





WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any mail over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The application of Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by there, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of interesting homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father mother, son, daughter, brother sister.




