One example may be given. Not far from St. Hyacinthe, Quebec, 100 cows produced 104,854 pounds of milk more during 1916 than 100 did in 1915. The

1915 records showed that ten were not paying, so they were beefed, and again in 1916 cleven were sent to the block, being replaced by better milkers. Better feeding contributed largely to this noted big increase in milk yield; more corn was fed, more clover and a little higher meal ration higher meal ration.
