**SIGNALS MADE AT FORT GEORGE, WHEN VESSELS, ARE
COMING INTO HALIFAX HARBOUR.**

One ball close,	For one square rigged vessel
One ball half hoisted,	For two do.
Two balls close,	For three do.
Two balls separated,	For four do.
A pendant of any colour,	For five do.
A pendant under one ball,	For six do.
A pendant over a ball half hoisted,	For seven do.
A pendant under two balls close,	For eight do.
A pendant between two balls separated,	For nine do.
A Flag of any colour,	For ten or more do.

The above are hoisted at the east or west yard-arm, according to the quarter the vessel first appears in, with the addition of a ball in the centre of the yard, until the vessels can be seen, when one or more of the following descriptive colours will be hoisted at the mast-head:—

- A Union for a flag-ship, with or without a squadron.
- Do. with a red pendant over it, for a two decker.
- Do. with a blue pendant over it, for a Frigate.
- Do. with a white pendant over it, for a small armed vessel
- A red flag, pierced white, for a Packet.
- A blue pendant for a merchant ship.
- A red pendant for a merchant brig.
- A white pendant for a topsail sloop or schooner.
- A blue and-white flag, horizontally divided, neutral fleet
- White-and-blue pendant, neutral man of war
- Blue flag, neutral merchant ship
- A red, white and blue flag, an enemy's fleet
- A red, white and blue pendant, an enemy's man of war
- A red flag, an enemy's merchantman
- An Union Jack over neutral or enemy's signals, vessel is detained, or prize
- A white flag over any signal, vessel bears a flag of truce

SIGNALS OF DISTRESS.

In cases when immediate assistance is necessary, a ball at the mast head, in addition to the descriptive colours of the vessel in distress; and guns occasionally, until the signal is attended to.

SIGNALS MADE ON THE ENSIGN STAFF AT FORT GEORGE.

- A Red Flag denotes a vessel from Europe.
- A White Flag do. do. Newfoundland.
- A Blue Flag do. do. West-Indies.
- A red-and-white Flag do. Mediterranean.
- A red Pendant, Continent of Europe.
- A white-and red Pendant, Madeira, Canary, or Western Isles
- A blue Pendant, Bermudas, Bahamas or Turk's Islands
- A blue-and-white Flag. United States
- A red-and-white Flag, horizontally divided, Quebec, or Gulf of St. Lawrence.
- A blue-and-white Flag, horizontally divided, New-Brunswick, or Bay of Fundy.

A white-and-blue Pendant—Vessel has an English Mail on board
 A white Pendant—Coasts of Nova-Scotia and Cape Breton.

A brig—a small ball at the end of the yard, with a large ball in the centre.

THE Parrsborough Packet sails regularly between Windsor and Parrsborough every week, from the first of April to Christmas, viz. leaves Parrsborough on Monday, wind and weather permitting so as to be at Windsor on Tuesday; and will sail from thence the first high water that happens at or after eight o'clock in the morning of that Day: The Packet frequently goes twice or three times a week, when business requires it. The vessel is upwards of 50 tons burthen, and has very good accommodations for passengers, and likewise for carrying horses, neat cattle and sheep.

Potatoe Tops used as Fodder.—An excellent fodder for horned cattle may be collected from Potatoe Tops.—Reap off about two-thirds of the length of the potatoe tops, and dry them on mowing land in the usual way of hay-making. Several tons may be collected from an acre, and no damage to the potatoes, if taken as soon as they are ripe, and before the leaf begins much to fall.

To remove Warts or Corns.—Light a match well dipped in brimstone, and apply it to the corn or wart, so as to let some of the burning sulphur drop upon it; which will create some trifling pain, but will cause the wart or corn in a short time wholly to disappear.

Cure for a Whooping Cough.—Dissolve a scruple of Salt of Tartar, in a gill of water; add ten grains of cochineal, finely powdered; sweeten this with fine sugar; give to an infant the fourth part of a table spoonful, four times a day; to a child of two or three years of age, half a spoonful; and from four years and upwards, a spoonful may be taken.

Receipt for the Asthma.—Take of milk or gum ammoniac, ʒx ounces; syrup of squills, four ounces; mix together—a spoonful to be taken four or five times every day, particularly every morning.

The following receipt has been used many years with success by an experienced farmer in Somersetshire.—To every acre of orchard, take a load of muck-straw, or oats raked from the grass fields: lay it in six or eight heaps, into which divide a pound of sulphur; choose a clear day to burn it, with a brisk air, and it will not only destroy the insect in the bud, but kill all worms and other insects that breed under the trees and bark.
