The Mystery Soldier is a Mystery No Longer Efforts Are Being Made to Settle Railroad Strike

MYSTERY SOLDIER TURNS OUT TO BE A FAKE; IS BELIEVED TO BE ENGLISH SNEAK THIEF

Hall Denies That He is Not the Man in the Photographs—Identified by Immigration Inspector—Bertillon System Used to Prove "Hall's" Identity.

TORONTO, April 11.—Toronto's "mystery soldier" will be deported to England by the immigration authorities as soon as all details can be arranged. Although "Frank Hall" he called himself, has not recovered his memory, the prison officials used by Bertillon measurements and photographs, have never suffered from the same lapse. "Hall" was positively identified yesterday afternoon by Inspector of Immigration James C. Mitchell, Toronto, as Clyde Denham, an ex-convict, who was deported to England in June 1915, after serving ten months of a 24-months sentence in the Provincial Prison. This sentence was imposed on St. Thomas on August 20, 1914, following his conviction for theft of people's lives in Exeter, Eng.

"That's Not Me"
"That's not me," exclaimed "Hall" when shown several photos taken at various times and at different prisons. The first recorded came from the Indiana State Prison at Jeffersonville, dated December 2, 1908. Petty larceny was the ground of conviction in this case. Then comes one from Brantford, six months this time, for theft. The date was February 1912. Following was a sentence of nine months for theft imposed at Hamilton in February, 1913. The date was the St. Thomas conviction. "Hall" claimed to be "entitled" with the C. E. F. on August 20, 1914. On that date he was on 24 months for theft in a St. Thomas court.

Though Bullet Pierced His Heart Buffalo Man Has Lived For Some Hours

BUFFALO, April 13.—With a bullet wound in his chest and making an effort to attract assistance, Chester Germain, thirty-two years old, former physical instructor at the Terrace playground, laid on the floor at his home in the lower flat at the house of No. 750 Elk street, for four hours yesterday afternoon before he was discovered. The man, who is dying at the Emergency Hospital last night, told Captain of detectives Zimmerman that he had shot himself with a revolver in an effort to end his life at 11 o'clock yesterday morning.

Booker Backs Up On Birth Control

DECLARES THAT HE WAS NOT SPEAKING SERIOUSLY—REV. FATHER MALONEY CALLS LEGALIZED MURDER

HAMILTON, April 13.—Attending the closing entertainment for returned soldiers at their friends at the Knights of Columbus hotel last night, Mayor Booker took advantage of the occasion to express his latest views on birth control and incidentally, to deny he was an advocate of such a scheme. The mayor said he had been misunderstood at the time when he introduced the subject in Hamilton with large families who had visited his office for relief. He merely remarked in a jocular manner, he said: "Don't you think it should go in for birth control?"

STRONGLY CONDEMNED

Later in the evening Rev. Father Maloney, of St. Mary's Cathedral, and chaplain of the K. of C. but condemned in no uncertain terms any scheme undertaken to control birth.

"Whether Mayor Booker was serious or not," said he, "I want to tell him that his birth control is all nonsense. What a terrible blow it would be to him had his parents practiced it, what a loss to the city! Birth control is nothing but legalized murder. We want large healthy families, for they form the basis of any state. When politicians attempt to legislate in this direction ruin follows. We hear a lot of Quebec's expansion, because here in Ontario we have been practicing birth control and they have not. There is no plan known to stop nature. Take the births in Ontario and foreign elements were left out the results would be startling. What we must depend on are large families, raised on the old soil. If we want to look after our own country we must not follow any such scheme that is repugnant to the law of God and nature. What would happen to old Ontario if it were adopted."

The policewoman entered the theatre to investigate complaints made at headquarters to the effect that men were molesting women in the theatres.

IRISH LABOR TO PROTEST AGAINST JAIL TREATMENT

DUBLIN, April 13.—The officials of the Irish trade union congress and the labor party today issued a call to the workers of Ireland for a general strike throughout the country tomorrow as a protest against the treatment of political prisoners. The officials in their call demand the release of those imprisoned for political offenses.

