MEMORITE EMIGRANTS.—A number of these very interesting emigrants passed through Guelph to-day on the ten o'clock train. We understand they were going to Berlin, where they will be settled for the winter.

COLLISION.—Some time during Wednesday evening as Mr. John Card, Guelph Township, was about starting for home, a cattle drover, whose name we did not learn, drove past and came in collision with Mr. Card's buggy, breaking the axle. Nobody was hurt.

She was engaged feeding the "picker" in Armstrong, McCree & Co's Woolen Factory, when by some means her hand was caught by the machinery and torn completely off. Dr. Keating was immediately sent for, and did what lay in his power to ease the sufferer.

Y. M. C. A.—The prayer meeting last night was conducted by the Rev. J. E. Laneley, and was well attended. We would also remind our readers of the 5th Anniversary to be held in Chalmers' Church to-night (Thursday), when the Rev. Dr. Castle, of Toronto, together with the several ministers in town, will address the meeting. The general annual report will also be read, and those interested in the Young Men's work would do well to attend.

An attempt at burglary was made on a house in the West Ward about half-past 6 last evening. One had obtained an entrance through the cellar window and as accomplice was secreted in the shed adjoining the house. The timely arrival of the lady of the house foiled their attempt, and a number of thieves or robbers in the vicinity yet. MEETING TO ORGANIZE COMMERCIAL CLASSES.—The Mechanics' Institute classes have been organized. Nearly forty names, which is the limited number, have been secured. Mr. Cann and Mr. Fraser, merchant, addressed the meeting at the Central School last night. The meeting was well attended, and the result highly satisfactory. The classes begin to work on Monday evening next at the Central School. These are to be paid to the Librarian, who is instructed to issue only forty receipts. Early attention to this matter is desirable for all who wish to secure their position in the classes.

DARING ROBBERY.—On Tuesday night, or early on Wednesday morning, the Galt Hotel was entered by some party or parties, and a Commercial traveller, named Chas. McDermid, was robbed of about sixty dollars, a gold watch and chain, and several other small articles. To-day Constable Klippert, of Berlin, assisted by Jas. Kirkpatrick, of Galt, arrested two men named Jno. Doyle and Jno. MacDonald, near Breslau; upon them were found two revolvers, and a roll of bills corresponding with the amount stolen from Mr. McDermid. They were tried before the Mayor at Galt and committed to Berlin gail until Monday next, for further examination.

BALNOREAL.—A station on the Grand Trunk Railway, bearing this high-sounding title, has recently been erected, in the Paisley Block, about five miles west of Guelph, and directly opposite the residence of John Hobson, Esq. Commodious buildings have been put up, switches of over half a mile in length have been constructed, and on the whole, the place presents quite a business appearance. The cost of the work will be about \$10,000. One of the principal reasons for making the above improvements is, the inconvenience experienced by not having a crossing place for trains from Guelph to Breslau, unaided by being often occasioned by the distance these two places are apart. The place will be opened for business in a short time, and it will be a great convenience to the people in that vicinity.

## Local and Other Items.

**THORNTON**, in the County of Grey, has given notice of their intention to apply at the next session of Parliament, for an Act to incorporate as a town.

**STEAMER ASHORE.**—The steamer *Freeland*, bound from Goderich to Berlin, was ashore about 12 miles from Bayfield on Tuesday night, about 2 o'clock, in a heavy gale. She is high and dry on the beach; there are prospects of getting her off again if the weather abates. No lives were lost.

**THE KOMOKA DISASTER.**—The case of McKellar vs. the Great Western Railway for injuries received by the burning car disaster at Komoka, occupied the Court at London, on Wednesday. The Great Western paid \$7,400 into Court as compensation, but the plaintiff demanded a much larger sum. The verdict is not yet rendered.

**THE HAMILTON CONSPIRACY CASE.**—Geo. Gillespie, the Hamilton baker, who swore out the *capias* against Elder, in the recent conspiracy case at Hamilton, and who has been prosecuting Elder for slander, was on Monday arrested on a charge of perjury, and is now lying in "duress vile," awaiting trial at the coming Assizes in that city.

**DWELLING BURNED.**—On Wednesday morning about three o'clock, the residence of Mr. John Nelson, Toronto Township, was totally destroyed by fire. The wind was high at the time, and very little was saved. The origin of the fire is unknown, but it is supposed to be a defective chimney. Loss about \$1,500; insured in the Canada Farmer's Mutual for \$800.

