WHOLE LAAGER CAPTURED.

London, April 29 .- Lord Kitchener reports to the War Office from Pretoria, under date of April 28, as follows : "Kitchener's fighting scouts, under Grenfell, have surprised and captured Van Rensburg's laager at Klipdam, north of Pietersburg.

"Seven Boers were killed and 37 taken prisoners. "Eight thousand rounds of ammunition and all the wagons, carts, oxen, horses and mules were captured.

"Our only casualty was one wounded. "The other columns report three killed, 58 taken prisoners.

"Fifty-seven surrendered and one quick-firer captured."

Cape Town, April 29 .- A party of Boers blew up the railroad between Graspan and Belmont, Cape Colony, in three places, April 27, apparently with the intention of intercepting a train carrying Mr. Cecil Rhodes. The damage done was slight, and was quickly repaired.

BOERS FOR BERMUDA.

Hamilton, Bermuda, April 29.-There is considerable excitement at present in Bermuda over the expected arrival of 1700 B oer prisoners. The British Government has leased Darrel's Island, one of the largest islands in the Sound, and within a quarter of a mile of Warwick shore, for one year, with the option of relinquishing it on a month's notice. Tucker's Island has also been inspected, but up to April 24 no definite settlement had been made in regard to it.

### CANADIANS DIED ON THE WAY AN ATLANTIC SHIPPING COMBINE "TRUST" MORGAN'S LATEST MOVE

First Step in the Consolidation Taken by the Purchase of the Leyland Line of Steamers, Representing the Largest Tonnage in the World.

London, April 29 .- The first step in the direction of the consolidation of some of the biggest Transatlantic shipping interests has been accomplished by the purchase by J. Pierpont Morgan and Company of the Leyland Line of steamers A deposit on the purchase money has been paid.

The Leyland Line of steamers at present operates between Liverpool and Bos ton and Liverpool and New York. Some time ago negotiations for the consolida tion of the Leyland and the Atlantic Transport Company's interests fell thru, owing to a difference of opinion regarding how the stock should be issued. The fleet of the Leyland Line is now composed of 55 steamers, and has contracts for several others now under way. The purchase of the Leyland Line is tantamount. to its consolidation with the Atlantic Transport Line.

The Leyland officials in confirming the sale said an official statement would be issued to-morrow. It is understood that the shareholders will receive £14 10s for each £10 share. The Leyland Line, whose fleets will thus pass into the control of Americans, is one of Great Britain's greatest shipping institutions, and the result of the consolidation will be a steamship company with the largest tonnage in the






