**The Police of the Fatherland**

The police force of the "Fatherland" is recruited from the non-commissioned officers of the Army, and the German policeman rules the streets as he once ruled the drill-ground. He is apt to be encouraged in his exaggerated notions of his importance by the fact that anyone resenting his rudeness may be severely punished for want of respect for the law. The policeman is an official of the State, and the municipalities have no control over him; but it is he who sees that the local regulations for the maintenance of order and health are carried out to the letter. Dustbins must be placed on the pavement at the time fixed, neither earlier nor later. Flower-pots must not be left standing on window-sills, lest they should fall and break somebody's head. Chimney's must be swept every four weeks in winter and every six in summer. In some German towns the butcher's boy is not allowed to carry meat on the causeway. In others the length of a lady's gown is regulated at the police station and she is fined if her skirts touch the ground. Skating is not allowed till the crust of ice agrees to a millimetre with the thickness prescribed. Workmen have to keep "service books" in which testimonials from employers are recorded and certified by the police. Those of servant-girls describe their hair, complexion, etc. etc., and they are not engaged till their mistress has filed up several forms for the police. A complete record of the career of every German is kept at the police-station of his native town. The stranger, on arrival, is presented with a form on which he must give full

particulars of himself, and state who his father and mother were, and where they were born. And if any Englishman wishes to provoke fury, let him sit down on a bench in a German park and put his legs on the seat.

**Live Cod.**

The difficulties for finding a market for fresh cod at any distance from the fishing grounds can be gauged by a perusal of the following extract from the Fishing-Gazette:

"Some fifteen years ago the Gloucester Fresh Fish Co. was organized and \$75,000 raised by public subscription for the purpose of marketing the Gloucester fresh fish. The enterprise failed. Recently, however, new men and new methods in the inshore fresh fish industry have come to the fore. Gloucester is again seen to be not unsuited by reason of location for a market headquarters for fresh fish. Three years ago, says the Boston Globe, Capt. Atwood, a native of Cape Cod, who had embarked in the fisheries on the Great Lakes, conceived the idea of applying the methods of fishing adopted on these inland waters to the New England coast fisheries. He sought Gloucester with his three small steamers. The lake idea is to get out in the morning and return before night with the catch, marketing them "alive," as the fishermen term it. From the first this fishery was a success—so much so that others on the lakes who watched the experiment have also made the voyage down the St. Lawrence and joined his fleet, which now numbers about twenty boats. More than that, local fishermen have been converted to the idea. More of the lake fishermen are coming with their boats, and instead of making the slow journey down the St. Lawrence and the Atlantic seaboard, the railroads have built low-floored cars on which the boats are transported under bridges."

**The Butler Case.**

To-day Mrs. Butler was in court, the term of the adjournment of her case having expired. She is charged with the larceny of a quantity of goods, the property of persons at present unknown. In the absence of Mr. R. A. Squires, her counsel, Mr. W. J. Higgins appeared for her, and on his request a further adjournment was taken until February 7th, and she was released on a renewal of her bonds.

**SEALING AGREEMENT.**

In the Fishermen's Advocate of today, there appears the following agreement, which was made this week, between the sealing owners and the Fishermen's Union. The agent of one sealing firm is, we understand, waiting for an authorization to sign it.

**AGREEMENT:**

It having been represented to the owners of the Sealing fleet that certain matters affecting the comfort and well-being of the men forming the crews of the Sealing Steamers, required consideration, a meeting was held on Tuesday, January 9th, 1912, at the office of A. Harvey & Co., at which were present:—Hon. W. C. Job (representing the steamers owned and managed by Messrs. Job Brothers & Co., Ltd.); Mr. J. S. Munn, (representing the steamers owned and managed by Messrs. Bowring Brothers Ltd.); Mr. J. C. Hepburn, (representing the steamers owned and managed by Messrs. Murray & Crawford); Mr. A. J. Harvey, (representing the steamers managed by Messrs. A. Harvey & Co., and Mr. W. F. Coaker, representing the Fishermen's Protective Union of Newfoundland on behalf of the men.

After consideration of the several points in which it was contended or on behalf of some of the crews that alteration and amendment were required, it was agreed as follows:—  
**Accommodation of the crews of steel ships.**—That in order to prevent discomfort from the moisture caused by condensation on the steel plates in the part of the ship devoted to the accommodation of the men, the sides of the ship would be sheathed with wood internally, and the decks, where no already permanently sheathed, shall be sheathed over with three inch planks properly secured.  
That where possible, for the seal fishery of 1912, and in all cases no later than the seal fishery of 1913, all steel sealing ships shall be fitted with portable iron frame berths.  
That the companion ways in the hatches shall, so far as it is possible, do so, be boarded in, in order to shield the occupants of the accommodation from draughts and rain & snow.  
That the accommodation in all the steel ships shall be heated by steam pipes so far as it can conveniently be managed for the seal fishery of 1912 and that all of the steel ships shall be so heated not later than the season of 1913.

