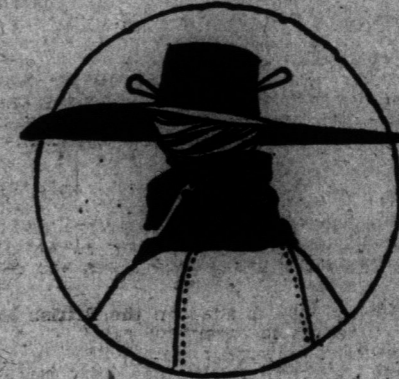

Extolling The Graces of The New Silken Skirts

Straighter of Line and Somewhat Narrower Than Formerly, But Despite a Graceful Simplicity of Design Fashioned of the Richest, Most Sumptuous Materials Imaginable

IT HAS BECOME a cult, this vogue of the separate skirt, of more-than-ordinary-magnificence—a cult that has taken on a new lease of life with the introduction of the Russian blouse. For worn with this new form of tunic and blouse in one, even a simple skirt, provided the material be rich enough, becomes a modish and striking afternoon dress, while a soft blouse of lace or Georgette will transform it into a charming frock for theatre or semi-evening wear.

In the Women's Skirt Department is a collection of lovely models made of the richest of silks—the ultramodish satin and charmeuse, pussy willow taffeta, crepe de Chine, soft gros grain, the new matinee silk, as well as panne and velvet—some in striped or barred effects, some brocaded, some inwoven with color.

The new modes show several new features—not only the straight fullness and greater length occasioned by the change of silhouette, but such ideas as draped girdles, fringed sash ends, metallic and fur trimming, side panels and one side different from the other.

CASUALTY LIST IS STILL HEAVY

Names of Hundred and Eleven Citizens on Latest Honor Roll.

FOUR KILLED IN ACTION

Ninety-Four Are Reported Wounded—Another Policeman Falls.

Large casualties have been reported daily since the beginning of the Somme battle, in which Toronto units are playing a big part. Yesterday the list contained the names of 111 soldiers from units formed in this city.

Corp. George King, who was married before leaving for overseas with the second contingent, was reported killed in action on Sept. 16. He was a roofing and 35 years of age. His widow is living with relatives in England.

Pte. John Parker, who, at the age of 18, enlisted with a first contingent battalion, died of gunshot wounds in the chest on Sept. 22. Nine years ago he came to Canada and worked on a farm at Barrie.

Sgt. D. Chapman, who died of wounds, enlisted with the 18th Windsor Battalion. He went overseas on the Grampian, and his friends are all in the old country.

Sgt. William F. Crompton, killed in action April 25, 1916, enlisted with the 90th Battalion and formerly boarded at 112 Manning avenue.

Enlisting as a private, when the Queen's Own sent their first contingent overseas, Lieut. D. Newton has been wounded. He went thru the heavy engagements. His home is at 21 Edith avenue.

According to private communications received in Toronto yesterday, Lieut. H. H. Sykes was severely wounded in one of the engagements in France last week, and has been removed to a London hospital.

transferred to another unit, and since last June he was in the trenches in Belgium.

Sister Lives Here. Two weeks ago Pte. E. H. Patten, formerly attached to the office staff of the Maple Leaf Milling Co., was killed in action.

Reported wounded on September 20th, Pte. John Donaldson Brown, 88 Oiler avenue, is now reported to have died of wounds on Sept. 24, at Lestreport. He enlisted in January, 1916, and was in the trenches since April.

While being removed in an ambulance to a dressing station, Pte. J. W. Graham, died of gunshot wounds in the stomach. He left for overseas last May and spent his 25th birthday in the trenches.

On September 13, Pte. M. H. Moore, son of Police Magistrate Moore, of Parry Sound, was killed in action. Pte. Moore was well-known in Toronto and was with the signallers last winter at the Exhibition.

Going overseas with the 51st Battalion, Pte. Walter Cade, 168 McCaul street, was transferred to the mounted rifles, and was so badly wounded that he died after being removed to a hospital.

Pte. F. Leach, a Yorkshireman who was in Canada 11 years, has died of wounds. His widow and family live at 30 Nairn avenue, and Pte. Leach was drafted to the firing line soon after he arrived in England, as he had previous military service.

Wounded some months ago in the chest, Pte. Frank Dewars, 46 Shaftesbury avenue, returned to the trenches in August, and on September 20th, was wounded in the hand by gunshot, and has been removed to a hospital. He first entered the trenches in January.

Seriously ill. Lance-Corporal John Cameron, is seriously ill suffering from a wound in his right thigh. He enlisted in November, 1915, and went overseas the following May. His wife, who lives at 44 Melville avenue, states that in the last letter from her husband he did not inform her that he was in the trenches.

