In Spite of the Ringing of Fire Bells During His Speech the Man From Manitoulin Makes an Impression on Electors of Durham.

Bowmanville, Oct. 13.—(Staff Special.)—The gamey meeting was held tonight in the splendid chamber of the new town hall, which was crowded with Albert Barber, secretary of the Durham County Conservative Association, president, and on the platform were Col. "What did the electors of Durham owe him? He pursued us like a sleuthhound after the election of 1900, until he finally succeeded in getting me elected in the house of commons," said Mr. Thornton. "He was the man who was above every other man, who disapproved you one whole year, and you finally you by coming to ask you to send him there as your representative."

Col. Ward received with flattering enthusiasm. After 30 years personal acquaintance with Mr. Aylesworth he would still acquire why he had come to contest Durham. Edinburgh, Oct. 13.—The Duke of Cornaught, brother of King Edward, while driving in a motor car, was thrown out of a street car, collided with a cart. The overhanging portion of the cart struck the rear seat of the automobile and literally carried away that section of the vehicle. The duke was thrown out with great force.

As soon as the automobile could be stopped, Major Murray, who was in the car with the duke, whom he found unconscious and bleeding from wounds about the head. At the time the automobile reached Edinburgh the duke had recovered and was able to walk into his hotel.

After two stitches were taken in his ear and his hurts had been examined by a physician it was announced that the duke would suffer no serious consequences, but he had received a severe shock and a concussion of the brain. Major Murray was not hurt.

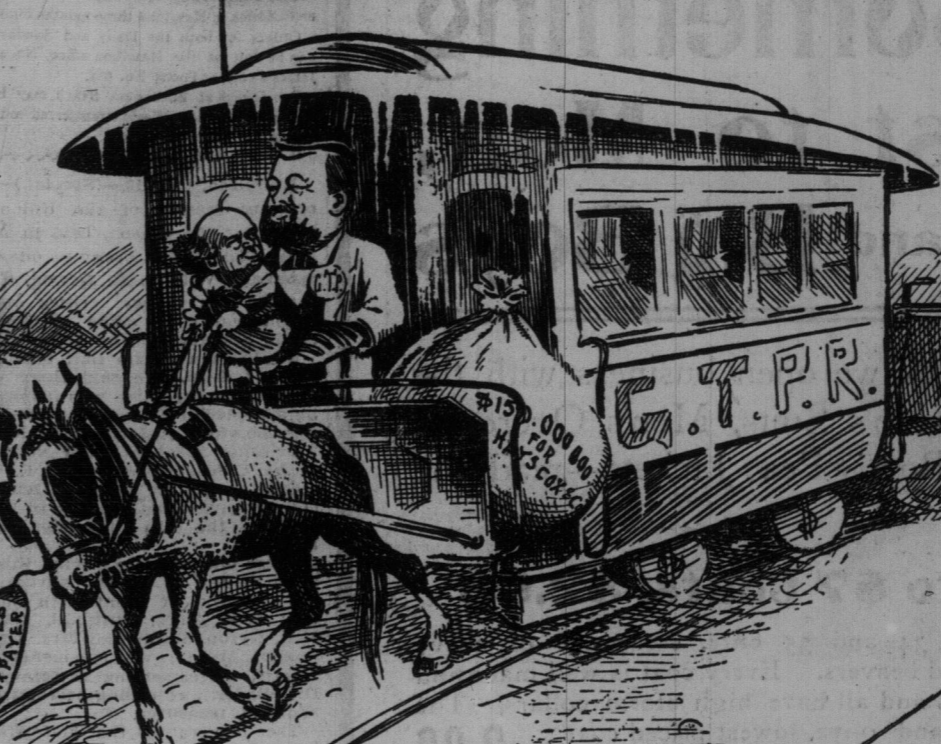

ERIC ARMOUR MAKES HIS BOW IN HIS NATIVE TOWN BEFORE CONSERVATIVES

Hon. George E. Foster Assists His Campaign in the Riding of Northumberland, Criticizing G.T.P. Contract.

Cobourg, Oct. 13.—(Special.)—The opening of the Conservative campaign in West Northumberland at the instigation of Eric Armour, the candidate, was attended by one of the largest crowds ever seen at a political meeting in Cobourg—hundreds being turned away from the opera house. For over two hours the attentive audience listened to the remarks of the speaker of the evening, George E. Foster. The president of the local party, Dr. Hays, occupied the chair, and in a few well chosen remarks introduced the popular candidate, Eric Armour.

