the amalgamation of the Queen's School, which was established in Vancouver in 1898, with the University School, which originated under the Rev. W. W. Bolton in Victoria in the same year.

The intention of the founders is to establish in this Province a school which shall maintain the best traditions of the English Public Schools, at the same time keeping in view the special needs of Colonial life.

School Buildings

A handsome and commodious brick building, with every modern appliance, and playing-fields fifteen acres in extent, is about to be erected in a thoroughly healthy position, about two miles and a half from the city.

This building will be ready for occupation in January, 1909.

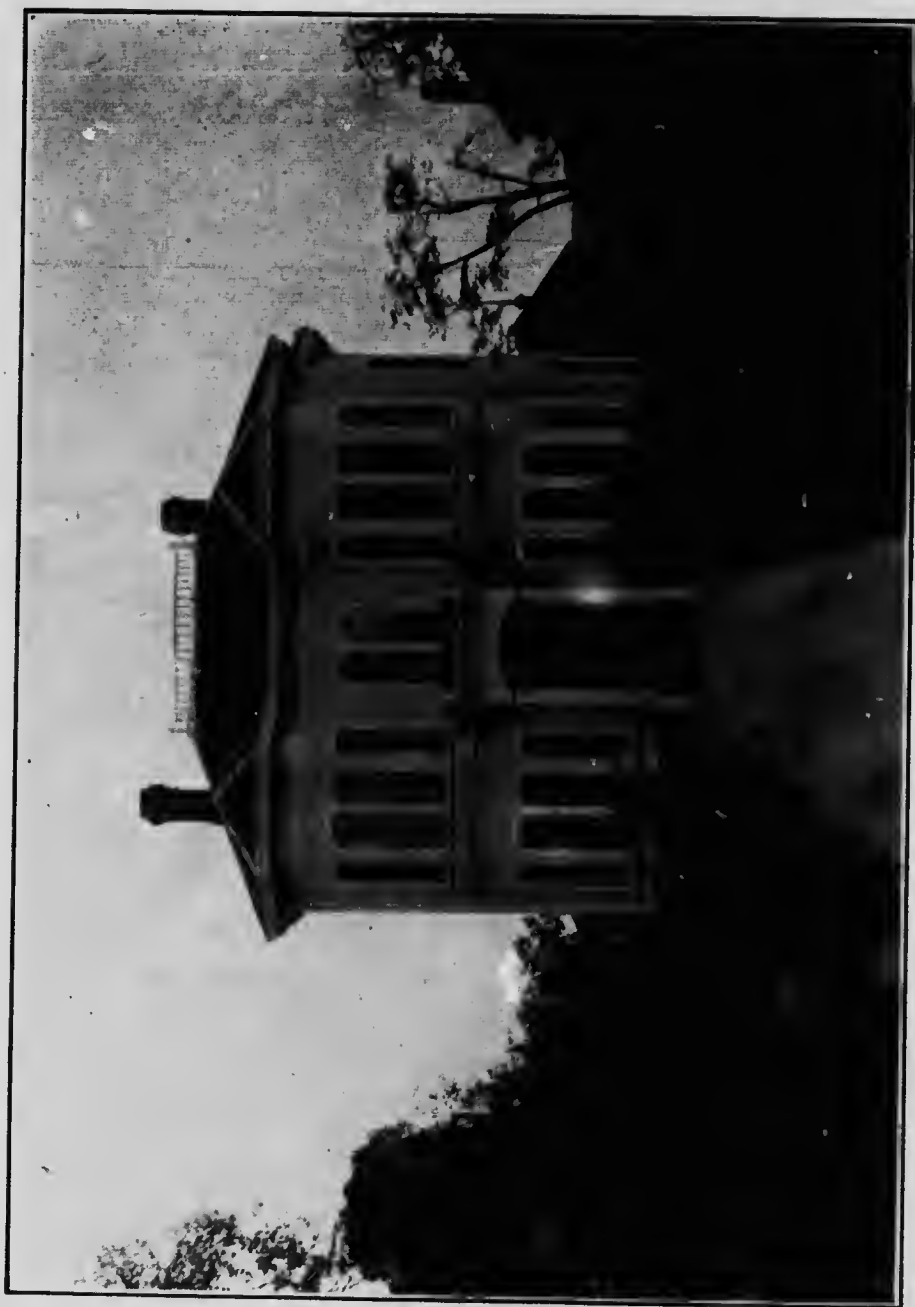
The School is at present conducted in three separate houses, each with its qualified matron and staff of masters.

