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THE BLUE RUIN KNIGHT.

Sir Richard Wound Up the Address—The House Afloat of Mr. ...

When the House resumed at 8.30, Sir Richard Cartwright was soon on his feet to reply to the brilliant speech of Mr. Foster.

He described that speech as rambling, its logic was false and its facts false. He threw back Mr. Foster's argument that the Liberal party had not fulfilled its pledges.

He excused the increased expenditure of the Government by declaring that in every direction progress had been made that warranted the expenditure.

This was his reply to the charge that he who used to cry "blue ruin" when economy was not on the boards, had changed his tune.

He announced his intention to speak chiefly of the country and agriculture, and in support of a theory of a tariff and anti-foreign speech, which he frequently applauded by both sides of the House.

A string on his loyalty. The sending of a Canadian history, and a departure from Canadian history, was under consideration.

The Government was not to be reproached for the fact that it was a Canadian principle to be ready to do all whatever the Empire was ready to do.

Canada had gone far enough. In his opinion Canada had gone far enough in the imperial Government.

He was only too glad to see the Conservatives had no claims to the name of "imperialists."

He reached the height of his indignation when he declared that the Government was ready to take care of the interests of the members of the contingent.

Canada would not leave these to an insurance company, but would care for them as the Government should.

Afraid of Charlton. Mr. Charlton rose, and cried of "Question" from the Opposition side of the House.

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WHAT THE CONTINGENTS COST.

Governor-General's Warrants Were Issued for a Total of \$626,986—Other Unforeseen Expenditures.

Ottawa, Feb. 6.—(Special.)—Among the accounts of the Governor-General's warrants sent last evening, on Nov. 4, 1899, a warrant for \$250,000 was issued for military special service in South Africa.

Another warrant for \$250,000 for the same purpose was issued Jan. 5, 1900. The total expenditure in the matter was \$500,000.

WAS A CHUM OF TROOPER OLDBURY.

THE GARRISON AT CAIRO.

Mr. Robertson also told The World a few very interesting facts about the garrison at Cairo, or rather Abnassayeh, about five miles away. Not including native troops there are stationed there all the time over 5000 British soldiers, made up of one battalion of infantry, one regiment of cavalry, one battery of field artillery, one battery of mountain artillery and one of engineers.

THE TROOPER OLDBURY.

Trooper Oldbury, Toronto boy who was killed in the charge at Omdurman, was a chum of Mr. Robertson, and it was rarely on that same day that he was seen in the uniform of his corps and it is the first time it has ever been seen on the streets of Toronto.

NEW STATIONED IN IRELAND.

The 21st Lancers, a brigade of the Indian Army, ordered home from Egypt after an absence of 12 years, will be stationed in Ireland. Mr. Robertson will have to be on the 25th of this month, and will be accompanied by his furlough expires. He therefore, leaves Toronto on Saturday next and regrets that time will not permit him to see all his friends before going.

PRESENTATION OF MEDALS.

There will be a brigade parade of the city regiments at the Armouries on Friday evening next, the 9th inst., for the purpose of distributing the Canadian general service medals to the men who served in the Fenian Raid of 1866 and the Fenian Expedition of 1870. These medals are now in the hands of the commanding officers of the different regiments, and who wish to receive them will be notified in the presence of their old regiments and requested to be at the Armouries at 7.30 on Friday evening, so that they may be formed up with their old regiments.

U. S. HAS 100,000 FIGHTING MEN.

Washington, Feb. 6.—Secretary Root has sent to Congress an abstract of the military forces of the United States, showing the total number of men available for military service, but not including the regular army, and an aggregate organized strength of 100,383.

ICE IN NEW YORK HARBOR.

New York, Feb. 6.—For the first time this season ice covered the bay in the Upper and Lower Bay. At 7 o'clock it extended from the Battery to the lower bay, and no open water could be seen. The ice was soft, however, and did not seriously impede navigation.

THE NEW BANKRUPTCY ACT.