Mr. Armour, who captured the hearts of his hearers at the start—his reception being a signal triumph for the young candidate—made a brief address. He confined himself to the incidents preceding his election and closed with a reference to the childish interview his opponent, J. B. McLeod, had with certain Toronto papers, and with a stirring appeal for the electors' support.

He then gave way to Mr. Foster, who was in the field, and in his usual manner, said it was a good thing to have young men enter public life, and men were inclined to get too narrow, whereas young men are always inspired by high ideas. No citizen but would feel ashamed of public affairs as they have been in Ontario especially, and when public life reaches such degeneration as all have been compelled to witness, and public sentiment becomes too weak to protest, then it is time to close our schools and even places of worship.

He referred to provincial affairs because it could only be too clearly seen that it was the Liberal machine which had assisted the Ross government, so strongly and desperately and was now, as events of the last few days had shown, preparing to assist Sir Wilfrid Laurier at Ottawa.

Mr. Foster presented the several great points of the Liberal policy which had been purloined from that of the Conservative policy already laid down previous to 1896. He pointed out the audience of the reckless expenditure of public money.

By clearing Mr. Foster dissected the G.T.P. contract, pointing out its utter looseness and characterizing it as the most outrageous and dishonest contract ever passed thru parliament.

If to-night's Conservative gathering may be taken as an augury, the result will represent West Northumberland at the next session. At no opening has so fitting a candidate as Mr. Armour been tendered a candidate of either party in Northumberland.

Conservatives endorse Mr. Armour. Brandon, Man., Oct. 13.—(Special.)—The Conservative convention assembled here today unanimously endorsed Mr. Armour, already nominated as an independent candidate for the public ownership of railways as their candidate to oppose Clifford Sifton in Brandon. In accepting Mr. Richard, the speaker, he stated that the ownership of the trans-continental railroad was the paramount issue in the election, and that it was his duty to support Mr. Armour, who he knew intimately, respected and could follow with a good conscience. He also stated the position of Hon. Hugh John Macdonald for duty-free farmers' implements. The meeting followed by an address by anti-socialist applicants. Subsequently the meeting adjourned in St. Matthew's Hall, where the candidate addressed a large and appreciative audience. Mr. Armour stands a good chance of defeating the minister of the interior.

KUROPAKIN WHIPPED

General Oku's Army Alone Captured 25 Guns, While Enemy Was Repulsed With Heavy Slaughter All Along the Line.

No appreciable progress has been made in the projected advance southward of the Russian army under Gen. Kuropakin since the initial success of the movement in the capture of the Japanese battery. Fighting of the most stubborn description continues along practically the entire front. Field Marshal Oyama reports the capture of 30 guns from the Russians and claims distinct success in forcing the Russians to evacuate some of their advanced positions. Gen. Kuropakin's report to Emperor Nicholas is couched in guarded terms and claims nothing in the way of accomplished results. Reports from the Russian military commander at Port Arthur show that the Japanese have brought a shell to bear upon the inner fortress. The garrison, however, is represented to be hopeful of the outcome of the siege.

Russians Retreat. Field Headquarters of the Japanese Left Army, Oct. 12, 5 p.m., via Pusan, Oct. 14.—The left army made an advance last night and early this morning occupied a position close to a village and field occupied by the Japanese. The Japanese attacked along the whole line, driving the Russians out of the positions which they retired to yesterday. At 3 o'clock this afternoon the Russians were retreating northward in disorder. The Japanese captured a complete Russian battery. The Japanese are pursuing and shelling the retreating Russians, whose loss is probably large.

Russians Beaten. Tokyo, Oct. 13.—(G. p.m.)—It is yet too early to measure the results of the tremendous struggle which has been raging for the past three days south of the Japanese line. Reports reaching Tokyo indicate that Gen. Kuropakin has been decisively whipped and repulsed in his attempt to reach the front. The Russian commander was evidently caught while making his dispositions with his forces scattered and he was beaten before he could recover.

Much depends on the ability and resourcefulness of the Japanese commander and following up their advantages. Kuropakin may turn up on favorable ground, but he is being beaten back by the Japanese onslaught, but the tide seems against him.

The Japanese yesterday began a desperate effort to turn the Russian right, and if this effort should be successful it will carry disaster to the Russian line.

The struggle around Benish is being followed with interest here. It is estimated at 5000, and its isolation or loss would be a severe blow.
