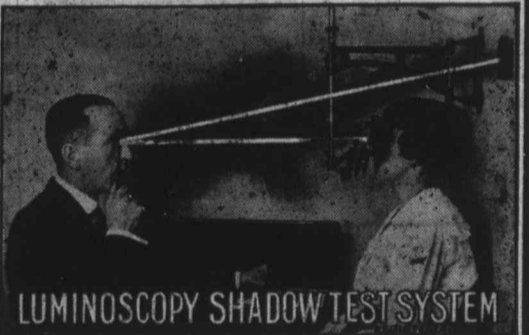

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### Boys With Guns

On Saturday afternoon while Mr. H. L. Cole, of the Aberdeen Hotel, was on his verandah a spent 22 calibre bullet struck him on the shoulder and while it did not penetrate the flesh it inflicted a nasty stroke which pained him for some time. The bullet must have come from the south where boys, probably, were carelessly shooting on the hill. This must be a warning to all boys or men using guns. Even the spent bullet might have put out an eye or inflicted an ugly wound on the face had it not struck where the clothing was a protection.

Private Frank McDonald in his address here recently told much of the hardships of person life in Germany. He said—

When he was first taken prisoner the Red Cross had not taken over the supplying of the prisoners. The prisoners were so hungry all the time that they fought over the garbage pails. They suffered from hunger until the Red Cross took the work over. This organization reorganized everything so that every Canadian prisoner got three parcels a fortnight. Every two weeks a parcel of biscuits and cigarettes was received by each soldier, and every six months each soldier got a complete change of clothes. They had a follow up system, which made it almost impossible for the Germans to get the supplies.

The twenty-four hour ration of German bread would be eaten in five minutes.

It is only the Belgian and French civilians, who are taken over as slaves, and the Russian prisoners who get no outside supplies. They are starving to death and dying like cattle.

That is what our boys would be like if it were not for the Red Cross said Private MacDonald. The people over here that support the Red Cross are saving our boys. There would not be a single one of them come back only for the Red Cross supplies sent.

"And the boys are trying to be British all the time," he continued. "They try to keep each other's spirits up. They keep on smiling rather than let the Germans think they are down hearted."

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P. Marion Simms, Ph. D. Lecture "The Calf Path" At Kentville Chautauqua Which Opens July 31st.

The Swarthmore Chautauqua Association asked Dr. Simms to tell the Chautauqua patrons what he was thinking about. He writes from Camp Doniphan, Oklahoma, and this will be the key-note of this big lecture, "The Calf Path," from a big man. "The war in Europe has demonstrated my contention as to the necessity for ministering to the whole man. Men go into the trenches for a time, and then come out for rest and recuperation. And it has been found necessary to give them baseball, football, entertainments, pictures shows, etc. In our camps today the Y. M. C. A. and other agencies are rendering a service to the whole man. Games, contests, boxing, wrestling, dog dancing, shows, pictures, etc. Vaudeville and musical comedy are found highly helpful. The boys must be made to laugh and forget. And as the burdens of war grow heavier, the people back at home must be made to laugh and forget more and more.

"The Y. M. C. A. used a red triangle as its emblem. The three angles stand for the threefold service it offers—to the physical, social and mental and spiritual. And the Y. M. C. A. is the only institution we have that can serve our army. Our churches are powerless to do it. One of the sad predicaments of today is that in our hour of greatest need the church, splintered almost beyond recognition, is powerless to render any service, except to furnish money to the Y. M. C. A. and other such things. The church in the future has great possibilities and must prepare." Dr. Simms comes to the Chautauqua like other Chautauqua lecturers from war service. He happens to be from Camp Doniphan, where he has been devoting his time and energy to the Y. M. C. A. or red triangle work. Dr. Sims is widely known for his quaint humor. He is a living philosopher. Knows men, and has had a wonderful experience. With it all Chautauqua patrons can expect a great lecture in "The Calf Path."

British and Japs Landed at Vladivostok

London, July 7th.—English and Japanese landing parties landed at Vladivostok and patrolled the streets and enforced neutrality in the area where the Consulates are located during the fighting between the Czech-Slovaks and the Bolsheviks, according to a despatch from Vladivostok. The fighting which occurred on June 30th, resulted in the defeat of the Bolsheviks, the Czech-Slovaks taking over control of the city.

Hurled Germans Back

With the British Army in France, June 28.—(By the Associated Press)—Fied Marshal Von Hindenburg's troops in an attack over a front of the forest of Nieppe got a nasty and unexpected knock today when the British drove forward in a surprise attack along a front of more than three miles and hurled the startled greycoated soldiers back to an average depth of 1500 yards. The operation as an unqualified success from its inception and the attacking infantry reached all their objectives in remarkably short time.

STRANGE RIVERS (Tit-Bits, London)

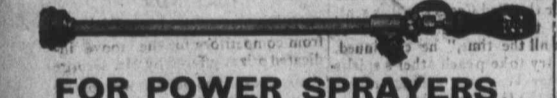

French Captured Over One Thousand Prisoners.

PARIS, June 28.—Southwest of Soissons French troops in an attack over a front of four and a half miles from the south of Ambly the east of Mont Gabalet today captured German positions, and at some points advanced their lines to a depth of a mile and a quarter says the French official communication this evening. Prisoners to the number of 1,000 thus far have been counted.

CROP PROSPECTS

The prospects for a fruit crop is not as favorable as last year, when we marketed a half million barrels. With conditions continuing and a chance for apples to mature good size and no thinning required our crop for present year may not fall very far below that of last year. However a small crop compared with what we expect in a full bearing year, judging from what our orchards have already produced and the increase in size we could hope for a two million barrel crop, but do not desire such a crop until war conditions allow us unrestricted marketing.

