BATTLE CRY WILL BE CALLED FOR RAILWAY

West to Be Baited by Hudson Bay Line—East by Georgian Bay Project.

MONTREAL, March 27.—(Special.)—The statement is made in this city that the federal government will go to the poll during the coming fall on the question of building the Georgian Bay Canal and the Hudson Bay Railway, the belief being that the first will be as popular in the east as the second project is known to be in the western provinces.

It is said that when Hon. Mr. Fielding stated in the commons that some of the proposed enterprises would have to be postponed for a while, he had no reference to those two schemes, and that before parliament is prorogued, there will be evidence to the effect that the present ministry has serious intentions of launching those two great projects before the country, and that in this manner a monster campaign fund may be forthcoming.

WILL COST MILLIONS.

There is also a charter possessed by Montreal parties for the construction of the railway, and in fact those people claim that theirs is the only valid charter for the Hudson Bay road in question. It is estimated that the canal will not cost less than \$120,000,000, and that the estimate of the cost of the Hudson Bay road will be in the vicinity of \$30,000,000 per mile, the official information at hand going to show that prairie country is encountered within 120 miles from the shore, and that from this point to the bay the Churchill River is hugged pretty closely and at considerable earth cuttings will be necessary.

It is further added that the engineers of the department at Ottawa say that the sum of at least \$150,000,000 will have to be found before the two enterprises in question can be started, but the government contractors or the Minister who generally supply the sinews of war at election times aver that this is a growing time, and that Canada is good for it even if the amount does seem very large, especially in view of the fact that the Grand Trunk Pacific will not be finished for some years yet, and that the Hudson Bay road will be at least twenty millions more than the estimate made by the finance minister in the house of commons.

OTTAWA, March 27.—(Special.)—Sir Frederick Borden made an important statement in the house to-day with regard to the participation of militia in the tercentenary celebration at Quebec in July next. He said it was proposed that about 50 per cent. of the militia, or about 20,000 men, should go to Quebec.

As far as the western battalions were concerned, it would, of course, not be expedient to transport half the strength of the battalions east, but Ontario, Quebec and Maritime regiments would be represented by 50 per cent. There would be no recruits and with regard to the rural battalions, the tercentenary exercises would constitute their annual drill.

"The Bible and Science" is a new book by Prof. Elie Metchnikoff, a French scientist.


Metchnikoff, one of the professors in the Pasteur Institute in Paris, is the greatest exponent in the world of the theories of Darwin.

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

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ALDRICH CURRENCY BILL PASSED IN U. S. SENATE

WASHINGTON, D.C., March 27.—The Aldrich currency bill was passed by the United States senate to-day by a vote of 45 to 16.

As passed the bill provides for not more than \$600,000,000 of emergency currency to be issued by national banks upon deposit by them of state, county and municipal bonds to be approved by the secretary of the treasury.

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HEIGHT OF SCHOOLS WON'T BE KEPT DOWN

Property Committee Doesn't Make Two Storey Limit - Site for Technical School.

Toronto schools will not be restricted to two storeys in height, if the property committee's action yesterday in turning down Dr. Hawke's motion is sustained by the board of education.

Trustee Houston was the only member who went on record as favoring two-storey schools. His objections included the danger to pupils in high buildings should a fire break out, and the injurious effect of climbing stairs on the health of little girls.

Dr. Bryans countered with the argument that climbing stairs would be a healthful gymnastic exercise to the ordinarily constituted child. He was also of the opinion that a purer atmosphere would be provided in the higher altitude.

World Office, Friday Evening, March 27.

C.P.R. was a strong feature in Canadian securities to-day, but as local holders are practically bare of this security, there were no transactions in the stock at the Toronto exchange. Bradstreet's Trade Review. Montreal, March 27.—Bradstreet's weekly bank clearings show a slight increase in the volume of business here during the past week. While a few warm days have the effect of increasing some movement, the weather was not sufficiently settled to bring about important improvement. The drygoods sorting trade is beginning to broaden. Travelers are out and report fair to good prospects, but orders are for immediate use, and are not large. Outside work is becoming more general, and the demand for hardware is showing improvement. Stocks of general lines are reported light, and good orders are looked for. Reductions in shovels and wire nails have not resulted in much increased business. The movement of groceries shows a better tone. Teas continue firm. Wholesalers are making an effort to cut out the sale of 25c package teas on account of the advance in foreign markets. Industrial concerns here are reported to be showing more satisfaction at the outlook, and there has been some decrease in the number of unemployed. Country trade is fair, altho it will not be heavy until seeding operations are over. Produce is coming forward fairly well and prices generally hold steady. Hides and leather are still quiet, with prices about unchanged.

