Potatoc Tops used as Fodder.... An excellent foddor for horned cattle may be collected from Potatoe Tops.Reap off aboul two-thirds of the length of the potatoe tops, and dry them on mowing land in the usual way of haymaking. Several tons may be collected from an aere, and no damage to the potatoes, if taken as soon as they are ripe, and before the leaf begins much to fall.

To remove Warts or Corns.-Light a mateh well dipped in brimstone, and apply it to the corn or wart, so as to let some of the burning sulphur drop upon it; which will create some trifling pain, but will cause the wart or corn in a short time wholly to disappear.

Cure for a Whooping Cough=Diffolve a feruple of Salt of Tartar, in a gill of water ; add ien grains of cochineal, finely powaered; fweeten this with fine fugar ; give to an infant the foarth part of a table fposoful, four times a day ; to a child of two or three years of age, half a fpoonful; and from four years and upwards, a fpoonful mav be taken,

Receipe for ibe Astbma-Take of milk or guin ammenack, fix ounces ; fyrup of fquills, four ounces; m x together-a rpoonful to be taken four or five times every day, particalarly every morning.

THe following secelpt inas beenufed many yeaza with luccefs by an experienced farmer in Somerfe: (laire-To every acre of orchard, take a load of muck-ftraw, or oats raked from the grafofields: lay it is fix or eight beaps, into which dev'de a pound of fulphur ; choofe a clear day to burn it, with a brifk air, and it will not only deftroy the infea io the bad, but kill all worms and other infects that breed onder the trees and bark.
