20,000 SOLDIERS WILL GO TO

Troops Will Be Massed at the Citadel Instead of in the Annual Camps

OTTAWA, March 27 .- (Special.)-Sir Frederick Borden made an important statement in the house to-day with regard to the participation of militia in the tercentenary celebration at Quebec in July next. He said it was proposed that about 50 per cent. of the mllitia, or about 20,000 men, should go

Obey rigidly the laws of hygiene. Keep a clear conscience. Love God and be square with your fellow man.

Drink some more sour milk. The prelate said: "I am indebted material to three sources: "1. The Bible "2. A newly published book by Prof.

Elle Metchnikoff, a French scientist. "3. Science in general.
"Metchnikoff, one of the professors in the Pasteur Institute in Paris, is the greatest exponent in the world of the theories of Darwin. It is his business to hunt up diseases and their remedies. In a new book Metchnikoff points out that the reason men do not live to a great age is because under

modern conditions the arteries harden with advancing age, due to deposits of calcareous substances. "He has discovered that the antidote for this condition is sour milk. The sheaths of the arteries are softened by the milk. The principle, he says, is as sound as the virus theory


in hydrophobia and antitoxin and vacnation for other ailments.
"Metchnikoff declares that sour milk pure buttermilk should be drunk twice or three times a day. He declares that fifty years would be added to the lives of aged persons

if they did so. Now in the Old Testa-ment, just after the flood, the prophet of God said: 'And the days of man are 120 years. 'It was centuries later that the

psalmist said: 'The days of man are three score and ten years.'
"Now, as to the scientific theory. Research has proved that the multiple of adolescence in animals is six. That is, they ordinarily live six times the length of their infancy. Man reaches maturity at twenty years. Multiply-ing that by six gives 120 years, the atural age of man, according to the laws that govern animals of the lower



ALDRIGH CURRENCY BILL PASSED IN U. S. SENATE

Emergency Circulation-Reserves and Circulation.

WASHINGTON, D.C., March 27 .-The Aldrich currency bill was passed by the United States senate to-day party vote.

An interesting feature of the passage of the bill was a reiteration by Mr. Aldrich of his promise to bring in a bill for an investigation of the ena bill for an investigation of the entire banking system of the country with a view to instituting reforms.

As passed the bill provides for not more than \$500,000,000 of emergency currency to be issued to national banks upon deposit by them of state, county and municipal bonds to be approved by the secretary of the treasury. The currency is to be issued with a view of securing an equitable distribution of the currency over the distribution of the currency over the United States and in accordance with the unimpaired capital and surplus of banks in each state. Banks are to pay for this emergency circulation one-half of one per cent. a month during the first four months it is circulated, and afterwards three-quarters of one per cent. a month.

The city council will hold another pecial meeting on Monday to consider the board of control's recommendation that appeal be made against the quashing of the license reduction bylaw by Chief Justice Mere-

ed the board yesterday to take this action. He said that the bylaw was based upon the one of 1887, which was upheld when attacked. He thought that Justice Meredith's decision was wrong, on the grounds he gives, because the first clause of bylaw 434 fixes the year for which the tavern license is to be paid, to wit, from the first of May, 1904, and in every succeeding year.

As to the second ground, the statute itself defined the time when the bylaw must be passed, to wit, before the first of March; it also defined the time when it should take effect, namely, on and after the first day of May. If so, then the bylaw was already covered by the statute, and the effect the learned chief justice alleged could

An appeal could be heard by the divisional court in April, and a de-cision could be expected by May 1. There has been too much funny business with the size and weight of the bread offered to the public since the increase in the cost of flour. Every baker has had to save himself the best way he could in the fierce fight of competition, and the under-weight loaf has been the avenue of escape from bankruptcy for many a man in the bread business. A baker must make a profit. No business can pay taxes and wages on the benevolent basis of giving goods away.

The Public Must be Guaranteed

At the same time the public must be assured that they are getting the right quantity of bread for their money. The standards of weights and measures are fixed for almost every staple commodity in every civilized country on the face of the earth, and there is no reason why a standard weight for bread should not be fixed, and that standard insisted upon. There is evidence in the history of local legislation that it is to the interest of some organized body to reduce the weight of the loaf of bread. What that benefit can be is easily seen. If a two-pound loaf were made a standard, the public would pay eight cents or ten cents a loaf for two pounds, instead of for three pounds, for there is no doubt in the world that the object of the present agitation is to get legal permission to give less bread for the same money. The required weight for bread used to be four pounds a large loaf, then the bakers got it reduced to three pounds a large loaf. The next step is an attempt to reduce the weight from three pounds to two. Where will this legislation end? It's time to stop, right now. Three pounds is a small enough loaf for the consumer, and the public will have to pay just as much when the loaf is legally made smaller. If bakers cannot make a legal, three-pound loaf at the price they are getting,

Let the Bakers Raise Their Prices

The public have a right to know how much bread a loaf means. There should not be several weights for a loaf of bread under different names, such as "plain" and "fancy" bread, but all loaves should be made to conform to one standard weight, and the price made according to necessity. The price of bread can be changed at a moment's notice, but no one should be allowed to trifle with the standard weight, which is the public's only protection.

Why I Take This Stand

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