In compliance with the demand of the mercantile community of Canada and of such English-speaking provinces as do business with the Dominion, Mr. Maclean, the member for East York in the Dominion House of Commons, has given notice of a new Bankruptcy Act. This Act has been drawn with the view of providing machinery for securing to creditors a reasonable satisfaction of the assets of bankrupt debtors, and to those debtors a final release from liability, enabling them once more to start clear. There has been no insolvent act in Canada since 1860. The Insolvent Act of 1875 was a mere patchwork, and the new Act passed in England in 1897, and which has been heard of again. Creditors became tired of looking for dividends, and debtors found it so difficult to obtain a discharge, on account of the unnecessary shrinkage of their assets, that by common consent the act was repealed. It has been followed by a system of voluntary liquidation, furnished under the provincial statutes. After considerable judicial doubt and discussion, these statutes have been decided to be within the powers of the Local Houses. They are useful as far as they go, but they fall in the main element of binding all creditors of the insolvent. They bind only those creditors who agree to be bound, and any creditor outside of the jurisdiction has no right to claim to hold his judgment as long as the judgment lives, which is practically forever. It is, of course, still possible that a body of creditors and a debtor may agree to have a voluntary liquidation, and the new Act introduced by Mr. Maclean is not intended to interfere with such an arrangement. If a debtor can induce his creditors to give him time, that arrangement requires no statutory interference, but if the creditors and creditors cannot agree, then the new act allows, on proof of "certain acts of bankruptcy" by the debtor, the County Court in which the debtor resides to declare such debtor a bankrupt. Corporations are not provided for in the act, because the Dominion and Provincial Legislatures have passed Acts covering sufficiently the winding-up of companies. Partnerships, however, will be within the act. The draft bill is founded on the Imperial Bankruptcy Act, which has worked so well in England. It differs from the Imperial Act by omitting entirely any reference to voluntary assignments. In England the Imperial Parliament has jurisdiction over both matters, and perhaps the Dominion House would also have jurisdiction over both subjects if it assumed to exercise its full powers, but as voluntary liquidation seems to require no further Dominion legislation, it is not proposed to touch subject where it is at present. The act is satisfied that an act of bankruptcy has been committed an order in bankruptcy is made, a meeting of creditors is called by the trustee in England, and at that meeting a trustee is appointed by the court. A committee of inspection is also provided for if desired by the creditors. The consent of this committee is required for certain acts by the trustee. In ordinary matters the trustee is to be subject entirely to the order of the court; his powers are defined by the act. In order to prevent the malversation that took place under the old Insolvency system, an official receiver is to be appointed by the Comptroller in Bankruptcy in England, and he is to be called the Auditor in Bankruptcy. This official will be an officer of the Finance Department, and it will be his duty to examine and report upon the accounts of all trustees in England, and to certify to the court in the event of any malversation. These trustees are required to file their accounts to this officer periodically, in the same way as they do in England. It is the duty of the auditor to report to the court in the event of any breach of the law on the part of a trustee, and it is hoped that the knowledge of this liability will secure the choice of creditors of reliable trustees, while persons who are unreliable are much less likely to offer themselves than under the former system. When the estate is divided the bankrupt receives his discharge, but his discharge is given only on terms. The estate must have paid 25 cents on the dollar at least, and the judge of the court has the power to refuse a discharge in exceptional cases. Another provision is that a bankrupt cannot pay 25 cents on the dollar, but has given up all his property and paid as much as he can, the bankruptcy may be declared closed. The effect of closing the bankruptcy is that for three years thereafter claims proved under the bankruptcy Act remain alive and cease to bear interest. If the bankrupt, during the period of three years, can pay sufficient to make up 25 cents on the dollar, he is entitled to his discharge. If at the end of three years he has not paid 25 cents on the dollar, the matter is then brought before the court to be dealt with as the case may require. The bankrupt will not then be necessarily entitled to his discharge, but his creditors cannot pursue him except under order of the court, upon such terms as may be just. The draft bill does not include any provisions covering points of practice or procedure.

THE MAYOR SCORES A VICTORY.

It was not an insignificant victory that Mayor Macdonald scored in the Thompson investigation case. The contest was a tussle between the forces of the old school on the one hand, and those of the new regime on the other. Under the old idea it was the rule for aldermen and officials to stand in the face of the Mayor had it in their power to help aldermen in obtaining positions for their friends. The aldermen on the other hand could materially benefit the officials in more ways than one. The old idea was for the officials and the aldermen to stand with one another. The new policy is to keep the two forces asunder, to make the officials independent of the aldermen, and vice versa. Mayor Macdonald insisted that the court to investigate the charges against the chief clerk should not be composed of partisan aldermen, but of a disinterested judge. He was opposed by all of his fellow-councillors, who had the sympathy of nearly all of the city officials, and the support of a large part of the business community. The opposition the Mayor persisted in the policy he had laid down, and after a severe struggle he came off victorious. His victory is a subject for congratulation. If the representatives of the old order of things had been successful, it would have been an acknowledgment of the ascendancy of the John Shaw idea in the Council of 1900. But fortunately that still remains his grip, and the forces for good that swept the city of its old regime are still in the ascendant. Were it otherwise it would not augur well for civic legislation during the rest of the year.

REBELLION IN CUBA ANY DAY.

