An exchange telephone system in thousands of cities, towns and villages in Ontario and Quebec with substantial fire-proof buildings the last word in sanitation and convenience; 96,750 miles of Long Distance wire on 9,500 miles of poles; 587,000 miles of wire in underground cables; many hundreds of miles of wire providing party service to rural communities besides exchange and pole line facilities to give exchange connection to 720 local telephone organizations serving over 103,000 subscribers, mostly iarmers.

It takes some 11,600 telephone workers to operate the system and their wages in 1919 totaled \$9,400,000.

This goodly band of faithful workers, with those dependent on them, are a substantial element in the community. They are intimately concerned in its welfare-concerned most of all that the telephone service shall be adequate to its needs. They appreciate, just like the rest of humanity, the kindly co-operation of the public.
