



HISTORICAL MEMORANDA

IN CONNECTION WITH

Crescent Street Church, Montreal

(FORMERLY FREE CHURCH, COTÉ STREET.)

- The Congregation owes its origin to the deep interest which some individuals had in the struggles of the Free Church party in Scotland, and who met together to advance Free Church principles. They were called the Free Church Committee. The Congregation was organized, and for seven years ministered to by Deputies from the Free Church of Scotland.
- 1844.—January 10. First Meeting of Free Church Committee. Invitation sent to Rev. DR. CURNINGHAM, then in the United States, to come to Montreal.
 - " Arrival of DR. BURNS, of Paisley, the First Deputy from the Free Church.
 - " May.-A call for a Minister sent to the Free Church Colonial Committee, with promise of adequate support. A call sent to REV. W. C. BURNS at the same time to come out as an Evangelist.
 - " End of summer.—Rev. MR. KING, of Glasgow, and Rev. MR. MACNAUGHTAN, of Paisley, Deputies from the Free Church arrived. Rev. W. C. BURNS, arrived about the same time and preached in St. Gabriel Street Church.
- 1845.—The REV. J. BONAR, of Larbert, arrived in Spring, preached in St. Gabriel Street Church till a temporary wooden church was erected on Lagauchetiere Street. He opened this Church on May 11th, and on the 25th of May inducted the first elders, viz: John Redpath, James R. Orr, David Ferguson, Evander MacIver.
 - " The REV. W. ARNOT, of Glasgow, arrived about this time, and supplied the pulpit till the end of September.
 - " The REV. A. N. SOMERVILLE, of Glasgow, took charge during October and November.
 - " The REV. W. C. BURNS, in November, received but declined a call to labour in Canada, the Congregation promising to support him. In December he was again urged to fall in with this request, but finally declined on January 19th, 1846.

 - " The REV. R. BREMNER, of Glasgow, ministered from November to April.
- 1848.-The REV. J. PATTERSON, of Tranent, ministered from May to October.

1849.—The REV. J. LEWIS, of Leith, ministered from April to August.

" The REV. J. C. BURNS, of Kirkliston, ministered from September to February, 1850.

Annual Meeting.

CRESCENT STREET PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH.

MONTREAL, 16th January, 1895.

The Annual Meeting of the Congregation was held this evening in the School room. The Rev. Dr. Mackay presided, and the meeting was opened with devotional exercises.

The minutes of last Annual Meeting were read and sustained.

The Report of the Deacons' Court and Treasurer's statements having been read, it was moved by Mr. John Stirling, and seconded by Rev. Principal MacVicar: "That the Report of the Deacons' Court just read, be received and adopted, and that the same be printed and circulated among the members of the Congregation." Carried.

Dr. Mackay then addressed the meeting. after which it was closed with the Doxology and Benediction. An adjournment was then made to the Lecture Hall for social intercourse and refreshments.

The chief event of interest during the past year was the celebration of the Jubilee of the congregation, when we were favoured by the presence of a delegate from the Free Church of Scotland, in the person of the Rev. James Wells, D.D., of Pollokshields, Glasgow, whose fraternal greetings and addresses were very highly appreciated by all.

In connection with this celebration a minute was entered in the Session records of September 3rd, and as it is of general interest, it is here inserted :---

"The Session would put on record the fact that since its last meeting the Jubilee commemoration of the congregation has been held. The Rev. James Wells, D.D., of Pollokshields, Glasgow, a deputy from the Free Church of Scotland, arrived in the city on Thursday evening, May twenty-fourth, and preached at the preparatory service before the communion on Friday evening. On Sabbath, May twenty-seventh, the Rev. D. H. MacVicar, D.D., LL.D., second pastor of the congregation, now Principal of the Presbyterian College, Montreal, preached in the morning from Deuteronomy 8: 2.—" And thou shalt remember all the way which the Lord thy God led thee these forty years in the wilderness, to humble thee and to prove thee, to know what was in thine heart, to know whether thou wouldst keep His commandments or no." In the course of his address he gave a number of details in regard to the history of the congregation.