There is no doubt that a well organized movement is on foot to turn the Mayor down. Three at least of the city papers are lending themselves to the plot and doing their best to discredit Mr. Macdonald. The Mayor, however, has made no fall from grace up to date. On the contrary, he has done his best to carry out his election duties and what is more to the point, he has already accomplished not a little. This victory over the united forces of the Mayor's enemies is a notable achievement in itself. The public have taken a keen interest in this contest. They are almost unanimously in favor of the Mayor. His line of action. The Mayor can count upon the sympathy of the public as long as he studies the interests of the people and keeps true to his pledges. With the people on his side the Mayor can defy any terrorizer of the old guard. The good will of the people is the one thing Mayor Macdonald cannot afford to jeopardize. It is the only weapon he has to fight with. If he loses it, he loses all. As long as he retains it he will be invincible.

SEPARATE SCHOOL BOARD.

The question of the erection of a Building in St. Michael's Palace on the grounds of St. Michael's Palace was the most important matter before the Separate School Board at the meeting in the afternoon. The Archbishop of Toronto, who returned from Havana, St. Michael's School is in a bad condition and should be removed, the site and the building being unsuitable for present needs. St. Cecilia school was also in a poor condition. The Sites and Building Committee reported on the Archbishop's communication and recommended that a school be erected on St. Michael's Palace grounds, and that the site and building be sold. The report of the Sites and Building Committee was adopted. It contained the estimates for the two years amounting to \$80,000, which includes \$20,000 for two-roomed schools and sites and one of \$8000 for a four-room school and site.

"HOBBERLIN'S FIT" FITS.

Provision has been made that the Governor-General-in-Council shall provide all the detail necessary to carry out the system, by promulgating such rules as may be required to have the force of statutory effect. It has been thought better that the commercial world should understand the law and its operation in its main features, without having to be troubled by details of procedure. The selection of the County Court as the forum for bankruptcy matters is justified by precedent. Under the old Insolvency Act the County Court was made use of. It has also the great advantage of convenience, in that proceedings entered into in that court in Canada in which the debtor resides.

This act is a bold attempt to solve a much-felt difficulty. Hitherto the various drafts have been encumbered with innumerable clauses dealing with every possible contingency. The gist of the present act is in its being entirely confined to bankruptcy, and not in any way attempting to deal with voluntary assignments and in submitting the management of assets to the trustee to the direct control of the court, and finally in placing the trustees, so far as their financial methods are concerned, under the control of a responsible officer of the Government. No matter what system is introduced, if fraudulently applied by debtors, or harshly administered by creditors, it is bound to end in failure, but it is hoped that this act, as an attempt to assist the commercial credit of the Dominion, will be liberally and fairly administered.

THE MEDICAL COUNCIL BILL.

Kingston Medical and Surgical Society Have Suggestions in Regard to It—Other Kingston News. Kingston, Ont., Feb. 6.—At a meeting last night of the Kingston Medical and Surgical Society, the question of the proposed new Dominion Council was discussed. The society did not approve of the bill in its present form, and offered these suggestions: That the Dominion be divided into sections thus composed: Maritime Provinces, Quebec, Ontario, Manitoba, British Columbia and Northwest Territories, each having six representatives on council; that, following the precedent of Great Britain and Ontario, each university in Canada having a medical faculty, and teaching shall have one representative; that all written examinations be held simultaneously at each centre in the Dominion; that the fees of the candidates be paid by the candidates; that all practical and clinical examinations be held at the same centre in succession. A committee was appointed to have their views printed and sent to M.P., a medical school and other bodies. The committee will also go to Ottawa and oppose the bill before the Private Bills Committee.

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NEW YORK WON'T HAVE IT.

There Will Be No Reciprocity With Ontario Pharmacy Degrees in Future—Quebec Also Out of It. Little business of importance was discussed at the first session of the semi-annual meeting of the Council of the College of Pharmacy, which opened yesterday afternoon. The communications presented two questions of more than passing interest and both on the same lines. The first was a notice from the New York City Board of Pharmacy, informing the board that in future no foreign diplomas would be recognized by the New York Board, and that all candidates presenting themselves for registration would be compelled to pass the board examinations before being licensed. This decision will operate against Ontario graduates more than those from any other institution, as graduates from Ontario are much sought after by New York pharmacists, the freest reciprocity of diplomas having been enjoyed up to the present.

REBELLION IN CUBA ANY DAY.

There is a Placid Surface, But Underneath is a Feeling Which Bodes Ill. New York, Feb. 6.—"While there is a placid surface in affairs in Cuba," said Major W. B. Graham of the Engineers' Corps, "the situation is anything but placid. There is a feeling of rebellion in the air, and the Cubans want the Americans out of Cuba."