The Upper School, on Oak Bay Avenue, for boys over fifteen years of age.

The Middle School, on Rockland Avenue, for boys between twelve and fifteen years of age.

The Lower School, at 1157 Belcher Street, for boys under twelve years of age.

There is a fourth house on Belcher Street, equipped to give isolation in cases of infectious illness, and reserved for this purpose.

The Curriculum

The School curriculum is so arranged as to enable a pupil to pass the University matriculation examinations, or the entrance examinations of Medical, Military and other special colleges, or to enter business life.

All boys throughout the School are expected to take the regular curriculum, without exception of any kind, but special arrangements for commercial instruction can be made for elder boys wishing to enter a business vocation.

Music and Manual Training can be arranged for if desired.

Religious Instruction

Religious instruction, consisting of outlines of Old and New Testament History, is throughout the School in the hands of the Warden.

Unless otherwise desired, all boarders attend morning service (Anglican) every Sunday.

School Regulations

Leave.—Leave to go down town is granted only on Saturday mornings, subject to good conduct during the week. Boys may obtain leave to go for country walks on Saturday and Sunday afternoons from 2 to 5 p.m.

Boys will be allowed to accept written invitations from relatives or friends, approved by their parents, for Saturday or Sunday afternoons only.

Parents are earnestly requested not to ask leave for their boys which interferes with School work or discipline.

Pocket-money, journey-money and eatables must in all cases be sent in care of the Master in charge of the House. Maximum, 50c. Upper; 25c. Middle and Lower, per week.

School Cap.—All boys are required to wear at all times either the School cap or a straw hat with School ribbon. No exception will be made to this rule.

Absence.—In all cases of absence from School, a note of explanation should be sent at once to the Master in charge of the House. Parents are particularly requested not to keep boys away from School, save under circumstances of unusual urgency. All boys are expected to be present on the first day of term.

Infection.—A boy who has recently suffered from or come in contact with any infectious disease must not return to School without a proper medical certificate.

Athletics

The founders of the School wish to emphasize the value of physical culture and games properly directed, not only as conducive to bodily vigour, but also as contributing in no small degree to the development of habits of self-restraint and self-reliance.

Furthermore, the founders firmly believe in the truth of the School motto: "*Mens sana in corpore sano.*"

Games and Sports.—Rugby Football and Cricket are the principal games. Cross-country Running, Swimming and Boating are sanctioned and encouraged, and Athletic Sports are held in the Spring.

Cadet Corps.—The Cadet Rifle Corps, No. 170, was organized in September, 1907, and last term mustered forty-nine of all ranks. The Militia Department of Canada furnishes rifles, belts and bayonets, besides ammunition for practice at the miniature range in the Drill Hall, and ball cartridge for range-practice for the older cadets. Prizes for shooting are awarded each year. All boys of suitable age and physique are required to join the corps and supply their own uniform, a neat and serviceable khaki suit, costing about seven-and-a-half dollars. The establishment last term was as follows:

A fully qualified Drill-Sergeant is attached to the School, and the Corps is drilled twice a week.

Extra Classes.—Classes for Boxing, Fencing and Dancing can be arranged for during the Christmas and Easter Terms.

The School Year

The School Year is divided into three Terms:

The Christmas Term begins about the first Tuesday in September.

The Easter Term begins about January 11th.

The Summer Term begins on second Tuesday after Easter.

Holidays—At Christmas, three weeks; at Easter, ten days; at Midsummer, two months.

These fees, which are subject to a reduction in the case of the sons of clergymen of $12\frac{1}{2}$ per cent., include, for Upper, Middle and Lower Schools, Tuition and Drill, and in the case of boarders, board, laundry and ordinary attendance by the School Physician.

Books, stationery and small sundries are supplied at cost price.

A special charge of one dollar per term is made to every boy for the Sports Fund.

A small charge is made to science students to cover cost of laboratory materials.

Dinners can be provided for day-boys at the School at twenty-five cents per meal.

It will be noticed that the School has avoided extra charges as far as possible.

NOTE—All fees are payable strictly in advance at the beginning of each term. Cheques to be made payable to the Bursar, University School.



THE CRICKET AND FOOTBALL GROUNDS

Entrance and Withdrawal

Applications for entrance must be made on forms, which will be supplied by the Bursar of the School.

Boys over fifteen years of age at the date of application will not be admitted without satisfactory certificates of good conduct and moral character from their last school, and they must be up to the standard of the Fourth Form work.