**Provisions.**—That if it be found practicable, soft bread to the amount of not less than one-pound loaf three times each week shall be served out to each member of the crew, and if this be found impracticable, soft bread shall be supplied to as near this extent as can be arranged.  
That beef, pork, potatoes and pudding shall be supplied for dinner three times in each week.  
That stewed beans shall be supplied for breakfast daily.  
That onions, potatoes and turnip shall be some of the ingredients in the pea soup supplied on Saturdays.  
That the allowance of butter shall

The owners agree to provide in the steel ships a room for the accommodation of any men who may become sick or disabled, and to arrange that where practicable, men that may become sick or disabled in the wooden ships shall be transferred to the steel ships belonging to the same firm, so that they may have the use of those rooms and the benefit of medical care and attendance.

**Disabled Ship Coming Along.**

The s.s. Dart, belonging to the Mercantile Shipping Co. of Hartlepool, England, is now off the coast, being towed to this port by the C. P. R. liner s.s. Mount Temple. The news came to Montreal by wireless to the C. P. R. agent, who wired it here to the Reid Mfd. Co's. local agents for the C. P. R. The steamers were 70 miles off Cape Race last evening and should be in sight this evening.

**The Kanawha's Danger.**

## The Steamer Kanawha.

The general belief is that the interior of the s.s. Kanawha, which arrived here yesterday with a bad list to starboard, is badly damaged by the fire which broke out on board Sunday night last. The blaze started in No. 2 hatch and entered No. 3 before it was got under control by the crew. What caused the flames to spread so rapidly was a considerable amount of sulphur and acids which were amongst the 1,500 tons of cargo on board. In the storm, and while the ship wallowed in the sea, the cargo was thrown about and the friction caused by the packages rubbing against each other started the fire. The ship's pumps flooded the hold with water, all of which went to starboard and hoisted her over to an angle of 45 degrees on that side. For quite a while the vessel was almost unmanageable, and with the list and covered with ice, the crew could get about only at great risk; and the wonder is, all things considered, that the ship did not founder. Signals were placed in the rigging to warn any ships which might approach to render aid to give the vessel a "clear gangway," as there was a danger if a vessel came too near of the Kanawha getting out of hand and colliding with any such well-intentioned stranger. When these ships carry explosives, as did the Kanawha, they are always kept carefully stowed in a magazine specially set apart for them and unless the fire got beyond control of the crew, the danger of an explosion was not imminent. The ship has 1,500 tons cargo on board, a considerable portion of which has been damaged. She hauled into the Furness Co's pier this morning where the water will be pumped out and the cargo will be partly discharged and trimmed so that the vessel will lay on an even keel.

### Won't Modify His Plans.

LONDON, Jan. 19.

It has been ascertained from official quarters that the Rt. Hon. Winston Churchill declines to modify his plans and will fulfil his engagements to speak at Belfast on Home Rule, notwithstanding the threats against him. Preparations for the meeting, which is to be held on Feb. 28, continue. John Redmond is to speak at the same meeting. The Unionists promise that steps will be taken to prevent the meeting being held. Mr. Hon. Walter Runciman, President of the Board of Agriculture, speaking at Newcastle last night, said that Lord Londonderry, ex-Viceroy of Ireland, was at the head of the conspiracy to prevent free speech at Belfast. If bloodshed resulted, he declared that the responsibility would be Londonderry's.

### Trench Wanted to Suicide.

BERLIN, Jan. 19.

Capt. Bernard Frederick Trench, of the British Royal Marine Infantry, who was found guilty a year ago of espionage upon the German fortifications at Borkum, and sentenced to four years' imprisonment in a fortress, attempted suicide by hanging yesterday, according to a despatch from Graetz. Capt. Trench was condemned together with Lieut. Brandon of the British Navy. They were arrested at Borkum on August 10th. Trench is a grandson of Lord Ash-ton.

### Lost With All Hands.

SWANSEA, Jan. 19.

An unknown steamer was sunk with all hands near this harbor during the night owing to a collision with the Cunard Line steamer Voya, from Liverpool. The Voya, which arrived in the harbor with damaged bows, cruised several hours following the collision about the spot where the disaster occurred, but was unable to find any trace of the survivors or of the wreck. The lost vessel was a small one, probably carrying a crew of about a dozen men.