Toronto reports: Cool weather has held back the spring trade in drygoods, and the volume of business is well behind that of a year ago. A sorting trade, however, is expected to spring up as soon as warmer weather really sets in. Stocks in retailers' hands are light, and some better orders are already coming forward. There has been a good business in Canadian iron and steel, and in almost all lines prices are firm. Hardware is showing a slight improvement, and as a consequence the demand for builders' hardware is improving. Country trade has been fair. Prices for grain and other produce have held up fairly well, and deliveries are about steady. Hogs and poultry are quiet and easy in tone. Collections continue moderately good.

Winnipeg reports: The general outlook for trade here continues to show improvement. Wholesale spring goods are moving well, and there is already some business in sorting lines. Payments continue to show some slight improvement, and orders are increasing in volume, while sales and business men generally are inclined to be more hopeful regarding the future. Collections are still slow, altho there has been some improvement during the past few days. Vancouver and Victoria reports say: Trade generally continues to improve all along, when the Province's industries are more active, and the wholesale trade reports a better demand for all lines. Collections are good, and prospects are bright for an excellent summer's business.

New Rector at Chatham. WINGHAM, March 27.—Rev. T. S. Boyle, M.A., B.D., rector of St. Paul's, was unanimously elected rector of Chatham, and has been appointed to that position by the Bishop of Huron.

SUSPECTS FOUL PLAY. Mother of Dead Groceryman Has Body Disinterred.

MONTREAL, March 27.—(Special).—Thomas Martin Brennan, who kept a grocery store at the corner of Waverly and St. Bernard-streets, St. Louis de Mile End, was found lying dead in the rear of his store on Monday morning, March 16. It was thought at the time to be a case of death from natural causes and the body was interred. The mother of the deceased, however, was not satisfied that her son died from natural causes, being of the opinion that he had met with foul play. Sensational statements were made by her and to-day the attorney-general ordered the body exhumed.

It was removed from the cemetery and taken to the morgue, where Dr. D. D. McTaggart and Dr. C. A. Dugas, government medical examiners, will make an autopsy to ascertain the cause of death. The inquest will be held to-morrow morning.

CATHOLICS CONTRIBUTE. To New Presbyterian Church in Quebec Village.

MONTREAL, March 27.—(Special).—A Presbyterian church, partly built by Roman Catholic subscriptions, is a unique demonstration of the kindly feelings existing between the two creeds.

The church is a new one at Laprairie, built to replace a smaller church that was pulled down, and it is now the only Protestant church in the district. It is proposed to hold a day school in the church building, and when the Roman Catholic residents in the village heard that the new church was to be built, they asked to be permitted to contribute.

Pledged the Ring. Jack Steele, a Barrie bartender, loaned a diamond ring to Mrs. Jas. Levey, who pledged it with Luck, Wisdom & Co., as security for a grocery bill of \$137.63.

Steele sued Luck, Wisdom & Co. to recover his ring, but the court holds that he must first pay the amount of the bill.

PASSED FRENCH TREATY. Senate Grants One Divorce—Another Recommended.

OTTAWA, March 27.—(Special).—The French treaty was given its third reading in the senate this afternoon. The senate divorce committee recommended to-day that a decree of divorce be granted Mary Alexander of Toronto from Edward E. Alexander. Ada H. S. Pauiding of Toronto was granted a divorce from Frederick William Paulding.

Baseman is Found Guilty on Perjury Charge. In the session yesterday Rupert Baseman was found guilty of perjury in connection with a suit for damages brought against the Toronto Railway Co. William Steele pleaded guilty to perjury in the same case and testified that he had done so at Baseman's request. Harry Horowitz gave similar evidence and will be tried to-day on the charge of perjury, which has linked the three young men.



The price asked is \$8000, and it is expected that the deal will go thru in a day or two.
