Exemptions in Buffalo. The Buffalo Times is just now canvassing the clergymen of that city as to their opinions of the exemption of church property from taxation.

Mr. John T. Moore and some others gave audience to before Sir Oliver Mowat and the other members of the Government a few weeks ago. Those who favor exemptions do not do so for the reason urged in this city, viz., that it is sacrilegious to tax the house of God.

Trustee James B. Stafford of the Methodist Episcopal Church, reported to the wealthiest congregation in the city, said, "that it would be entirely proper if the churches were taxed on their assessed valuation."

The Rev. Walter North, rector of St. Luke's Episcopal Church, said: "I have no objection to making church property property so long as the tax applies to all denominations, and there are some classes of property which it seems to me ought to be taxed."

Dr. Mitchell, occupying the pulpit of one of the most wealthy churches of Buffalo, preached a sermon against the principle of exemption. "Why," said he, "should we occupy this beautiful church edifice without bearing our proper share of the tax burden?"

Rev. Herbert G. Lord, pastor of the Church of the Redeemer, said: "I want the church to be completely free from state interference, and the state put where any favoritism for political reasons to any sect shall be impossible."

Rev. W. C. Wilbur, pastor of the Richmond-avenue M.E. Church, said that until recently he was always opposed to the taxation of church property, but the more I think about it I am convinced that it isn't unreasonable. The tax might tend to the erection of less expensive churches, but the real means of accomplishing good would be just as great.

The Rev. Henry E. S. Somerville, rector of St. Andrew's Church, the largest Episcopal congregation on the East Side, says: "It is not justice that the people who get the advantages of the church—the members of the congregation, I mean—should stand the taxation."

Rev. Father Cronin, the editor of The Catholic Union and Times, a very eminent Catholic authority, announced in his paper that the Catholic community was quite as ready for church taxation as the Protestant church societies could possibly be.

The Rev. George Whisman of the Cedar-street Baptist Church says: "I am not entirely decided in my judgment in reference to the taxation of church property, but I have a strong inclination in favor of such a proceeding. The argument that seems to me most influential is the argument drawn from the support of justice. More than half of the population of our country are connected with no church, and many are not in sympathy with our religion. To exempt our church properties from taxation is to ask those people to share in our Christian burdens, which seems an injustice. Then, again, I believe as possible, church and state separate; and that it is our religion to support. History has ver State aid has been granted the grant has been abused, and the bulk of the support has gone to that sect which has had the least conscience in accepting the aid, and is going it against the interests of the least favored bodies of Christians.

It will be observed that the opinions announced in these interviews are wholly different from the opinions that a big majority of the clergymen of Toronto hold on this question. The World has not quoted all the interviews that appeared in The Times. Fully three-quarters of the clergymen whose views are given in The Times are opposed to exemptions, and for the reasons above given. Those who favor exemptions do so in a very mild and inoffensive fashion. They feel they have neither right nor justice on their side. They do not attempt to defend the system on its merits.

The most serious objections to the proposed Insolvency Act are the provisions in regard to the appointment of an official receiver upon the declaration of insolvency. The receiver is an officer of the court and is authorized to take possession of the estate, prepare inventories and issue a statement of the assets and liabilities and so on. The act fails to give creditors sufficient control of the estate. The official receiver has twenty days in which to handle an estate, and during this time he is not obliged to call a meeting of creditors. The business community is opposed to this feature of the bill. The official receiver is not necessarily the officer who will finally dispose of the estate. When the creditors meet they may, and in most instances probably would, appoint an assignee of their own to wind up the affairs. The act therefore burdens the estate with the expense of two officials when one is quite sufficient. What business men want is to get immediate control of the insolvent's estate and have an assignee appointed who shall manage the business and charge a reasonable rate for his services. They fear the official receiver has power in his hands to saddle the estate with a large bill of costs without benefitting the condition of the estate.

On the 16th inst. at Glasgow. Ald. Bailey ought to communicate with some of the English and Scotch cities for information that will be of service to the Gas Commission. Glasgow, for instance, is a city from which Toronto can derive many useful pointers, not only as to gas, but to other municipal questions. In 1869 the city purchased its gas plant from a private corporation and began the manufacture of gas in the interest of the consumer at rather than the consumer of dividends. The total outlay at the time was about \$2,600,000, and they made great improvements, so as to about double this sum. It now owns three large establishments and the consumption has increased 140 per cent. in twenty years, while the population has increased but twenty per cent. From \$1.14 per 1000 feet, which was the rate to which the city reduced the price during the first year, the city has been able to reduce the price to 68 cents a thousand, while the quality has been much improved. During all these successive reductions the city has steadily made money, has paid interest charges, written off large sums for depreciation of the value of works and accumulated a sinking fund of more than \$1,000,000. The net debt, which in 1875 reached \$5,300,000, has been reduced to \$2,400,000, while the value of the works is easily three or four times that sum. Cheap gas has been an enormous boon to Glasgow, where the gloomy winter climate necessitates a large use of artificial illumination. It has enabled the poor to make their homes bright, warm and cheerful. The city has aimed rather to furnish a cheap light than to attempt a rapid debt reduction. The result of this wise and humane policy has been to more than double the supply per capita, with an increase of the comfort and happiness of the working people.