"In the afternoon a communion service was held, to which all former members of the congregation and Christian friends were invited. A large number sat down at the Lord's table, and the children of the congregation sat in the gallery. The Pastor, Dr. Mackay, presided, Dr. Wells addressed the worshippers before the Communion, and Dr. MacVicar addressed them after the Communion. In the evening, Dr. Wells preached from 2 Kings, 2:14., "Where is the Lord God of Elijah?"

"On Wednesday evening, May thirtieth, a Social meeting was held in the Lecture Hall, which was tastefully decorated. Dr. MacVicar, Dr. Wells, and Dr. Mackay addressed the meeting. A portion of Psalm 136 (Hymn 11 of "Church Praise"), Psalm 124, 2nd version, and Hymn 195 "Church Praise," were sung with much feeling by the large audience. We seemed compassed about by the great cloud of witnesses as we sang,—

> "For all the saints who from their labours rest, Who thee by faith before the world confessed, Thy name O Jesus be for ever blessed,

Hallelujah."

"On Sabbath, June third, a gathering of Sabbath School children was held in the church. The scholars from Nazareth Street were present, as well as those of the Central School. In the absence from the city of the Superintendent of Crescent Street Sabbath School, Mr. John G. Savage, the Honorary Superintendent, Mr. David Morrice, presided, and gave some reminiscences of his connection with the School, of which he had been Superintendent for twenty-five years. Mr. James Ross, Superintendent of Nazareth Street School for thirty-four years, Dr. MacVicar, and Dr. Mackay, also addressed the children.

"At the present date there are still five on our Communion Roll who have been connected with the congregation from the beginning, viz., Mr. Archibald McGoun, senior Session Clerk, Mr. David Cameron, Elder, and Mrs. John Redpath, Mrs. Robert Dalgleish, and Mr. Joseph Millen, members. In looking back on the past, and going forward into the future, we thank God and take courage, feeling constrained to raise the song of the Psalmist as he reviews the history of Israel, "O give thanks unto the Lord for He is good, for His mercy endureth for ever."

In addition to those given above as connected with the congregation from the beginning, Mr. Joseph Martin may also be named, for though his name is not now on our Communion Roll, he worships with us as often as he is able.

At a meeting of Session held on 31st December, the following resolution was unanimously and cordially passed:

"The attention of the Session was called to the pastoral necessities of the congregation. It was felt that if in the earlier years of the Church's history there was need of a congregational missionary, there was ample room for such a labourer in its present circumstances. It was therefore unanimously agreed to bring the matter before the Deacons' Court with the view of arranging for such an appointment. In doing, so the Session have also much pleasure in mentioning the name of Mr. James Ross, as one in every way qualified to fill this office. From his long and faithful services in connection with the congregation, it is felt that no one could be better fitted to engage in this work. It was agreed, therefore, if the Deacons' Court saw its way to make the necessary arrangements, that Mr. Ross should be appointed Congregational Missionary, and that in addition to his work in the congregation, he should continue the supervision of the work in Nazareth Street."

The Deacons' Court were as hearty in their endorsement of this resolution as the Session, and made such arrangements that Mr. Ross was able to commence his duties in the beginning of 1895. Mr Ross requires no introduction to the congregation. An elder in the church for twenty-eight years, he has been conspicuous for the faithful discharge of all the duties of his office, and specially welcome in visiting the sick. The work to which he is now to devote himself is therefore not new to him, and we know that he will receive a cordial welcome into every home, and every help in prosecuting his important work. As Mr. Ross has also been appointed Treasurer, and Secretary of the Weekly Offering, he will be in attendance every Tuesday and Thursday morning in the Library from 9 to 10, and on Wednesday evening from 7.30 to 8, to give any information required, and to be informed of any visits that should be made.

At the Annual Meeting some statistics were given which it. may be of interest to preserve. The number of communicants on the roll at the end of 1878 was 348. At the end of 1893 they had risen to 630. There was added during 1894, 64 new members, bringing up the total to 694. There was deducted from the roll at the annual revision 55 leaving 639 as the number of members at the end of 1894.

