

> LADY LAURIER THE PREY OF A YANKEE REPORTER

Discusses the Importance of a Title in Democratic America, and Adds a Word About Suffragettes.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., March 1.-(Special.) -Lady Laurier, wife of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, premier of Canada, who is on her way to Hot Springs, Ark., to-night discussed, with a reporter, her view of democratic ideals, in social life

of America. She was answering the questions as to how she, the possesor of a title with certain royalistic affiliations and predestined preferences, harmonized her situation of being the wife of the Canadian premier, an elective office on American soil.

"Royal prerogative, as against democratic ideals, did you say," she re-iterated with rising inflection, leveling her lorgnet with accuracy. "De mocratic ideals? Well, I haven't observed anything democratic in the soclal ideas of America. Americans display a far greater eagerness and awe for social prerogatives than do Euro-

"Titles are of far greater value on this side than in Europe. Americans pay unqualified homage to royalty, while in Europe their value is disproportionate to their station. Americans seem to need the title and Europeans the money. I do not believe in such marriages. Americans should marry at home and Europeans likewise. A tive cannot mean anything in America, because it was bought."

CHARTERS BILL AND THE TELEPHONE MONOPOLY

Vastly greater importance should be attached to the bill introduced by Samuel Charters, M.L.A., and now under consideration by a committee of the legislature, than the attention it has received from the public serves to indicate. Any bill that arouses the whole-hearted antagonism of the corporations is certain to be in the public interest, and the fact that the Bell Telephone Co. is fighting Mr. Charters' bill with all its forces is, or ought to be, sufficient to rally every publicspirited member of the legislature to its assistance.

The members will be aware of the Bell Co.'s interest by the letters they are probably receiving, dictated by the Bell Co., but sent out by the independent companies, which are connected with the Bell Co., under various obligations, or in some instances under misappre-The Bell Co. has by circular requested the companies which it thinks likely to be amenable to such pressure, to write to the members representing them, asking them to oppose the bill, "as it would create ruinous competition.

Mr. Charters' bill is intended, in the first place, to remedy an intolerable license which the Bell Telephone Co. has arrogated to itself. When a few independent telephone companies have established themselves in any county it is the custom of the Bell people to send down an agent, and get the companies to sign an agreement to do long-distance business with them. Sentiment is worked up for the Bell corporation, and when the agreement is signed it is found to have a joker clause which provides that the companies concerned shall now only have connection with such other companies as the Bell approves. This means that the Bell Co. is able to break up the local companies in their obvious and convenient alliances, and ensures to itself the abolition of all that ruinous competition which, it hypocritically suggests will hamper the local companies.

The Charters bill provides that the present law shall be valid and shall be observed, and that free and unrestricted communication shall be possible between all contiguous companies. The Bell Co. refuses to permit cross-county connections, with the result that in order to get connections, a circuit has often to be made all round the borders of an intervening county to reach a point which, in a direct line, could be attained with half the mileage. On this account a company has some-times to go round 200 or 300 miles.

There are from 250 to 300 telephone companies in Ontario, and they are incredibly hampered by the Bell monopoly. In the State of lowa, according to the United States telephone census recently issued, there were on the 31st December, 1907, 332,000 telephones, being twice as many as in the whole Dominion of Ganada, altho Iowa has only the same population as Ontario. Of these telephones 84 per cent. were under independent local and rural companies. In 1895, when the Bell patents expired, there was not a telephone in a farm house in Iowa. That indicates what the Bell Telephone Co. does for the farmers, and is now doing in Ontario.

Mr. Charters' bill goes a step farther. It provides for carrying out present Dominion law, which the Bell Telephone Co. has persistently ignored. The Dominion Railway Board has power under the act to examine and adjudicate upon all agreements made by the Bell Telephone with the independent companies, or by these companies with the Bell Co. The act says that the agreements "shall be submitted to and approved by the board before such contract, agreement, or arrangement shall have any force or effect." Under this clause all the agreements by which the Bell Co. is trying to hold up the local and rural companies on its circuits, are invalid, null and void, and of no effect. Mr. Charters copies this clause in his bill, compelling the submission to the Ontario Railway Board of all such agreements, and giving the board jurisdiction over agreements made with the Bell Co. The Dominion Railway Board has been publicly interrogated upon this point, and Chairman Mabee has declared that it did not examine and approve these agreements. The local companies are therefore under no compulsion to the Bell Co. on this matter. But, nevertheless, the Bell Co. would persuade the farmers that they must abide by their agreements.

When the Bell Co. refuses any independent company, or threatens to refuse connection with their nearest exchange, the railway board should have authority to order a municipality to give rural companies permission to place a switching terminal within the municipal limits. These great public services are for the benefit and convenience of the public, and when a private corporation interferes with the transaction of business and the rights and privileges and conveniences of the citizens, it is high time to curb such arrogance. A notorious instance of this is to be met at St. Catharines, where 2000 independent phones want to get into the city, and the Bell Telephone Co. exclud Mr. Charters should have the support of every member of the legislature in such an issue, and now that The Globe can turn from private affairs, it might set the Dominion authorities on the trail of such an outrage

Toronto has labored long under the disabilities of telephone monopoly. Perhaps the most glaring anomaly is the five-cent rate charged for West Toronto messages. This is absolutely unjustifiable by any principle or precedent that can be adduced. The only excuse for it is a supine council and an indifferent mayor.

The Ontario Government cannot ignore the situation. We do not know if Mr. Charters has government sanction for his bill. If he has not, Sir James will win the favor of the whole province by making the farmers' fight in this matter his own quarrel. The government has a great opportunity to do what has been done in the western provinces. and to set free the province from the thraldom of this most galling and obstructive monopoly.

What Sir James ought to do is to erect trunk lines, and give the local lines a chance to develop naturally. It would do as much to conduce to the popularity of Ontario as a farmers' community as any other one thing.

In the telephone systems now in operation on the T. & N. O. Railway, and over the transmission right-of-way of the Hydro-Electric Power commission the government has the nucleus of such a trunk The expense of converting the system into a long-distance one would be slight in comparison to the benefit derived. The poles and right of way are in existence for a great part of the routing. A fivecircuit line can be built for \$650 a mile. Five hundred miles would go a long way to solve the telephone problem in Ontario. In the west the mistake was made of buying out the company in one instance. Saskatchewan, however, a little judicious building was done, with the result that a flank attack on the Bell connections cut into the business of that company to such an extent that it was glad to sell out at a reasonable rate. By spending a little. Ontario could soon control the long-distance telephone business. If it is not done soon it will cost

immensely more later on. In the meantime, we trust that Mr. Charters' bill will receive every assistance from both sides of the legislature.
