GUELPH, Aug. 17.—As a result of the commission appointed last March by the Ontario Government to inquire into the workings of the Agricultural College here, Prof. Sharman has resigned, and Prof. Shaw has been asked to resign. It will be remembered that there was an alleged difference between President Mills and these professors. Women Opposed to Militarism—A Permaucht Court of Arbitration.

CHICAGO, Aug. 17.—The feature of the Peace Congress yesterday was a paper by Mrs. Ormistoun Chant of London, holding that it is within the power of the women of the world to disband all armies and put an end to militarism. Plans are being perpared for a great petition from the Christian bodies of the world to Governments asking that arbitration for the settlement of all internal disputes be agreed upon.

A telegram concerning the outcome of an International Conference, which was sent to Queen Victoria and President Clevelland, was received. The text of the message was read to the congress by William Penn Nixon, and the motion to send it at once passed unanimously and with much enthusiasm by those in the hall. The joint messages read as follows: "To Her Majesty the Queen of Great Britain and Ireland and to Grover Cleveland, President of the United States—TheWorld's Peace Congress of Chicago sends equal congratulations to Great Britain and America on the triumph of arbitration as a substitute for war, exemplified in the recent Behring Sea decision, cementing the friendship of both nations and full of happiest augury for mankind."