The total number received from the beginning of my ministry, in May, 1879, till the end of 1894 was 945. The highest number received in any year was 96 in 1879; the lowest was 29 in 1885; and the average per annum for the sixteen years of my pastorate has been 59.

During the same period there has been registered 143 marriages, 294 burials, and 373 baptisms. The registrations during the past year have been 8 marriages, 19 burials and 25 baptisms.

It has been said that there is no more solemn reading for a minister than his Communion roll. This is true. Looking at what to some are bare figures and dry lists of names, thoughts arise that cannot and ought not to be uttered in the ear of any man, but which should bring him very near to God. And not only the minister but every Office bearer and member,—every parent and Sabbath School teacher, according to the measure of their opportunities and responsibilities, should ponder those things, and ask what am I doing as a builder of God's spiritual temple? It is of little consequence how much or how little is put to our credit now: for all estimates are of necessity inaccurate and will do us harm if we rest in them. Rather let each one ask, Am I building on the one foundation. Jesus Christ? And am I building on that foundation gold, silver, costly stones; or only wood, hay, stubble? The day of our Lord's appearing will declare it, for the fire of His judgment will prove each man's work of what sort it is. Then the true meaning and value of all these statistics will be revealed: and, it may be, the one we least of all thought of or esteemed among our number, will be the one who receives the greatest reward; while the one who is most prominent and most thought of, may be the one who will suffer the greatest loss, himself saved, yet so as through fire. Let us all lay these things to heart, and each do whatever work is ours, under the eye of the Lord, and for His glory, remembering that we shall have good success only as we truly confess Jesus Christ as coming in the flesh.

Report of the Deacons' Court,

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31st DECEMBER, 1894

At the close of another year the duty devolves upon the Deacons' Court of presenting to the congregation a brief review of its work. While regretting that we have not been able to do as much as we desired for the different schemes of the church, there is cause for thankfulness that so much has been accomplished, in view of the prevailing depression in all branches of business.

WEEKLY OFFERINGS.

The receipts on this account for the year amount to \$9,222.49, of which \$6,749.01, was received in envelopes,

\$1,453.12, in open collection, and special subscriptions, \$1,020.36, making the weekly average \$177.31.

In connection with this mode of giving to the different schemes embraced in the weekly offering, the Court deems it not out of place to again urge those who have not yet become subscribers, to realize their responsibility in this matter, feeling assured that they would find it the easiest and best means of fulfilling the Divine command, "On the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store as God hath prospered him."

PEW RENTS.

The income from this source has been \$4,372.68, a decrease of \$340.62, as compared with the previous year. A number of items of arrears were included in last year's figures, which brought the amount above the average, so that this account may be considered as in about its normal condition. The arrears still represent a considerable sum, which it is hoped, with returning prosperity, may be gradually wiped off.

BUILDING FUND.

The amount at debit of this account remains the same as last year, viz. \$636.97. This item, it is hoped will be largely reduced during the present year, if not entirely disposed of.

FOREIGN MISSION FUND (CHINA).

The amount received during the year on account of this fund was \$429.00. The balance at its credit is now \$263.15. Doubtless the knowledge of the fact that the work of our Missionary, the Rev. J. H. MacVicar, is for the present suspended, owing to the health of Mrs. MacVicar not being yet fully restored, as well as the disturbed state of the Chinese Empire at the present time, may in a measure account for the falling off of subscriptions to this fund. As it is our Missionary's ardent desire to again enter the field as soon as circumstances will permit, we feel assured that when the time comes, the necessary means will be forthcoming to enable him to continue the work which he has so much at heart.

NAZARETH STREET BUILDING.

It was deemed necessary for the protection of our property in Nazareth Street, as well as for the comfort of our workers there, to place the building in thorough repair, and carry out many much needed improvements. This has been satisfactorily accomplished, but has entailed an outlay of about \$600.00, which amount it will be necessary to provide for at an early date.

