HOSPITAL GOVERNOR.
By-law No. 334 for the appointment of one member on the Board of Governors of the Brantford General Hospital, as the term of office of Richard Sanderson as county member has expired, was read a first, second and third time and passed. Mr. Sanderson re-appointed.

PRINTING CONTRACT.
The report of the committee on printing was read by Chairman A. W. Eddy. It stated that tenders had been called for, for the County print for 1916. Three tenders had been received from MacBride Press, Hurley Printing Company and the Brantford Courier. The tender from the Courier was the lowest, and the contract was given to it. This report was adopted.

REFERRED TO FINANCE COMMITTEE.
It was moved by Mr. R. J. Aitkin, that the request of Lieut. Colonel Brooks to have Brant County donate a field kitchen to the Canadian Mounted Rifles, be referred to the Finance Committee and they to inquire of their respective Federal members why the Government has not taken action in this matter and report at next meeting. Carried.

BRIDGE REPORT.
The report of the Roads and Bridges Committee was read by Chairman R. J. Aitkin. It was a very long report and touched on the communication of the Secretary-Treasurer of the Ontario Good Roads Association in regard to the convention of the Association to be held in Toronto on Feb. 22 to 24th, to bring into force the new Highway Bill.

By Special Wire to the Courier. New York, Jan. 28.—Charles C. Griswold, vice-president of the F. W. Woolworth Company, died yesterday at his home here on Fifth Avenue, at the age of 48 years.

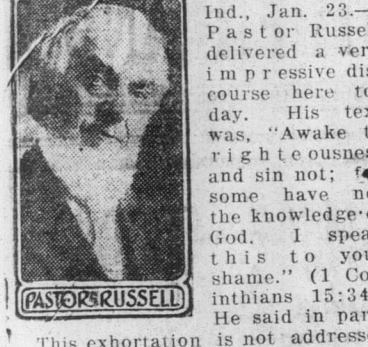

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Public notice is hereby given that under the First Part of chapter 79 of the Revised Statutes of Canada, 1906, known as "The Companies Act," letters patent have been issued under the Seal of the Secretary of State of Canada, bearing date the 28th day of December, 1915, incorporating James Harley, Edmund Sweet and Archibald Harley, Edmund Sweet and Archibald Harley, barristers-at-law, Janet Graham and Elsie Wilmut, stenographers, all of the City of Brantford, in the Province of Ontario, for the following purposes, viz:

- (a) To trade in, buy, sell, lease, use, operate, maintain, let for hire, deal in, deal with, dispose of, manufacture, fabricate, every kind and description of power for the transportation of animate or inanimate objects by water, air, including, without prejudice to the generality of the foregoing, automobiles, trucks, taxicabs, motor-cycles, bicycles, boats, aeroplanes and aerostats; (c) to manufacture, construct, assemble, repair, alter, modify, improve, perfect, and to carry on the business of dealers in and manufacturers of all or any of the said articles; (d) to acquire, maintain, and operate buildings, storage houses and garages for the storage, caring for and keeping for hire therein vehicles of every kind; (e) to acquire, hold, operate and dispose of timber and timber lands, limits and licenses; (f) to acquire and undertake the whole or any part of the business, property and liabilities of any person, company or corporation carrying on any business or enterprise, whether or not carried on, or possessed of, or operated for the purpose of this company and in particular the rights and assets of the Motor Trucks Limited, and to issue in payment or part payment thereof fully paid up shares of the capital stock of this company; (g) to carry on any other business, whether manufacturing or otherwise germane to the objects for which the company is incorporated and which may seem to the company to be expedient for the carrying on in connection with this company; (h) to acquire, hold, sell, assign or otherwise dispose of shares in the capital stock, bonds, debentures or other securities of any other corporation or corporations carrying on a business in whole or in part of a similar nature to that of this company; (i) to promote any company or companies for any purpose or purposes and to aid by guarantee, endorsement, advance or otherwise any company, shares of whose capital stock or whose bonds, debentures or other securities have been acquired or held by this company; (j) to apply for, purchase, lease or otherwise acquire and to use or do, sell or otherwise dispose of, trade names, labels, designs, patents, inventions or interest therein; (k) to acquire, construct, operate, sell or otherwise dispose of, real or personal property, sheds, warehouses, for the reception and storage of goods and merchandise, and all other machinery, appliances and appliances therefor; (l) with the approval of the shareholders to issue the shares of the company, fully or partly paid or its bonds, debentures or other securities as payment in whole or in part for any business, franchise or other property which the company is authorized to acquire; (m) to lease, sell or otherwise dispose of the undertaking of the company or any part thereof, for such consideration as the company may deem proper and in particular for shares, debentures or stocks of any company purchasing or acquiring in the establishment or support of associations, institutions, funds, trusts or conveniences calculated to benefit employees or ex-employees of the company or the dependents or connections of such persons and to grant pensions, gratuities, allowances and to make payments towards insurance and to subscribe or guarantee money for charitable or benevolent objects or for any public, general or useful object; (n) to consolidate or amalgamate with any other company having objects similar in whole or in part to those of this company; (o) to enter into any partnership or into any arrangement for sharing of profits, or union of interests with any person or company carrying on or engaged in any business or transaction which the company is authorized to carry on or engage in, or to make advances, guarantee the contracts of, or otherwise assist any such person or company, and to take or otherwise acquire shares or securities of any such company, notwithstanding the provisions of section 44 of the said Act and to sell, hold or otherwise deal with the same; (p) to raise and assist in raising money for, and to aid by way of bonus, loan, promise, endorsement, guarantee of bonds, debentures or other securities or otherwise customarily done by or on behalf of the company and others having dealings with the company and any corporation in the capital stock of which the company holds shares or securities or otherwise has business relations; to act as employee, agent or manager of any such corporation and to guarantee the performance of contracts by any corporation or by any person or person with whom the company may have business relations; (q) To invest the moneys of the company not immediately required in such manner as may from time to time be determined; (r) To distribute any of the property of the company among the members in specie; (s) To procure the company to be registered, designated or otherwise recognized in any foreign country and to designate and appoint persons therein as attorneys or representatives of this company with full power to represent it in all matters according to the laws of such foreign country and to accept service for and on behalf of this company of any process or suit; (t) To draw, make, accept, endorse or execute promissory notes, bills of exchange, warrants and other negotiable or transferable instruments; (u) To do all and everything necessary, suitable, proper or convenient for the accomplishment of any one or more of the objects enumerated or incidental thereto, or which shall in any time appear conducive to or expedient for the protection or benefit of this company; (v) To do all acts and exercise all powers and carry on all business incidental to the carrying out of the objects for which the company is incorporated; (w) Any power granted in any paragraph hereof shall not be limited or restricted by reference to or inference from the terms of any other paragraph; (x) The operations of the company to be carried on throughout the Dominion of Canada and elsewhere by the name of "Motor Trucks Limited," with a capital stock of five hundred thousand dollars, divided into 5000 shares of one hundred dollars each, and the chief place of business of the said company to be at the City of Brantford, in the Province of Ontario.