### Another Frenchman Captured.

TUNIS, Jan. 19.

An Italian destroyer seized the French steamer Manouba, bound from Marseilles to Tunis, having on board fifty passengers, including 29 Turkish nurses. The Italian officers who made the seizure stated that the "nurses" were disguised Turkish officers.

### Causing Anxiety.

LONDON, Jan. 19.

The fact that the Duke and Duchess of Connaught will not visit Washington while in the States is causing some anxiety here, although there must be some good explanation for this decision. It is usual for Royal personages visiting foreign countries, even semi-officially, to pay respect to the head of the nation of which they are guests. The Duke has the reputation of always doing the right thing, and the people here refuse to believe that he is now making a mistake.

### Turks and Arabs Attack Italians.

TRIPOLI, Jan. 19.

A terrific attack was made by a large body of Turks and Arabs yesterday on an Italian column, which was on march ten miles from the town of Tripoli. The details of losses are not reported.

### Nunnery Burnt in Montreal.

MONTREAL, Jan. 19.

St. Anne's Nunnery at St. Jacques and L'Anglinan Streets has been destroyed by fire. Thirty nuns and one hundred children escaped. The loss is \$50,000.

### The Dunure From Bahia.

VESSEL HAS STORMY VOYAGE AND SUSTAINS MUCH DAMAGE.

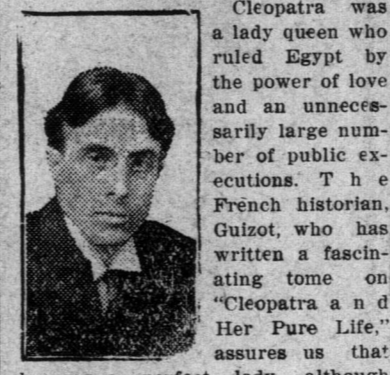
The barque, Dunure, Capt. Hartery, arrived at Bowring Bros. from Bahia at 4.30 p.m. yesterday after a very stormy voyage, and after sustaining much damage.

The ship left Bahia on December 4th, and in 10 days was off the port of Pernambuco, and later ran up to 2 degrees west of Bermuda having had fine weather up to that point. She reached that neighbourhood two weeks ago. For 10 days afterwards a pronounced change occurred in the weather and storms of such violence have rarely been recorded in Captain Hartery's experience; gale succeeded gale from the W. N. W. with an E. S. E. sea which was naturally of a confused character and for that period of time an awful ordeal was the portion of captain and crew. The broad expanse of the ocean was whipped into seething foam which was driven like drift over the devoted ship and occasionally spray crested combers hurled themselves on board and with such force that steel stays 2 inches in circumference were snapped off like so much pack thread. For this period of 10 days the vessel was hoisted to and drifting, it being impossible to keep sail on her with any degree of safety. As this occurred, she carried only a weather cloth in the mizen rigging. When the storm had reached its zenith the foretop galantmast snapped and had to be sent down and was later repaired and held intact for the remainder of the run. In addition to this casualty one big sea which swept in had concentrated its force on the poop deck, starting the seams in the deck, bursting in the windows of the cabin, flooding that apartment with water and putting out the fire besides saturating everything there with water. Repairs were made as promptly and expeditiously as the weather would permit, the apertures made by the sea being covered by canvas. The fore, main and foretop-sail stays were snapped off and other parts of the rigging burst and had to be repaired to enable the ship to continue the voyage. Strange to say the last three days of the run were marked by summer-like weather, but just preceding that intense frost prevailed. Three days ago while the vessel was passing over St. Pierre Bank the crew tried for codfish over the ship's side and fished 12 fine specimens, some of which were cooked and proved to be a pleasing addition to the larder. When the sea struck the cabin and did such damage to it, one of the doors striking Steward Lamb hurt him rather severely about the hands.

The Dunure will need some repairs before again putting to sea.

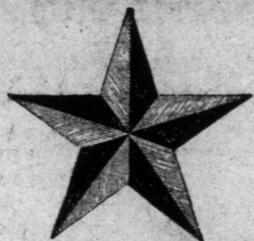

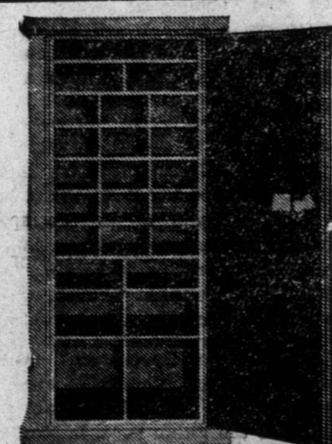