ELECTION OF DEACONS.

In consequence of the election to the Eldership of Messrs. D. Robertson, Geo. Hyde, D. Wilson, D. T. Fraser, and R. N. McCallum, it was found necessary to increase the number of Deacons; at the request of the Court, the session asked the Congregation to elect nine additional. Of the nine who were chosen the following signified their acceptance, viz., Wm. J. Morrice, S. A. McMurtry, S. S. Bain, R. L. Charlton, David W. Campbell, Robt. Brodie, W. D. Gillean, and Alex. Forbes.

The Court would express their gratification at the choice made, and feel assured that they will prove themselves worthy of the confidence their fellow-members have placed in them.

OUR JUBILEE.

The Congregation having completed the fiftieth year of its history in May last, the special services held on that occasion will be fresh in the memory of all. As a more extended reference is made to this event in the Session report, it is not deemed necessary to do more than record the fact here.

In this connection, however, it may not be out of place to remind the Congregation of a resolution passed unanimously at our Annual Meeting in January, 1893, and which was as follows :— "In acknowledgment of our thankfulness to God for His goodness to us during the first ifty years of our Congregational existence, we agree to make a special effort to raise the subscriptions by envelopes to the Weekly Offering to two hundred dollars per Sabbath." It is to be regretted that this very desirable end has not yet been attained; and because of this, and the needs of the Foreign Mission and Augmentation Funds, the Court appointed special collections for these schemes, and feel that such action will commend itself to the Congregation in any similar emergency.

CONCLUSION.

In bringing to a close this brief summary of our affairs, the Court desires to express their gratitude to the most High for his goodness to us as a people during the year that has passed away. If we have come short, it should be the earnest prayer of one and all, that in the new year upon which we have entered, we should prosecute with renewed energy and zeal every scheme which has for its object the extension of Christ's cause and kingdom.

These books will be carefully selected by a committee of teachers, and when they are placed on the shelves, we trust the library will be more popular and useful than ever.

During the past year there have been distributed among the various classes the following papers:—The "Senior Westminster Quarterly," The "British Workwoman," The "British Workman," The "Children's Friend," The "Children's Record, " and the "Sunbeam."

In connection with the Jubilee services of the church, a joint meeting of Crescent Street and Nazareth schools was held in Crescent Street Church on Sabbath afternoon, June 5th.

Most interesting addresses on the history of the school were delivered by Dr. MacKay, Dr. McVicar, Mr. D. Morrice and Mr. James Ross. The remembrance of the faithfulness of our predecessors and of our privileges, so many as compared with theirs, should arouse us to greater earnestness in the Master's service, that His word slacken not in this portion of the vineyard.

The Annual Temperance Meeting was held on Friday evening. November 23rd, and was addressed by the Rev. J. H. Carson, secretary of the Dominion Alliance, and by Mr. Budge of the Y. M. C. A. The long experience of these gentlemen in temperance work enabled them to present the truth in a most practical and convincing manner.

The monthly business meetings and the Sabbath afternoon prayer meetings have been held as usual, and have been well attended by the teachers throughout the year.

The annual picnic was again held at Sherringham Park on Saturday, June 16th; we were favored with delightful weather, and in the general opinion, this was one of the pleasantest picnics the school has ever had.

Our heartiest thanks are again due to many who laboured devotedly to make it a success.

We desire also to express our thanks to the Deacons' Court for improvements in the Infant Class room, whereby it has been rendered more commodious and comfortable in every way. During the past year twelve of our pupils made public confession of their faith in Christ, and their names were added to the communion roll of the Church. We believe that many other young hearts have been given to Him, in whose keeping only they are safe. Of such was little Muriel Smardon and Jessie McDougall. The Lord had need of them and called them unto Himself; and as they passed through the dark valley to life eternal, they placed their hands unfalteringly in their Saviour's, who is the way, the truth and the life.

MISSIONARIES, - - { D. J. GRAHAM, HECTOR MACKAY.