THE WEATHER

TORONTO, April 13.—The disturbance which was centered in Illinois yesterday has passed to the eastward of the Great Lakes. Snow has fallen throughout Southern Ontario and is now falling in Eastern districts. Heavy rain is falling in the Province of Quebec.

Official of So-called "Outlaw" Organization Says 90 Per Cent. of Switchmen Enrolled Under Their Banner—Supply Crews For Milk Trains.

NEW YORK, April 13.—Union Labor's co-operation in an effort to break the unauthorized strike of railroad workers here was pledged last night by representatives of the four big railroad brotherhoods in conference with representatives of the Eastern roads. A statement given out after the meeting characterized the strike as a "mob movement" and asserts it was "bound to break."

Run Millionaire Special

It was learned at the Lackawanna offices that a "Millionaire Special" was run from Hoboken to Morristown, N.J., late today. The train was manned, with the exception of the engineer and conductor, by five wealthy residents of Morristown.

Is First Official Conference

It was announced that the brotherhood leaders had "tried their best" to have the men ignore the radical agitators who invaded New York from New Jersey yesterday. Previously the brotherhood leaders had mingled with strikers and loyal union men in New Jersey, urging them to respect their contracts.

Baby Girl Left on Door- Step Last Night and Police Are Making Investigation

A little girl baby three weeks old was last night left at the front door of the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Johnson, Lock Four Government house.

They were preparing for bed and heard a dog barking and on going to investigate found the little child wrapped in some clothing, between the inner and outer front door. There was a note written in what looks to be an illiterate hand which said: "Please be good to my baby and don't put it in the papers. God bless you." The little one was in good health and fairly well dressed and appeared to have been well taken care of.

RIGHTS OF THE NORTH
 The proposal made at a meeting of ratepayers a few nights ago by Ald. Riffer that a line of motor buses might be established to take care of the population in the north end of the city which is in need of transportation facilities, is, we fear, impracticable. Such services are run in some of the larger cities of the United States but the remote possibility of such a line paying in a centre with only 20,000 population would make an investor doubtful and hesitant. Certainly the city as a municipality should not think of undertaking such an expensive experiment.

There are in two or three at least of the larger cities of the eastern States trackless trolleys which operate along streets from overhead wires. They do not require any rails and are said to be giving good service. As to their earning capacity in relation to cost and operation we have not heard, but it is difficult to imagine that they could be made to pay in a city of the size of St. Catharines unless thorough over which they travelled was much longer and more prolific of passenger traffic than the north of this city.

It is conceded, in fact, that an extension of the N. S. & T. run as a part of a system already in operation here and established upon a sound basis would not pay its way except as a part of the whole system but as the system in its entirety does pay, The Journal has been steadily advocating that the company be induced to run a line down Lake and along the north end of the city so as to furnish service, even though the traffic originating in that area would not for two or three years more be very heavy.

When such a service could be obtained at no cost to the citizens of St. Catharines, and, too, from a system owned and operated as a public utility, the reluctance of Ald. Riffer and some of his colleagues to accept the opportunity seems not easy to understand from a business standpoint. We fancy if the same condition presented itself to the chairman of the railway and industrial committee in his own affairs he would not hesitate long to grasp it. Prejudice and the imaginary value of that public prejudice in elections should never prevent a courageous and eager representative in Council or legislature from doing his duty. Perhaps when two or three years have rolled around and nothing is secured for the nine thousand people lying north of Welland Ave., those gentlemen who now may sincerely oppose what they could so easily secure for the public, will realize that a mistake has been made in holding back for that length of time the growth and progress of St. Catharines.

