BEST HOSPITAL YET IN AMERICA

New Building For Western For Purpose Intended Unexcelled in Equipment.

The new Western Hospital will be the finest in Canada for the purposes it will serve.

The plans, which were drawn by E. J. Lennox, show an ideal building for its purpose.

It will be 333 feet 8 inches long, parallel with and facing Bathurst-street, and 90 feet from the road.

The building now there will be left for the present and the addition will be in front of it.

The control or administrative portion will be a little wider, with an extra storey, which will be used as the caretaker's apartments and storerooms.

The present building will be connected by a passage which will be used as a "sun room" for convalescent patients.

The north wing of the basement will be for out-patients and will be equipped with an emergency exit.

The north wing will be for male patients and the south for female. A dining room, recreation room, and lecture room for the nurses will also be in the basement.

The heating apparatus will change the air through the whole structure every 15 minutes.

On the first floor will be the general office, in the administrative section. The wings will be divided into 38 private wards.

A patients' sitting room will face Bathurst-street, with veranda at each end for convalescents.

The second floor will have a library and accommodation for four house surgeons and the superintendents.

The wings will have cots for 48 patients and the wards will be public. Two rooms at either end will be sound-proof and will be used for refractory cases.

The building will be a veranda at each end, and lounging rooms. Well lighted operating rooms will also be on this floor, as well as X-ray rooms and anaesthetic rooms.

Solid brick, with stone trimmings will be used, and the central part will be stone to the height of one storey.

GERMANY'S CHANCELLOR QUIET BUT BRILLIANT

Von Buelow's Successor Was College Chum of Kaiser's—Friend of Working Classes.

Berlin, July 14.—Dr. von Bethmann-Hollweg was to-day appointed chancellor of the empire in succession to Prince von Buelow.

The new chancellor is a college friend of the emperor, 52 years of age and of Jewish origin.

In his youth he studied law and was appointed assistant judge. Before he was thirty years old he had been made district governor of Ober-Barnim, and later became provincial president of Pomerania, where the suburban palace of Emperor William is situated.

Following his sojourn at Potsdam Dr. von Bethmann-Hollweg's promotion was rapid. He is without the graces of expression and wit of Prince von Buelow, but he is a man of convincing thought and substance.

He is a man of reserved and thoughtful habits and sometimes has been called the "philosopher statesman."

Dr. von Bethmann-Hollweg has devoted himself to improving the condition of the working classes, whereas almost all social legislation has been applied up to the present time to the work of the aristocracy.

RAIN REPORTS BOOST WHEAT

July Delivery Quotations Reach \$1.27 in Chicago—Patten Crowd Are In It.

CHICAGO, July 14.—Wheat for July delivery advanced seven cents to \$1.27 a bushel during a stormy session on the board of trade to-day, establishing a new high record for the season and giving promise of a repetition of the recent advance headed by James A. Patten and his colleagues in the May option.

The immediate cause of the buying flurry was additional rainfalls last night in Kansas and Missouri, where the new crop of wheat is now harvesting or is awaiting the thrasher, and wheat-shipping regions, telling of damage to the new crop by excessive rains.

In addition, the official forecast for to-morrow will be the principal wheat-growing states predicted additional thunderstorms.

A large "overseas" short interest has existed for some time in the July option, and the action of the market today indicated that many of these traders had become alarmed at crop reports. Warehousemen and professional traders were said to be the principal shorts.

Elevator men were said to have bought in the wheat in Kansas, Oklahoma and other winter wheat states, and hedged against their country purchases by selling July wheat in Chicago and the southwest markets.

There is little contract wheat for delivery in Chicago now, and that little belongs to the Patten clique, which succeeded in merchandising the grain delivered to it during the closing days of the May corner, and now demands the wheat so far as to it for this month's delivery. When shorts went to Mr. Patten early in the day with offers of settlement, it is said they were told to buy the grain in the pit. The attempt to carry out this line of action was the cause of the seven cent advance.

E. M. Trovatt, secretary of the association, informed The World last night that the writs were issued yesterday afternoon.

It is stated that the wholesale dealers maintain a black-list on which all dealers who have not paid their accounts by Wednesday noon every week are entered, and that this list is distributed to the trade.

D. E. A. IN SESSION

Four Hundred Delegates Are in Attendance at Victoria.

VICTORIA, B.C., July 14.—The Dominion Educational Association began its session at Victoria to-day, with nearly 400 delegates.

L. A. Brough, Vancouver High School, suggested increasing the association's membership by the appointment of a permanent secretary at a fixed salary and a systematic effort to enroll every teacher.

