# The Cholera. Fire in New York.

Madrid, July 26 .- The Insurgents at ttack the German frigate now in that harbour, but it is believed they will not carry out their design, as their vessels are not properly supplied with either officers, men, or engineers.

A report is in circulation at Paris to-day that the French Government had determind to recognise the belligerency of the Carlists, but it is pronounced this even-ing to be without foundation.

At a meeting of the Spanish Liberals At a meeting of the Spanish Liberals namely, Yale first, Wesleyan second, and sojourning at Biarritz, France, over which Marshal Serrano precided, it was resolved to offer, through Admiral Topete, their support to Senor Salmeron in his efforts io restore order in Spain. The Liberal leaders in this city also held a similar character.

Madrid, July 27 .- The Cortes has delared itself in favour of the abolition of The Carlist force which was threatening Bilboa has retired from the neighborhood. Don Carlos is reported at Arcos in the Province of Logrong. The rail-way from Madrid to Valencia has been cut in several places.

The Government troops attacked Valencia yesterday. After a desperate strug-gle of five hours, fighting was suspended, and the insurgents offered to capitulate, but their terms were refused, the Govern ent demanding an unconditional surre ment demanding an unconditional surren-der. Heavy reinforcement have been sent forward, and the' stiack will be resumed and the town bombarded to-morrow if the insurgents do not yield. Seville has also proposed to return to its loyaity to the national Government on certain terms, but, as in the case of Valencie, the Government will accept nothing less than an unconditional surrender. It is believed the insurgent will scongrive up the city unless relieved. San s'erdinand was attacked on Friday by an insurgent column.
