OPENING OF THE LEGISLATIVE SESSION.

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, Sir Alexander Bannerman, opened the Session, today, a little after 2 o'clock, p.m., with the following address:

I have again summoned you to meet and with great satisfaction acquaint you, that with one exception, all the Acts which were passed last Session have been left to their operation.

You will be happy to learn that the Education Bill was specially confirmed by Her Majesty's measure of great importance, and the commencement, I trust, of a better system.

You will recollect that at the opening of the Session last year, that I alluded to a measure which was passed in the year 1851, but not confirmed.

I cannot conclude, without alluding to the subject of the Colonies, but with respect to the Colonies, I have forwarded to the Government a Map delineating the various reserves, distinguishing the which they are held, and copies of which will be laid before you.

There may be special cases of hardship and injustice likely to arise from the state in which the law will be left from the non-confirmation of this Act.

The Public Accounts will be laid before you, and you will be gratified at seeing a good indication of the increasing prosperity of the Colony.