The Journal pointed out last fall that it would be two or three years before the Hydro could possibly build in here from the west or construct the lines in this city that St. Catharines needs, but a prejudiced tone against the N. S. & T. which has helped to build up the city and which now belongs to the public was the only answer. The months drift

WHAT EXCHANGES SAY
A WARNING TO LONDON
 Stratford Beacon.—If London is not careful she will come to deserve the appellation of "hogtown" hitherto applied to another Canadian city. For some days an agitation has been noticeable from that city advocating a change in the Hon. Mr. Briggs' plan for the straight Toronto to Sarnia highway at present scheduled to proceed through Stratford on the most direct route. London, of course, wishes this highway to be deviated to enter that city, and if its ambitions are successful, Stratford will be successful, instead of being upon the road but with a branch or mere county road running from London to this city. The reason is obvious. Much of the profitable tourist traffic from the United States will pass over this highway, and London is overlooking nothing that will contribute to her prosperity. Stratford and other municipalities on the direct route should be quick to protect their interests, and impress upon the Government the importance of adhering to its settled program.

ONTARIO WANTS THIS POWER.
 London Free Press.—Premier Drury is quite right in his position that Ontario claims as a right the power to be developed on the St. Lawrence river. In correcting the member for London the Premier showed the proper grasp on the subject. If Ontario has control of hydraulic development at Niagara Falls, why not also upon the St. Lawrence River? The Government at Ottawa is interested in securing the anticipated St. Lawrence river power because of its adaptability to the operation of the Federal railway system. This however, has no bearing upon the matter. If the power is required for the National Railways by any portion of it, the Federal Government can arrange for its purchase upon satisfactory terms. Ontario has

shown her ability to deal with power development, and it would be most unfortunate were any interference with this policy to come from Ottawa.

PAINT LENGTHENS LIFE OF BUILDINGS AND MACHINES

Many an old ship has stood the racket of ocean travel for years mainly on the strength of the tar or paint applied to her sides, but sailors do not wait for the ship's hull to become weather beaten before applying the first coat of paint. Department of Finance

ALL persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:—

1. Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$1,000 or more.
2. All other individuals who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$2,000 or more.
3. Every corporation and joint stock company whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.

Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 30th of April, 1920.

ALL INDIVIDUALS other than farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1.

FARMERS AND RANCHERS must use Form T 1A.

CORPORATIONS and joint stock companies must use Form T 2.

Penalty

Every person required to make a return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of twenty-five per centum of the amount of the tax payable.

Any person, whether taxable, or otherwise, who fails to make a return or provide information duly required according to the provision of the Act, shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of \$100 for each day during which the default continues. Also any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding \$10,000, or to six months' imprisonment or to both fine and imprisonment.

DR. CREELMAN TO BE AGENT-GENERAL

The O.A.C. President Going to London.

TORONTO, April 12.—Dr. G. C. Creelman, president of the Ontario Agricultural College, has resigned and will go to England as Agent-General for the Province. He will be succeeded by Dr. J. B. Reynolds of the Manitoba agricultural college. Brigadier-general Sims, the present agent-general in London has tendered his resignation to the Drury government. In his letter he pointed out that he had offered his resignation to Sir William Herst in January, 1919.

The formal announcement was made by Hon. Manning Doherty this morning. It will be remembered that only a few weeks ago when an apparently authoritative report of Dr. Creelman's retirement was published, the minister of agriculture stated that he had not heard the O.A.C. head was to resign or be appointed to London.

Mr. Doherty said this morning that he proposed to begin active immigration propaganda in the British Islands, Norway, Sweden, Denmark and Belgium to secure agricultural workers.

SAYS "HALL'S" HOME IS NEAR NORWICH

BRANTFORD, April 12.—A determined effort will be made officially on behalf of the city to bring about the sure identification of "Frank Hall," the mysterious soldier now in hospital in Toronto.

"Frank Hall" gave Mayor MacBride the names of four men in this city whom he knew formerly. They were men connected with the Massey-Harris plant here, but not those who had identified him as George Henshaw, formerly of Exeter, England. One was A. Lynn, the others the foreman and the timekeeper employed at the Massey-Harris plant at the time he worked there. He also told of Harwood, a tailor of Brantford making a suit for him, and suggested that Mr. Harwood would have his address. Asked if he knew the name of Brantford's Fire Chief he could not tell, but when asked for the name of the Chief of Police, he at once replied "Chief Steinn."

