When Lang went to California the State Health Department made a verified statement that he was in an advanced

state of tuberculosis. The last injection was given over two weeks ago. Lang has gained twelve pounds in weight since that time, and says he feels as well as ever.





WASHINGTON, April 29. Britain is again pressing Guatemala for satisfaction for the long standing claims of British subjects. The atention of the State department has been directed to the situation by the Guatemalan minister here, and the outsome is expected to develop some measure, indicative of the Administration's policy towards Central American republics and their foreign debts. A loan of \$20,000,000 by American banking houses has been under way for some time, but never consummated. With its proceeds it was proposed to pay Guatemala's British debts, and reform the currency system. The delay has been irritating to both Britain and the United States.
