

Ottawa, August 7.—The financial problem of raising war funds is one of the most serious questions confronting the Cabinet. According to the financial statement covering the first four months of the present fiscal year, as issued to-day, there was an increase in the net debt of the Dominion during the past month of no less than \$12,492,189. This indicates that even under ordinary conditions expenditures are considerably more