The day for Yankee sneers at the English House of Lords has gone by. Their own upper chamber has recently fallen into even greater disrepute than that which surrounds the House of Commons. According to Harper's Weekly, an admitted high authority, the Senate is really much more obnoxious than the Peers to the charge of caring nothing for the country and of being virtually irresponsible to the people. The Senators are credited with the most personal and sordid motives in their treatment of the Wilson bill. Of the two Upper Houses, the House of Lords is not at the present moment the more scandalous nor the more scandalous.

ETIQUETTE OF CARD LEAVING. Some Mooted Points in This Matter. Questioned Matter Discussed. The question of card leaving is like the post always with you. There seems on some points connected with it no authority that may be regarded as final. Consequently the presentation of various dictators has its advantages, giving one at least an excuse for erring.

A compiler of a recent book upon the subject discusses some of the intricacies of card-leaving in print. As, for example,—"When sisters live together, two, or even three, it is difficult to be absolutely certain as to the number of cards to leave. For one thing, age gives individuality to unmarried ladies, and in these days they acquire it at a very early age, while, fortunately, not living together. Each one has friends of her own, and distinct from her sisters'. When this is the case one should leave one card for her own and one of her husband's cards; but when the three sisters are acquaintances of a caller, a card should be left for each of them, and a card of a husband; but should one sister act as the hostess of the house, she should leave one card for the other two cards should be left upon her only, with the corner of the lady's card turned down. As regards the sisters' cards, if still very young, their names should be on one card; if not, they should have been placed on the card for the two or even one for each, when calling on their relative, or he could leave cards for them if not acquainted with their hostess or relative.

"When an unmarried lady is calling on a married couple, she should leave what cards should she leave. She can leave one for the mother and one for the father, and one for the mother with the corner turned down; but she must not leave a card for the husband because ladies do not leave cards upon married ladies, and only upon bachelors and widowers after entertainments given by them at which they have been present.

"When should P. C. cards be left and when not? On the occasion of a long absence of over three months or leaving town at the close of the season; on leaving a neighborhood where you have resided for years, or where you have resided for months and sometimes only for weeks, but not when changing houses in the same neighborhood, town or even district, not even when about to be married, unless the future home is to be in another city. 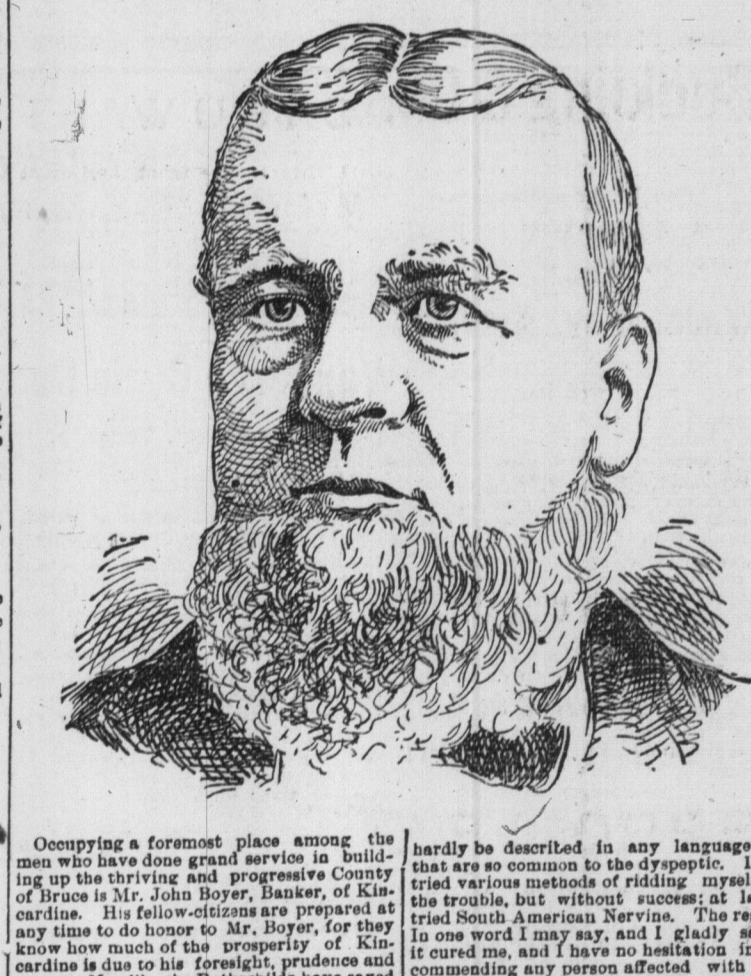
