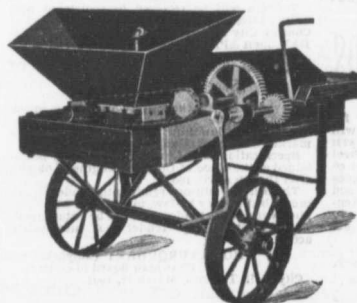

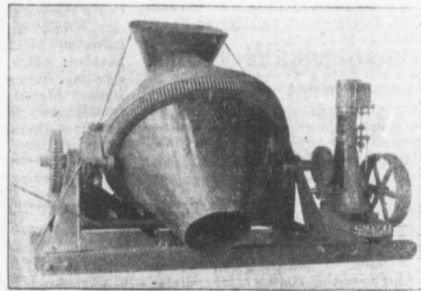
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THE SMITH CONCRETE MIXER IN SKIDS. One of 42 Sizes and Styles.
