



HARDWOODS CAN BE USED IN PULP MAKING

The De partment of Lands and Mines have received from the Lauren tide Pulp and Paper Company of Quebec information concerning the results of experiments carried on by it in the use of hardwoods in the manufacture of wood-pulp. Hardwoods such as birch, beech, maple, etc. were experimented with and contrary to the gen eral opinion were found to be suitable for the manufacture of xcellent grades of pulp. The process of manufact ure of course had to be varied to som extent.

The information has been received with great interest here as hardwoods constitute some thirty percent of the forest growth of New Brunswick. Hon E A Smith, Minister of Lands and Mines is greatly interested in the matter and it will be followed up with a view to having hardwoods utilized in this province for the making of pulp. Hereafter hardwoods have been used chiefly for fuel. If they can be made into pulp the value of hardwood lands will increase greatly.





## The Application of Ground and Dried Sea Weed

When, on account of war conditions and the consequent scarcity of German potash, efforts were being made to secure potash from other sources, the Experimental Farms made a test of the use of sea-weed as a source of potash. To put this material into a portable and commercial form it had to be dried and ground. This work was done in an experimental way on the Nova Scotia coast and some of the product was sent to the Fredericton Station for test.





Experiment at Cape Rouge—All eed given to four different horses whose average weight was 1,330 pounds, was recorded for each animal during twelve months. The quantiies eaten were 6,069 pounds of hay, 5,447 of oats, 1,080 of bran, 92 of black molasses, which amounted to 1.25 pound of hay and 1.36 pound of concentrates per 100 pounds of horse per day. Valuing hay at \$20 and bran at \$30 per ton, oats at 3 cents and black molasses at 3.5 cents per pound, the average cost of feed per horse, per year, was \$248.91 As each