**MONTREAL PORT.**—Number of vessels arrived in port during the past season, up to 1st instant, 684; tonnage, 399,647. Number for 1873, 665; tonnage, 385,705. Steamships arrived during the same period, 247, compared with 227 for the previous season. Number of inland vessels in 1874, 6,043; 1873, 6,076, showing a decrease of 33. Revenue of port for 1874, \$238,858; for 1873, \$174,761; increase, \$24,097. Foreign tonnage for 1874, \$174,000 last year to \$192,728.

**DOMESTIC SERVANTS IN THE STATES.**—The other day the *New York Herald* contained four hundred advertisements, occupying some six columns, from females seeking employment, chiefly as domestic servants. The pressure in that direction appears to be still increasing, for the number of columns has now reached ten. On the other hand, those who want servants have diminished in number to only twenty-four or twenty-five advertisers. Even in Chicago we notice in the last number of the *Tribune* that those who want places now exceed, by one half, those who seek servants.

**MELANCHOLY AND FATAL ACCIDENT.**—While the down mail train from Bruce Sound was approaching Shelburne on Wednesday, the driver, Mr. William Thorpe, saw some cattle on the track, and in endeavoring to slacken the speed of his train by reversing of his engine, which completely wrecked his engine, and through the instructions of Mr. Weatherstone, Superintendent of the road, prompt attendance by Dr. Riddell, the Company's surgeon, who gave no hope of his recovery. He lived only twenty minutes after the train arrived at Shelburne. An inquest was held this evening by Dr. Carbert, which resulted in a verdict in accordance with the above facts. The unfortunate man was one of the oldest drivers on the line, and was highly respected.

**RATHER MIXED.**—The Editor of the *Melbourne Advertiser* has apparently mixed his drinks during the elections. Here is the latest bit of raving by that journal, being an obituary notice of Queen Victoria:—"Her reign has been marked as an era of great prosperity for her subjects; if her son and successor on the throne should not prove himself in all respects a good man, it will not be for want of excellent examples from his father and mother. The abilities of the Queen have been about on a par with those of most of the hereditary sovereigns of Europe, but it has been her good fortune to be surrounded by circumstances which prevented her doing much harm."

It is said that fully forty thousand people in Kansas and Nebraska are, or will shortly be, in want of the necessaries of life.

The Council of the Quebec Board of Trade, at a recent meeting, passed a resolution approving of Mr. Sewell's plan for winter navigation of the St. Lawrence.

The depth of water on the flats of Lake St. Peter is two feet and a half less than at this date last year, being only eleven feet six inches.

A Bill has passed the Oregon Senate which provides that husbands and wives without children may be considered divorced by simply ceasing to live together. This would receive the approval of the most advanced free lovers.

The engineers of the Stratford & Lake Huron Railroad arrived at Warton on Wednesday, having completed their survey to that place. They state that the line can easily be built.

Two London firms, Dranger & Meyer, and Adolph & Co., who have, for some time past, been doing extensive business in the ready made clothing line, have departed to the Dominions of Uncle Sam, leaving behind lasting mementoes, in the shape of about \$75,000 of clothes, pretty well distributed between Montreal, Hamilton, Toronto and London.

Syracuse, N.Y., Nov. 11.—Judge Wallace has issued a warrant in bankruptcy against the estate of the Rochester Locomotive Company.

When the Oswego express, on the Del. Lackawanna and Western Railway, arrived at Mauch Creek on Wednesday evening, it was discovered that the express car had been entered by robbers and the safe of Westcott & Co.'s Express Company thrown out. The robbers effected an entrance from the top of the car while the express messenger was in another car. It is not known what amount the safe contained; but somewhere from two to twenty thousand.

London, Nov. 12.—Dr. Kenealy in a letter excusing his non-attendance at a meeting of the Bar, announces that he has been debarred by the Benchers of Gray's Inn.

It is announced that two Irish Members of Parliament have fought a duel, and one is dangerously wounded.