RECKLESS AUTO DRIVER KILLS GREAT CITIZEN

TORONTO, April 12.—C. A. B. Brown is dead. He drifted into death at five o'clock on Saturday afternoon. There were hopes held out during the morning in the emergency ward of the Toronto General Hospital where he was carried from the scene of the accident Friday night, that he might recover. Great Daro of Buffalo Beat Tom Everett of Boise in a Gruelling Go

It took the Great Daro, of Buffalo 37 minutes and 50 seconds last night at the Grand Opera House to throw Tom Everett of Boise, Idaho, in a wrestling go. It was a gruelling match all the way through and both men were trying their very utmost all the time.

Owing to the bad weather, no doubt, there was only a small attendance, so Manager Odium could scarcely take last night's attendance at the show as indicative of what is wanted in that line by the sports of St. Catharines. Wrestling alone, is rather a tame affair and perhaps if one or two nifty boxing bouts were put on with one good wrestling match, it would add to the interest.

Mr. Graham of Buffalo, acted as referee in a very fair and gentlemanly way. He asked anyone who wished to referee, but the crowd urged him to go ahead and referee the go's himself.

Daro is a heavier man than Everett and a much more experienced wrestler, too, at least in point of the number of years he has been at the game but it was apparent that Everett showed a shade of cleverness on the Buffalo man which made up for the discrepancy in weight, and he pulled himself out of a lot of tight places.

Daro's wind is not as good as it once was as could be noticed from the amount of grunting he did whenever the Boiser got him in close grips.

In the contest everything went but struggle holds and only one fall was the decision. Several times the referee had to interrupt a strangle hold and then the wrestlers got off the mat several times at critical periods and had to be stopped.

The men in the audience got a lot of fun out of it watching the two men in what seemed like a death struggle. There were times when it would seem as if one or the other would break his opponent's strangle hold to make his shoulder the mat but this was not necessary when an expert wriggle would get the man out of the tight hole.

It was surprising what agility was shown by both men. In a second or two they would be at close grips down on the mat, next moment and both would spring to his feet and face each other again.

Many in the audience thought the contest would have to be called a draw as there seemed to be no advantage on either side, then the end came suddenly, after a season of close grips and strong bearing down on the part of the big fellow.

Daro addressed the audience afterwards. He said he was sorry there were so few present and he hoped the next time he wrestled here the audience would be larger. He said he was 37 years old and had travelled with Barnum's circus as strong man.

In the preliminary go Joe Matty, Buffalo's Polish champion wrestler, bested Charlie Smith of Niagara Falls, N. Y., best two out of three. The boys put up an exciting contest but there were only two throws, the Buffalo man getting both.

BRITISH ISLES ARE IN A TRYING POSITION

LONDON, April 12—After experiencing two crises last week, the near-rebellion in Ireland and the serious rift in the Entente cordiale with France, the British public is prepared today for another week of political and labor disturbances. Parliament opened today. The Government prepared for attacks upon its 'acrid' notes to France and the Austrian Peace Treaty, which is up for consideration Wednesday.

On Thursday the executive council of the Miners' Federation meets to count the strike ballots, and this week also a new rail crisis is expected, when the demand of the railwaymen for a one pound a week increase in wages is expected to re-open the whole wage question, with a probable

appeal to the National Wages Board. While politics, Labor, liquor taxation, etc., may disturb the nation itself officials are more interested in Premier Lloyd George's health. His sea journey to Marseilles, which will keep him detached most of this week from Government affairs has been undertaken at the urgent instance of his physicians, who have become rather anxious about his health.

French Proves "Thorn"

The British Government is seriously handicapped in its efforts to make a clean-up of the Administration in Ireland by Lord French's determination to stick to the job. There is no doubt the Government has been embarrassed by his attitude. When Sir Hamar Greenwood was appointed Chief Secretary and General Macready named as Military Commander the Government anticipated the Viceroy's resignation, intending to make General Macready the supreme military authority in Ireland, and appoint a Viceroy who could adopt a position independent of social leaders and advisers.

