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WHEN BIGAMY IS NOT BIGAMY.

If a Married Man Weds Another Woman in the U.S. Canadian Law Cannot Punish Him.

Benjamin Plovman, the Weston tanner, did not commit bigamy when he married Matilda Dixon at Detroit in May, 1893, although at the time he had a wife living in Canada.

The act says: Bigamy is an act by a person, who, being married, goes through a form of marriage with any other person in any part of the world.

Lawyer Du Verne argued that if a British subject married in another country he could be punished if he returned.

The decision overrules the judgment of the Divisional Court, and it came up yesterday.

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KILLED FOR THE INSURANCE

A CASE RESEMBLING THAT OF THE FAMOUS DR. MEYER.

Grand Jury in Philadelphia Returns a True Bill Against a Woman and a Man for Obtaining Insurance by Fraud - Did the Widow Help to Poison Her Husband?

Philadelphia, Nov. 19.-The grand jury this afternoon returned true bills of indictment against Herman Metzger, alias H. H. Hoines, who is under arrest at Boston; J. D. Howe, a St. Louis lawyer, and Mrs. Carey A. Howe, alias Cook, for fraudulently obtaining \$10,000 insurance from the Fidelity Mutual Life Association of this city upon the death of B. F. Pitzer.

Immediately following the finding of the indictment the insurance association received word of the arrest of St. Louis of Howe, and of the capture in Philadelphia of the woman, who to-day confessed the conspiracy. Steps have been taken to extradite the accused.

While the indictments do not charge murder, the authorities believe it is shown at the trial that Pitzer was done away with either intentionally or by accident. At the coroner's inquest upon the body of the accused Pitzer in this city, a verdict was rendered that he came to his death from congestion of the lungs, caused by inhaling fumes of poisonous drug, and his body was interred in the potter's field. The face was badly burned. The body was subsequently exhumed and identified by the alleged relatives of the Pitzer. The amount of the insurance policy was then paid to the woman. The insurance association afterwards became suspicious and its investigation led to the present developments.

Vice-President McKnight of the Fidelity Association stated to-day: "It was a conspiracy and possibly an accidental murder. One theory is that Pitzer was induced to submit to chloroform in order that he might be painlessly placed with him in bed, and shown a physician. After the physician had gone a dead body similarly marked could be put in bed, and the physician could be deceived into the notion that his patient had died. The other theory is that Pitzer really died as the result of his treatment, and it is this possibility which leads to the suspicion of murder."

Holmes or Mudgett was interviewed in Boston, and declares that Pitzer is still alive, or was about the middle of October, when he last saw him at Detroit. The woman also declared to the best of her knowledge and belief that her husband is alive.

TO ABOLISH TOLLGATES.

Motion to this Effect to Be Made in York County Council.

At the November meeting of the York County Council yesterday John McPherson, vice of East Toronto village, occupied his seat for the first time.

Promptly at 2 o'clock Warden Donald McDonald (Georgina) took his seat and called the meeting to order.

These communications were read and referred to their proper committee: From Thomas Caswell, City Solicitor, asking for an assignment of the county's interest in the agreement between the Mimic Electric Railway Company and the County of York, whereby the company acquired the right to operate on the Lake Shore. The president of the railway company refused to recognize that agreement and says it is not binding upon his company. The solicitor further states that he has been informed that the track in a terrible condition, and the company requests them to put it in order, and asks for an assignment of the county's interest in the agreement, so that the city may be in a position to enforce the agreement.

From J. K. McDonald, County Treasurer, asking the council to postpone the sale of lands for taxes for this year, and thus afford him time to get a better description of the lands, and avoid what has been necessary the past two years, viz., the withdrawal of hundreds of parcels after the expense had been incurred. The lands liable for sale this year are almost entirely those growing out of the sub-division of farm lots in the front part of Etobicoke, York and Scarborough, and the descriptions are so imperfect as to make it almost impossible to sell.

From Mrs. Daniel Dineen, asking for a rebate of tax of No. 1, tollgate, Dundas-street, claiming there has been great falling off in travel, occasioned by the making of the new road across the river.

From S. T. Hummerstone, stating that he had made application at the County Treasurer's office for information concerning certain securities said to have been made by the council, and that he was unable to procure the desired information. The treasurer afterward wrote to apply to him to whom a ratepayer is to apply for information concerning payments that have not been audited, and further stated that if the treasurer had produced his cashbook for inspection he might have been enabled to get some light on the matter, but the cashbook was not produced.

From W. Bannin enclosing a statement of the receipts and expenditures of the Teachers' Institute of the northern division of York County. The receipts amounted to \$190.75, and the expenditures \$127.22, leaving a balance on hand of \$62.53.

From C. Britnell & Co., asking for \$1200 for extra labor on the stone abutments of the Russell bridge at Wood-bridge.

D. Evans, Etobicoke, commissioner for Dundas-street, presented his report, which showed an expenditure since the year to Nov. 1, \$1721.12, in order to keep within his appropriation he had to leave the purchase of stone until after Feb. 1 next. He reported the section in good condition.

The Weston High school report showed that \$350 had been received for fees.
