





Dr. Blackall Lecture

AT LLEWELLYN CLUB. Dr. W. W. Blackall gave an interesting lecture at Llewellyn Club langification of the Untrodden Paths of Newfoundland." Rev. Dr. Jones presided and introduced the lecturer who

sided and introduced the lecturer who was, however, well known to all present. Dr. Blackall, explaining to the gathering that in saying "untrodden paths" he did not use the word in the literal sense, but meant places which are extremely isolated. His idea was to give a description of a tour which he made as Supt. of the C. of E. Schools around the great northern peninsula. Leaving the city, he described the various points of interest along the railway to Bay of Islands, where he joined the steamer at Humalong the railway to Bay of Islands, where he joined the steamer at Humbermouth for Trout River. The scenery along the route and the industries carried on at various places were fully described. At Goose Brook he witnessed the coal boring operations where most of the coal is found in the country, but owing to its shallow layers, though they are distributed over ers, though they are distributed over a wide area, its working would be difficult and costly. The condition of the people at the different places and the natural beauties were fully described. Owing to pressure of time Dr. Blackall had to discontinue his address at a point law and the scribe of the people with t

address at a point known as Lobster Head, but will continue the story at a later date.