Lord French, however, is determined to stay, but every possible influence is being brought to bear to oust him. When the Government determined to adopt a new policy toward Ireland it intended to make civilian representatives of the British Government the supreme authority in Ireland, but as long as Lord French remains this is impossible.

Scotland Becomes Restive

The Government has been much relieved during the last week by its discovery that arms, ammunition, tanks and field artiller shipped to Scotland from Germany were not intended for Ireland. Complete investigations by the War Department does not substantiate the original belief that these arms were imported for an Irish rebellion. Exhaustive inquiries by Government agents show the arms were destined for Denikins army, not for Ireland.

There was a great demonstration yesterday in Glasgow in favor of a Scottish Home Rule Bill. Resolutions were adopted demanding self-determination for Scotland. This is the beginning of an agitation which is expected to increase steadily until a bill reaches Parliament. Joseph Johnston, M. P., one of the prime movers in the plan, speaking at Glasgow said:

"I favor a Home Rule Parliament set up in Scotland as a subordinate Legislature to the Imperial Parliament to deal with Scottish affairs."

BOSTON, Mass., April 12—Salt pork, or salt horse, one of a number of disparaging names applied to it by jacks for many generations, will no longer have a place on the navy bill of fare, according to a department order received here today.

The order directs that no further purchases of salt pork be made and that bacon and ham be substituted for it.