Half a term's notice of the withdrawal of a pupil must be given in writing to the Warden, otherwise a half term's fees must be paid.

No reduction is made for withdrawal or absence of a pupil for a less period than three weeks. If the absence be caused by illness, personal or general, lasting over three weeks, half the usual fees for such period will be remitted, on production of a proper medical certificate.

Boys remaining at the School during the Christmas or Easter holidays are charged at the rate of \$30.00 per month.

The Lending Library, containing a copious and well-chosen selection of works of fiction, travels and popular science, is free to all boys.

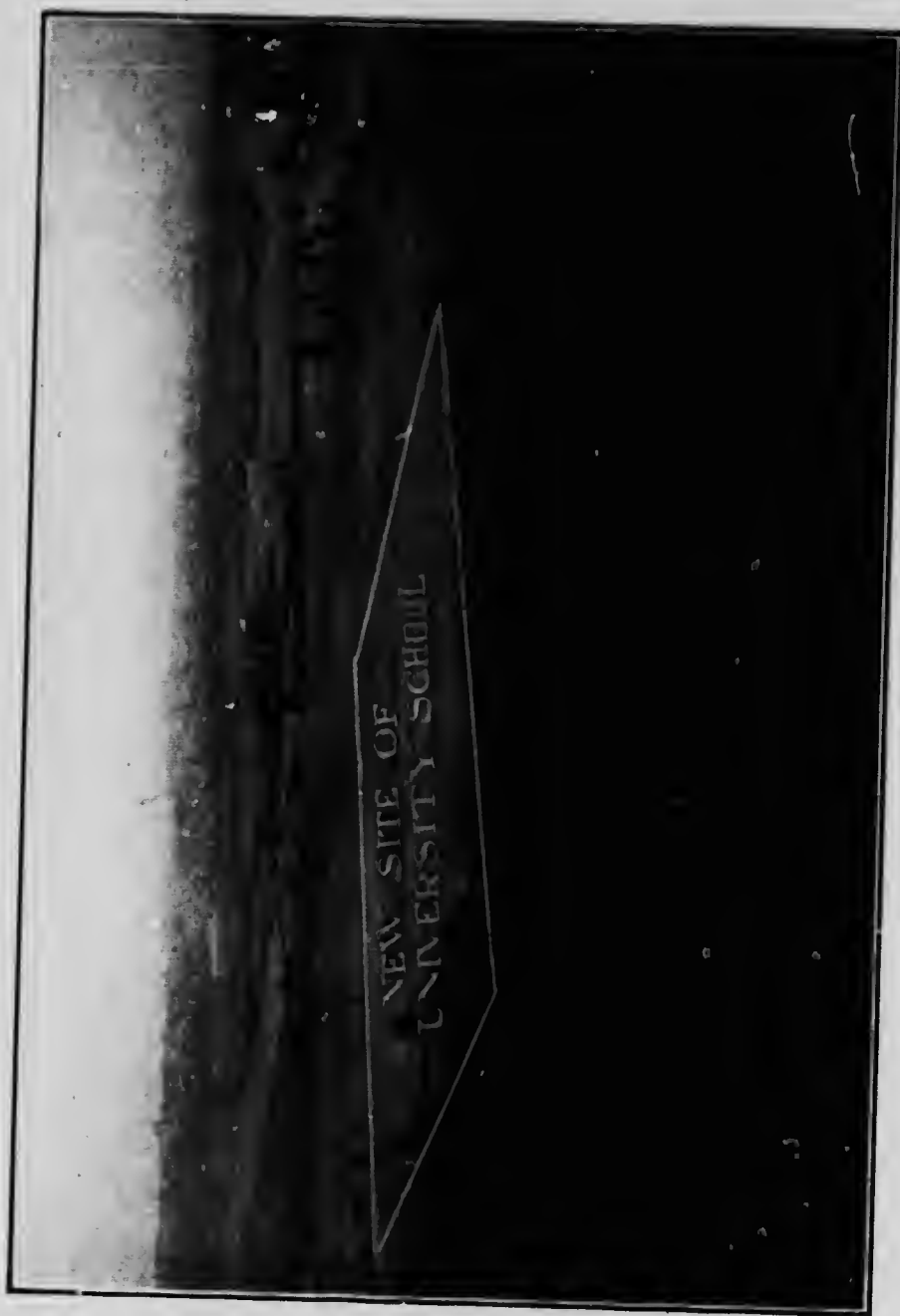
