We limit ourselves to quoting the following : "Corpus Domini accipimus et sanguine ejus potati sumus; ab omni malo non timebunusiquia Dominus nobiscum est." "We have received the Body of the Lord and we have drunk His Blood; we shall not fear any evil, for the Lord is with us." According to King, belief in the Real Presence was a novel doctrine intro-duced into the Church in the ninth cen-

duced into the Church in the ninth cen-tury by the monk Paschasius Radbert, against whom John Scotus Erigena, is alleged to have written a work, now lost in which he denied the Real Presence. The fact is that no question at all was raised at that time of Christ's Real Presence in the Blessed Sacrament, but only of the mode in which He is present. No donth was ever raised in the Church