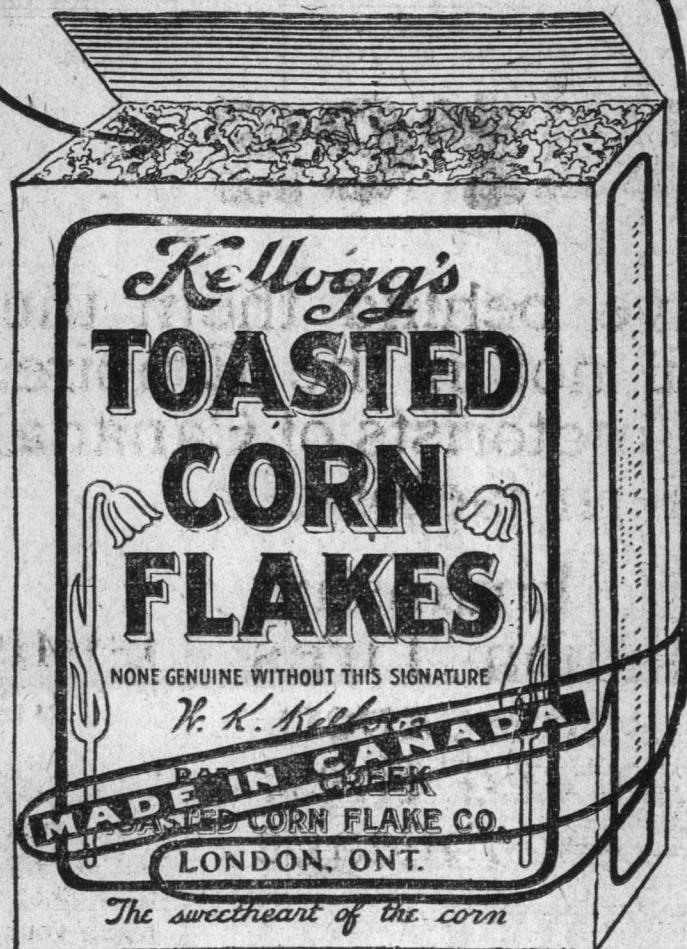

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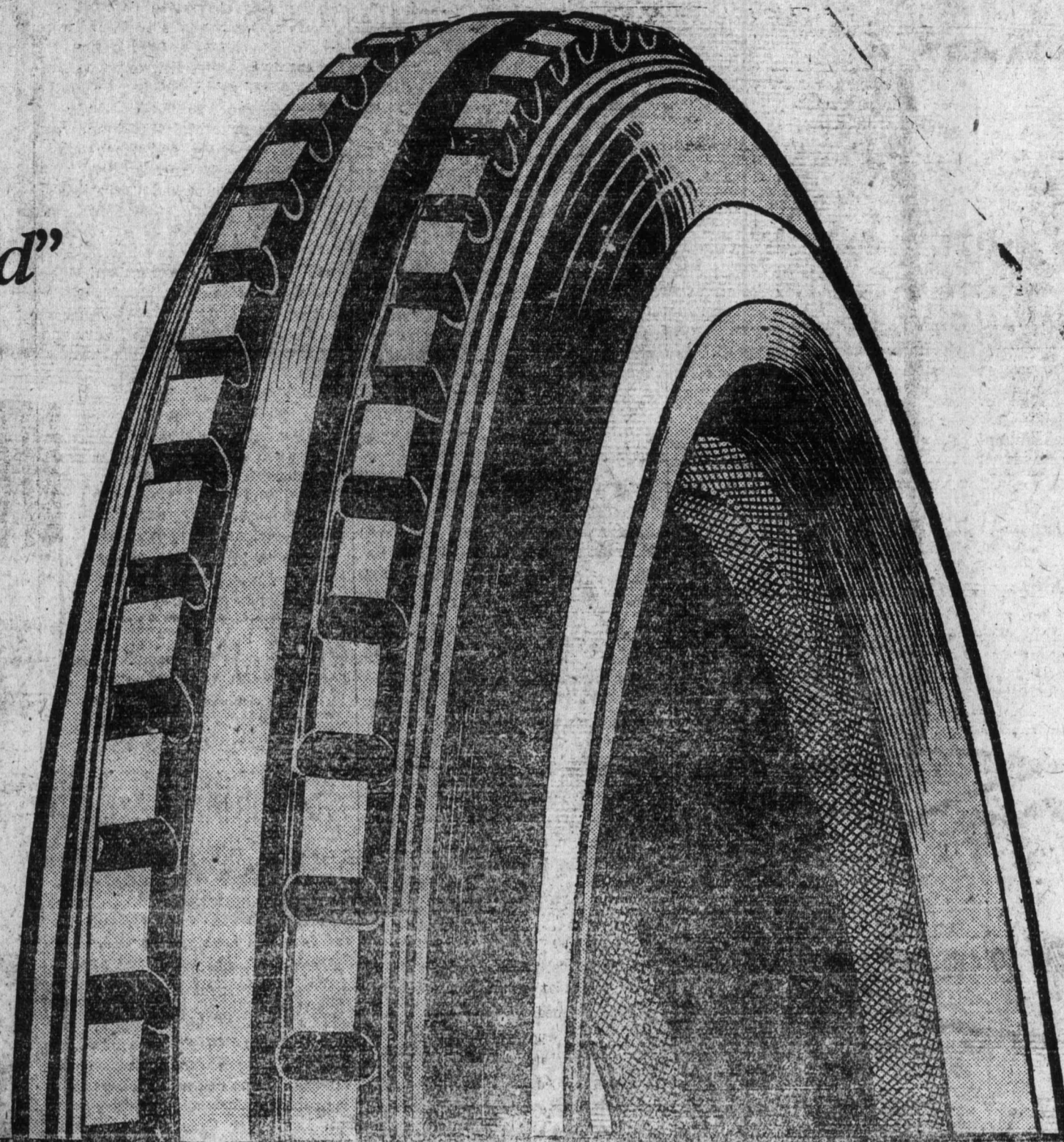