With severe wounds in the thigh, head and hand, Pte. John Fox has been admitted to Northampton Hospital, England. During the battle of Zillebeke he was buried twice by explosions and was one of the four to escape from his platoon alive. He is the only

son of Mrs. Mary Fox, 39 Woodward avenue.

Gunner J. A. MacDonald, 41 Macdonnell avenue, is reported at Royal Surrey County Hospital, Guildford, with wound in the back. A brother, gunner Kenneth MacDonald, was killed in action on May 31 last.

Eighteen years old, Pte. W. M. Haslam was killed in action on Sept. 13, 1916. In the fall of 1914 he enlisted with the C. M. F., and lived with his sister at 35 Clinton street. He was eight months in the trenches.

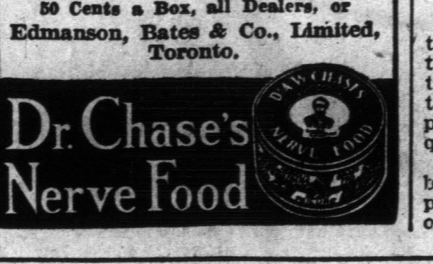
Pte. Stanley Russell, 35 Prospect street left his insurance business at Fort Stanley to enlist and is reported wounded. He is in a hospital in England with a gunshot wound in his shoulder.

Recognized as an expert bomb thrower, Pte. S. E. McConnell, 703 Lansdowne avenue, has died of wounds. He enlisted in April, 1915, and went overseas with the 56th Battalion from Exhibition Camp. He was in the trenches six months.

Mrs. Ribey, 30 Belmont street, has received word that her son, Pte. A. E. Ribey, has been shot in the jaw. He has been admitted to a hospital at Rouen, France. He enlisted with the 51st Battalion and was transferred.

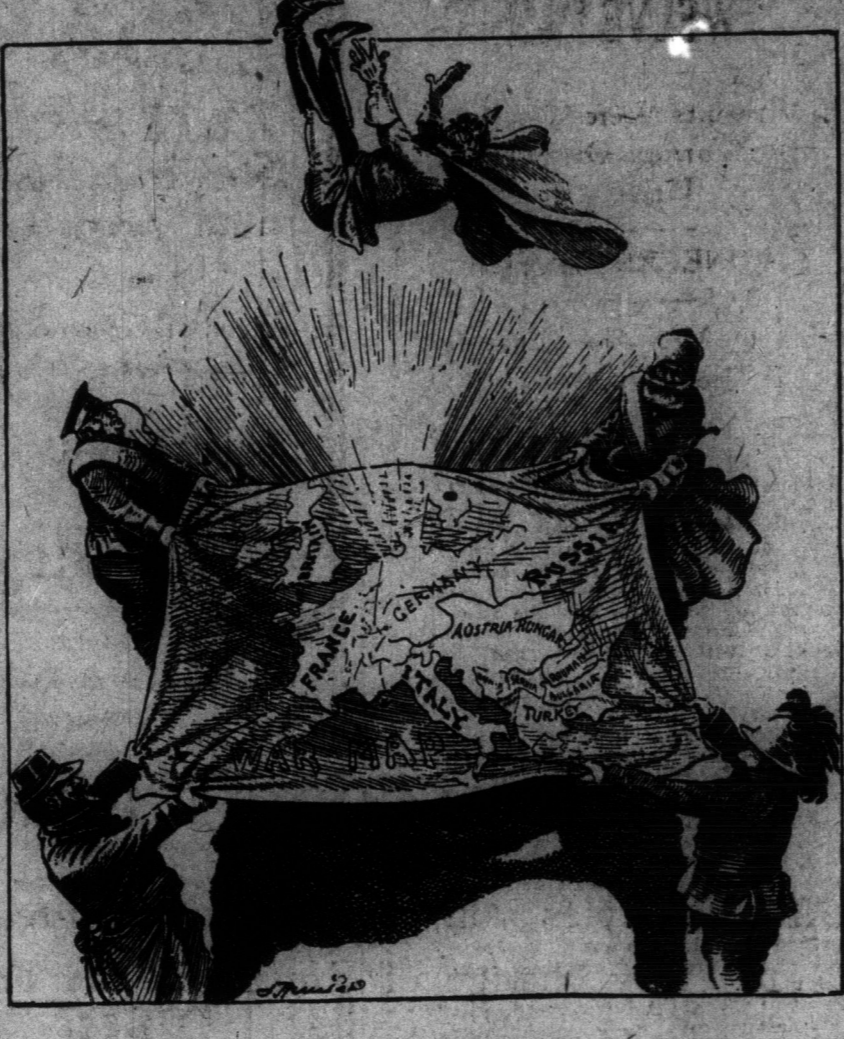