Madrid, Nov. 12.—The Republicans lost 200 men in an attack on Mount Marco, on the 10th. The fight lasted four hours. On Wednesday morning the Republican army advanced in three corps; the right under General Loma, turned the position of the Carlists at Ovaruna; the left under Gen. Parilla, drove them from the mountains near the sea, turning their formidable trenches; the centre under Gen. Blanco suffered severely from the heavy fire. Towards one o'clock in the afternoon the Carlists abandoned all their positions and retired into Navarre. The garrison of Iron in the morning burned houses and barns belonging to Carlists, or which afforded them shelter. The havoc created was immense. All the country around was in flames. The story that Don Carlos was an Hendaye originated in an alleged telegram from the Spanish Consul at Bayonne.

London, Nov. 12.—A despatch from Vienna announces that diplomatic information has been received from Constantinople, to the effect that orders have been issued by the Porte to concentrate the Turkish troops near the Servian and Montenegrin frontiers, and that the Government of Jannina and Prizrend, in Albania, have been ordered to organize the Mohammedan inhabitants of the Province.

Madrid, Nov. 11.—The *Imparcial* declares that Don Carlos was at Hendaye, and the French authorities refused to interfere with his movements.

London, Nov. 11.—The first heavy frost of the season in Great Britain occurred last night.

Philadelphia, Pa., Nov. 12.—Father Gerdemann is reported to have sailed from New York on Wednesday. A Committee has been appointed by the congregation of St. Boniface Church, of which Gerdemann was pastor, to receive and pass upon all claims against the Church. The defalcation is said to amount to \$45,000, of which \$25,000 are in deposits and \$20,000 in accommodation notes.

THE REFORM ASSOCIATION. - At a large meeting of the Reform Association of this riding, held at Brighton, last week, at which many leading Conservatives were also present, Mr. James L. Biggar, the former member was unanimously requested to stand again for the riding and was promised the hearty support of most of the leading men of both sides of politics. Mr. Biggar was present and in accepting the nomination said he had never done so before with so much pleasure, as the new election law, the work of the present Administration, would afford an opportunity of proving that corruption did not exist and had never existed in that constituency. The writ has been issued, and the nomination fixed for the 21st inst. There is no doubt but that Mr. Biggar will be elected by a greater majority than any previous time.

The trial of the North Somerset Election case on Wednesday, resulted in the voiding of the election on the ground of corrupt practices by agents and the abandonment of the personal charges against the successful candidate, Mr. H. C. Cook. South Hinton. - At a meeting of the Reform Association for the South Riding of Hinton, held at Brucefield, Mr. Cameron was unanimously nominated as the Reform candidate at the approaching election for the House of Commons. The meeting was very enthusiastic and decided in its support of Mr. Cameron. Mr. Cameron was present and made a spirited address to the convention. His election by an increased majority is sure, and the Reform party of the County have determined that they shall not bear one cent of the expenses of the protest.

No. 10, Victoria street, is over. The case of bribery has been proved against the sitting Reform candidate, Mr. Macnamis. The election is void, by the consent of both parties, and a new election is ordered. The North Leeds and North Grenville election trial is ended, the election is declared void, and the Respondent, Dr. Ferguson, was not guilty of any corrupt practices.

At a public meeting held at Montigny, resolutions were unanimously passed urging the necessity of granting an amnesty towards those implicated in the North-west rebellion, and also asking the pardon of the survivors.

The opinion of the Legislature of N. S. Wales for 1875, will consist of 28 Republicans and 11 Democrats in the Senate, and 52 Republicans and 76 Democrats in the Assembly. The Democrats, therefore, have a majority of 20 in a joint ballot.

It is stated that the opponents of Presbyterianism, who are members of the old Kirk, have taken steps to test the legality of the mode in which the action of union was tried by the Synod, etc., concerning the disposal or transfer of territorialities.

Indications of a new epidemic, telerally known as tonsillitis, have been of frequent occurrence within the last few days in various quarters in New York. At Bellevue Hospital Wednesday, there were six new patients affected with the disease admitted to the wards, and many medical men are of opinion that it is spreading rapidly.

Recently a telegraphic clerk in France refused to telegraph a message in these words, "Third empire of John, verses 13 and 14," under the law which forbids the transmission of despatches not written in plain language. Reference to the text indicates that the despatch was merely an economy of words. The text is as follows: "I have many words to write, but I will not write with ink and pen; but I will write with the spirit of the Lord, and I will speak face to face."

A priest who was examining a confirmation class in the parish of Lonsdale, asked: "What is the sacrament of matrimony?"