The meeting was presided over by the provincial governments but represented by direct representatives of the publication of reports of its activities in book form, the publication of a magazine devoted to national education, and the establishing of a bureau of education by the Dominion government at Ottawa, were also discussed.

Prof. Lang of Toronto pointed to the danger of a bureau at Ottawa, as the firming of race and creed in Canada. A committee was finally appointed, consisting of Dr. Scott of Calgary, Dr. A. H. H. of Vancouver, and Mr. J. A. H. of Toronto.

MARINE DOCK PROJECT WILL BENEFIT PRO RATA MUNICIPALITIES LUCKY

To Establish Auxiliary Plant at Owen Sound For Their Upper Lake Business.

To maintain Owen Sound's supremacy as the Liverpool of the great lakes Mayor Harrison and W. P. McKay, ex-M.P. were in the city yesterday to confer with the Polson Iron Works, Limited, by which it is probable a large drydock will be erected in the Georgian Bay metropolis.

Since the old drydock had become too small to meet the necessities of modern conditions, with big steel carriers as large as many ocean liners entering the port, Owen Sound's shipping has been somewhat handicapped. Big liners have at various times been obliged to go to Detroit or Port Huron when other drydocks in Canada were crowded, and the resulting loss of time and expense has been at times a very serious consideration.

The government, it is understood, will support the building of a big dock by the issue of a bond of three per cent. The Polsons will lease the dock for 20 years, paying four per cent. on the cost of construction. With this general support, the project is attracting general support.

The Polsons have built up an extensive marine repairing connection and with an auxiliary plant at Owen Sound will be in a splendid condition to extend operations on the upper lakes.

## CLUB HOUSE BILLIARDS REQUIRES NO LICENSE

Judgment Given in Dominion Bowling and Athletic Club Case.

Judgment to set aside the conviction has been given by chief Justice Falconbridge and Justice Britton, Justice Riddell dissenting, in the divisional court, in the stated cases, the King v. Dominion Bowling and Athletic Club. The effect will be to permit clubs to have billiard tables without city license.

On the hearing of the evidence the police magistrate found the accused "not guilty." Upon request, a stated case was granted. It was held (1) that the club is not liable to a penalty for not taking out a license under bylaw 23; (2) that the word person as used in the bylaw includes an incorporated company; (3) The Dominion Bowling and Athletic Club upon the facts stated did not as charged carry on business for hire and profit within the provisions of the municipal act.

No order was made as to costs. I. F. Hellmuth K.C. for defendants. F. R. MacKeehan, for prosecutor.

Dulness Continues Feature Of the Local Stock Market

Latin Americans Stronger Than of Late—Very Little Stock Coming Into the Market.

World Office, Wednesday Evening, July 14.—There was no special change noted in the Toronto Stock Exchange to-day. The amount of trading was about as small as usual, but in special cases prices were advanced.

The speculative stocks as a whole were stronger, with the Latin American group showing a better undertone than has been the case for some time since. C. P. R. was also firmer here, in accord with other markets.

Rio was the most active issue in the speculative stocks, selling around 150. Sao Paulo was also active, selling at 147 on the afternoon board.

Our reports are not entirely reassuring as to the Wabash preferred rate which may be wholly manipulative just now.—Financial Bulletin.

The directors of the A.C.P. will meet to-morrow afternoon to act on the dividend. It is expected that the regular quarterly dividend of 1-2 cent will be declared.

Regarding the series of notes concerning the Illinois Central, J. Ogden Armour states that he has no knowledge of any new financial plan under consideration.

KERR LAKE DISTRICT IS MARVELOUSLY RICH

New Vein Just Uncovered on Hargrave Auggers Well For Surrounding Properties.

COBALT, July 14.—(Special.)—I have just inspected the magnificent find made on Hargrave this morning, and which is just another testimony of the marvelous richness of the Kerr Lake district.

At a distance of 500 feet north of Kerr Lake shaft No. 4, the Hargrave, in trenching along the Kerr Lake line, encountered a calcite vein three to six inches wide, showing native silver exposed for a distance of over 30 feet.

The discovery is regarded as an important find for the whole Kerr Lake section. The vein turns at right angles to the Kerr Lake property before it moves into Hargrave. If the vein should later on leave the Hargrave and go to either Kerr Lake or the Drummond, only goes to show that the series of Kerr Lake veins more or less parallel and about 100 feet apart continues to occur on the Hargrave and will be repeated as the exploration work is extended backward.