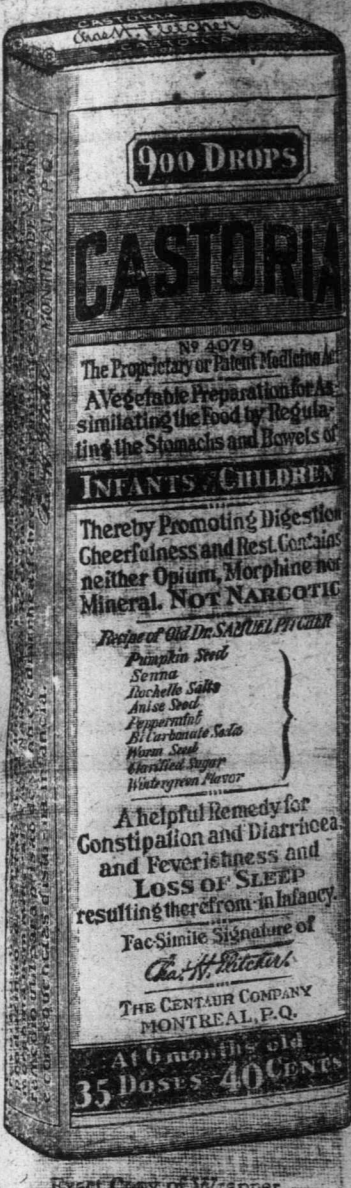

Commissioner W. J. Richards, chief of the Salvation Army in Eastern Canada, has completed his fifth year in that capacity. During that time the Army has seen one of its greatest periods of usefulness. This period takes in the "war years." The great war had been under way since August and new problems presented themselves to the organization when he assumed command. These problems required a large measure of initiative to overcome. The task of rendering the highest and most efficient service was shouldered and Canada paid tribute to the success which attended those efforts by over subscribing the amount asked for during the Red Shield Drive.

Commissioner Richards is a forceful man. He is a man of few words. He believes in doing things. During the five years, more than 11,000 persons are recorded as having sought salvation. Notwithstanding the losses due to war, there are today nearly 2,000 more names on the Membership Roll than there were in this territory five years ago.

In July, 1915, Canada East was separated from Canada West, the dividing line being Port Arthur. Ever in view of this, there are now only forty one fewer officers in active service in the Eastern territory alone than there were in the combined territories five years ago.

In the Field Report two very striking indications of financial growth are given. In 1914, the Self-Denial total for the combined territories was \$43,726. In 1919, for Canada East alone, it was \$75,591. Harvest Festival returns have been doubled.

Shows Solid Growth. In all the various departments the record shows that as often as humanly possible every opportunity has been seized for the advancement of every branch of the organization. Inasmuch as every act of service means the welfare of somebody, the same rate of growth has been reposition which the Salvation Army occupies today indicates tremendously increased service to the community.

This service has been rendered under the leadership of Commissioner W. J. Richards. His five years in Canada have been five big years for the Salvation Army in Canada, and give great promise for the future.

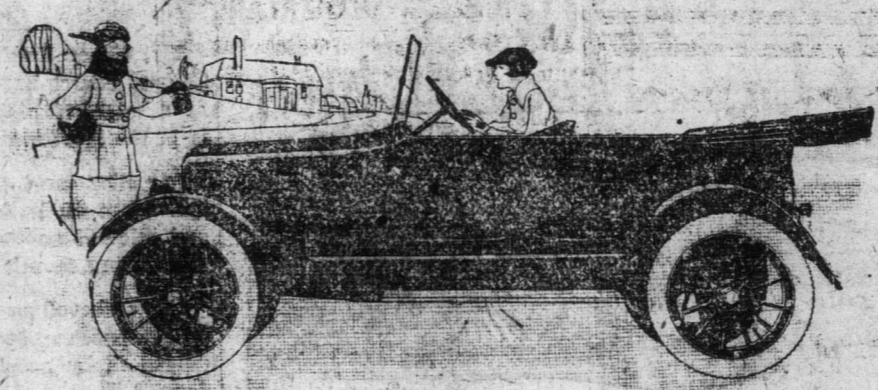

Make Small Loans To Help Workers

One Million Dollars Will Be Spent To Help Mechanics From Canadian Relief Fund

Rehabilitation of Poland's middle class of mechanics, artisans and small tradesmen, ruined by the war, by expending \$1,000,000 through small loans, is the plan of Dr. Boris D. Bogen, Director-General of Jewish Relief Work in Poland, is now working on, as one of the main features of the reconstructive relief program now being carried on in that country.

In line with Dr. Bogen's reconstruction policy, an appropriation of \$250,000 for use as small loans to aid in rehabilitation work, was included in the March expenditures of \$710,000 for Poland, by the Joint Distribution Committee, relief disbursing organization of the Canadian Jewish War Relief and its allied bodies.