Time in its flight has brought us to the beginning of another year, and with a deep sense of gratitude to God we have to report that although there has been a good deal of sickness among the adherents of the mission, there has not been a single death.

The work has being going on much the same as in the past. There have been regular services each Lord's day evening, and a weekly prayer meeting during the whole year.

In addition to these services a monthly missionary meeting was commenced early last spring, which is growing in interest. We have had short addresses by different persons on the different mission fields, and a resumé of missionary news; these are intended to create an interest in missions, and a band of mission workers is endeavouring to do something to send the gospel to those who have it not.

There has been a good deal of visiting; and worship has been conducted in the homes of those called upon and direct personal appeals made to them. As a result of such efforts, some who had not been to a place of worship for several years have been induced to attend public ordinances, and have given evidence of their sincerity by their changed lives.

The sick have been visited regularly while in their homes as well as in the hospitals.

Temporary cases of extreme need have been met through the liberality of friends and the grant from the Session.

It is with no small feeling of pleasure that we have to report the very marked change for the better in our Mission Hall, which is now so bright and cheerful since the alterations ordered by the Deacons' Court have been carried out.

Altogether, while there have been discouragements chiefly through the sin of drunkenness, the work has been going on quietly and smoothly, and we pray that the Lord of the harvest would send forth more labourers into His harvest.

Ladies' Disiting and Aid Society.

PRESIDENT, - - MRS. CRAWFORD.

The first meeting of the season 1894-1895 was held Friday, October 12th. The meetings have usually been held immediately after those of the Woman's Missionary Auxiliary of the Church, and have been well attended.

The material, etc., provided by the Ladies' Aid, has been made into warm garments for the poor, at the working meetings of the Auxiliary.

Six cases in the congregation, and one family formerly connected with the Church, received assistance. Twentyfive dollars were given to Nazareth St. S. S. Mission, with parcels of new and old clothing, through Mr. James Ross, Superintendent.

The deaf and dumb young girl at the MacKay Institute, in whom we are particularly interested, received from the Society summer as well as winter outfits.

Donations of clothing and material were also given to the City Mission work of the Presbyterian Woman's Missionary Society through Miss Mc.Sween, and to the French Sewing Classes through Mrs. Duclos.

We have to acknowledge a large quantity of woollen underclothing from Mr. D. Morrice, parcels of clothing from Mrs. Redpath, Terrace Bank, and Miss Margt. Stewart, and five dollars given for special purposes from a member of the Church, per Mrs. MacKay, boots etc. from Mr. W. F. Smardon, and several parcels of old clothing from different members of the congregation. All these kind donations have enabled us to relieve many necessitous cases, and we beg to tender to the donors our grateful thanks.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

In presenting the report for the closing year we note with pleasure the increased attendance at the meetings. This is due in a large measure to those ladies who have so kindly visited other members of the congregation and so told them of the work that is being done and interesting them in it.

The meetings have been held regularly on the first Friday of every month. Different ladies having charge of programme for each month, and in this way the circle of those taking part has been widened. During the year some interesting letters and papers have been read, and we were also favored with an address from Mr. Amaron, telling about his work in connection with the French Evangelization.

It was with regret that we were obliged to accept the resignation of our secretary, Miss Savage, who has left the city. The contributions for the past year amount to \$526.38.

The sewing meetings of the society have been held at the homes of some of the ladies, and much practical work has been accomplished. Both summer aud winter clothing was made for a deaf and dumb girl at the MacKay Institute; also a number of garments for Miss McSween as well as for Nazareth St., the material being supplied by the Ladies' Visiting and Aid Society. Several of the ladies made some most comfortable quilts from samples sent to the latter by Mr. Morrice.

At Nazareth Street the sewing class has been held regularly on Wednesday afternoons, It was felt last year that on account of the small attendance of women it would be better to confine our attention to the children only, especially as we were so crowded. The children are regular in their attendance, and some that have been with us several years, sew quiet nicely. Our work is as much as possible self-supporting, but not altogether so, and we take this opportunity of thanking those ladies who have so kindly helped us with contributions both of money and material.