The hay crop is every where very light. About 60 p. c. of a crop is the present outlook, continued rains and a little delay in gathering, may improve this crop very much. There is little clover in the crop of this year. Grass is now in demand and readily purchased at ten dollars per ton standing.

The bean crop suffered much from frost and also from worms which blighted them as soon as they were up.

The grain crop is showing up fairly well.

Potatoes are growing nicely and a very good acreage is reported.

Strawberries are now on the market and are a fair crop. The Blomidon section will have a good crop to market later.

DAMAGE TO CROPS

The recent frosts were reported to have done an immense damage to the crop in Kings Co. While such is the case the loss is not as great as at first anticipated. The large bean crop throughout the county suffered heavily in all inland and exposed sections. Near the salt water the frost has no effect. Mr Sam Chute of Berwick suffered a heavy loss in his full-brop of 65 acres of beans, about one third being destroyed. Tomatoes and early corn also suffered.

The stir in the atmosphere was probably sufficient to keep the fruit crop from being effected in any way.

In a year like this when every pound of food will be required for the need of ourselves and allies it is a serious loss to have so much of an acreage destroyed and have to be replanted. Yet we as a people, through this war are learning hardships by experience and should be thankful that frost rather than war which bleeding France and heroic Belgium are suffering has been our worst calamity.

He was a man of sterling character, quiet in his disposition. In religion he was a Baptist. He is survived by his widow and one daughter, Nettie wife of Colonel J. L. Ralston, M.P.P. Nova Scotia Highlanders; three brothers Roderick, of Halifax; George, of Brunswick Me., and Hugh of Hatfield, Mass., and one sister Mrs. Alex Grantymre, of Sidney. Mrs. Ralston has been with her father during his illness.

Capt. Hicklog of the S.A. is leaving for Trenton, N.S. and Capt. Bryant of Inverness, will have charge of the work here. Lieut. Thornhill is now seeking the recovery of his health at the Sanatorium.

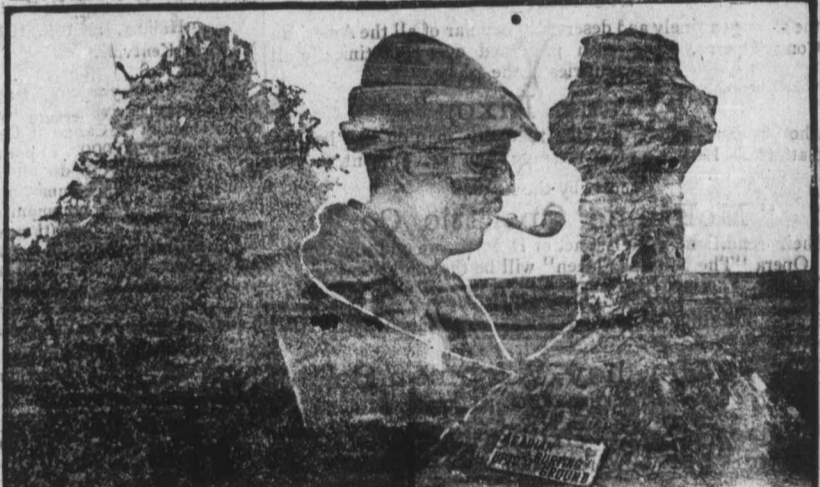

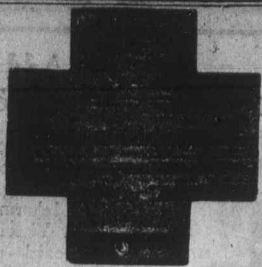

EVANGELINE'S LAND TO HAVE A SHRINE



A giant of the orchard in full bloom, The fisherman doing his bit. A new Mecca is beckoning to devotees of art and religion. Its name is Nova Scotia. Already all seasons to picture the quaint fisherfolk and their quaint surroundings and returned with charming pictures of Evangeline's Land. A collection of sixty paintings, the work of six New York men, known as the Nova Scotia Group, were exhibited recently in New York and elicited much praise. The pioneers of Nova Scotia have blessed a trail over which a brush and palette laden army will follow in seasons to come. They will come to paint the gentle beauty of apple-blossoms when the great Annapolis Valley is covered with a fragrant pink and white veil. They will come in cherry time to paint the rich red fruit and the happy people enjoying the Cherry Festival, a time beloved of them. They will come in autumn to transfer to canvas the mad riot of brilliant coloring with which Nature paints the woods and hillsides and when the orchards groan beneath their heavy bagged bunches of ripened apples. They will come at all seasons to picture the quaint fisherfolk and their quaint surroundings. The Dominion Atlantic Railway that serves you around a half-circle from Halifax to Yarmouth, takes you through a land of Romance, the Land of Evangeline. At the little station of Grand Pre you will find a wide meadow which is soon to be transformed into a shrine. Here, previous to 1778, stood the Roman Catholic Church of St. Charles, the church of the Acadians. To-day a massive stone cross marks the site of the old burying ground that surrounded the church and nearby is Evangeline's Well, with its long sweep. The French Acadians have always cherished a reverence for this spot and now, through the generosity of the Dominion Atlantic Railway Company they may call it their own. Memorial Park, Grand Pre, N.S. The railway company has purchased this meadow and will make it into an old-fashioned garden surrounded with a rustic fence and has deeded a portion of the ground to the Societe L'Assomption, composed of French Acadians, of whom the Rev. C. V. Landry of Eustache, N.B., is President. The only consideration for this transfer is the promise of the Societe to erect a chapel. This they are eager to do and plans are now under consideration. With the dedication of the new shrine, large numbers of French Acadians from Quebec, Montreal and Upper Canadian points will make pilgrimages to Grand Pre similar to those made yearly to the Assisi de Beauport.
