# REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EXAMINERS, 1892.

The Board of Examiners reported as follows:-

Seventy-six candidates presented themselves for examination; and in most cases were successful.

It is an evidence of the marvellous growth of our Conference that the

number of candidates is increasing so rapidly from year to year.

In 1886, there were fifteen candidates; in 1887, fifteen; in 1888, twenty-six; in 1889, forty-seven; in 1890, sixty-one; in 1891, sixty; and in 1892, seventy-six.

Regulations as follows :-

1. All candidates who intend writing on the Preliminary Course shall send intimation of the same to the Chairman of the District in which they

reside, not later than the first day of March.

2. Examiners shall forward to the Secretary of the Examining Board, not later than the first day of March, manuscript questions on the subjects allotted to them, which shall be printed under the supervision of the Secretary and forwarded by him to the Chairmen of Districts, not later than the 15th of March.

3. The examinations shall be conducted in each District where there are candidates, on the third Wednesday in April, by the Chairman and members of the Board resident within the District; but, in cases where the distances are very great the President may grant permission to Chairmen to arrange for examination of candidates under supervision of the nearest ordained minister.

4. Time shall be considered an element in the examinations; and, in all cases shall be strictly adhered to. Each examiner shall specify the time

allowed for writing the paper set by him.

5. That each paper be valued at one hundred marks.

6. All the subjects duplicated in the Arts Course shall be given to the

men to whom they are assigned in the ordinary course of study.

# REPORT OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF WESLEY COLLEGE.

The Board of Directors of Wesley College take pleasure in stating that the year just closed has been an exceedingly prosperous and successful one in every respect. This success we feel is largely due to the hearty and unwavering interest displayed by all of the members of this Conference in its behalf, and to the ready and cheerful responses for financial assistance, secured mainly through their influence, nobly aided by Principal Sparling, who has been indefatigable in his efforts to promote the best interests of the College.

The first item of importance to which your attention is directed, is the procuring of a college site. Owing to the fact that building sites in this city were being rapidly taken up, and that unless decided action were soon taken, it might prove difficult for the Board to obtain such a property as would be deemed satisfactory, it seemed advisable to advertise and if possible obtain possession of a site suitable for college purposes at an early

With this object in view, therefore, the matter was thoroughly disdate. cussed and various available sites carefully examined, ending at length in the selection of a most desirable piece of property of about five acres in extent facing Portage Avenue, and but a short distance west of Manitoba College, so near, in fact, that it is hoped that, when a college building shall have been erected thereon, the system of inter-collegiate lectures at present existing between Manitoba and Wesley Colleges may be greatly extended, an event which would be beneficial to both. The purchase price of this site was \$17,200.

In order to assist in providing for the payment of this sum, it was thought desirable that the Principal should be relieved from college duties for a time in order that he might institute a thorough canvass among the friends of the College in the eastern provinces. The result of his efforts in this direction were very gratifying, the details of which will appear in

the report of the Bursar appended hereto.

In the same report also, it will appear that the total amount placed to the credit of the College Sustentation Fund during the year has been \$6,780.55, a fact which reflects very great credit on the liberality of our people, and for which the Board desires to express its warmest appreciation. It is hoped that the substantial aid hitherto given may continue undiminished, since in order to maintain the College in its present state of efficiency and to place it on such a footing as to enable it to keep pace with the other colleges affiliated with the University, it is necessary to ask you for aid on the same percentage basis as that asked for last year, and to this request the Board feels assured that a hearty response will be accorded.

The attendance this year has been exceedingly encouraging. So large has been the number of students in the various departments that the building at present occupied has been taxed to its utmost to accommodate them, and it is a further source of gratification, that the increase of our own students has had no appreciable effect on the attendance at the other

affiliated colleges. The total number of registered students in all departments during the session was sixty, being an increase of twenty-one over last year. These were distributed as follows in the various years and departments:-

Of these students more than thirty are studying with the view of entering the Methodist ministry, while not more than one-half of these thirty are

Conference students. The Faculty of the College expresses itself as well pleased with the work done by our students during the year. At the recent University examinations, several in the higher years succeeded in carrying off some of the highest honors of the University, including the Governor-General's silver medal, the bronze medal in Mental and Moral Science and several scholarships. In the Previous and Preliminary years, however, the stand taken by our students indicates clearly the need of a well-equipped preparatory department, and until the College funds are sufficient to warrant the expense of one or more additional tutors in the work for the Preliminary examination, we need scarcely expect our Junior students to rank high in the University class lists.

The aims of the course of study prescribed for these primary examinations are the imparting of general scholarship and the broadening of the student's intellectual capabilities, with the view of better fitting him for the prosecution of the special lines of study, provided by the remaining portion of the University course. Hence we would emphasize the importance of thorough work in these years, even though the attainment of this end may necessitate an additional year's preparation. Just at this point

of his course it will pay the student well to hasten slowly.

The system of intercollegiate lectures in Natural Science, of which mention was made in our last report, and which was endorsed by the Conference a year ago, has been continued throughout the present year, greatly to the interest of all the colleges concerned. It would be impossible for us at present to cover this work as satisfactorily or as thoroughly as it is We therefore hail with being done under the present arrangement. pleasure the action of the University Council in again endorsing this system, and voting a small sum for properly carrying it out.

In addition to the College Literary Society, which has now been in successful operation for the past three years, we are pleased to announce that the students have this year instituted a Young Men's Christian Association, of which the majority of the students are members, and regular meetings of the same have been held weekly throughout the

Session.

In concluding we desire to express our thanks to those who have assisted the College, and thereby the students, by contributions to the Library and Reading-room, and especially to the Rev. Dr. Young, whose contributions to these departments have been very liberal. Further donations of a similar character will be highly appreciated and thankfully received.

# CHURCH PROPERTY COMMITTEE.

That the request of the Trustees of Burnside and Prospect, to sell the two lots owned by them in Portage la Prairie, be granted. That any surplus of money accruing from the sale of the Burnside and Prospect property ordered to be sold, be equally divided between Burnside and Prospect Circuits.

To keep up this record, and make Sunday School work thorough, it is imperative that the Catechism have a more prominent place in the studies of the school, both for teachers and scholars. Inasmuch as out of a total of 10,228 scholars only 900 study the Catechism, your Committee suggest not only that greater attention be given to this subject during the sessions of the schools, but that each minister be requested to form Catechumen classes with suitable leaders, in which classes the practical study of the Catechism shall have a prominent place. In the hope that it may stimulate some schools to do better in this line, we give the figures by Districts. In Winnipeg District, 394 children study the Catechism; in Morden District, 45; Crystal City, 124; Deloraine, 14; Portage la Prairie, 143; Birtle, 10; Brandon, 42; Regina, 82; Calgary, 34; Saskatchewan, 12. We are glad to report that the following number of copies of our Sunday

School papers have been taken during the last year: Onward, 2,733; Pleasant Hours, 2,616; Happy Days, 2,237; Sunbeam, 2,105; Berean Leaf, 4,084; Sunday School Banner, 758. The number of other periodicals taken by our schools is 1,056. Your Committee notes that there is an increase of 234 in this number for the past year, and respectfully urges that all our schools patronize our own Book Room for their papers and

Only thirteen schools hold regular teachers' meetings for the study of libraries. the lesson, as compared with twenty last year. It would be well for every pastor and school superintendent to see that such meetings are held in connection with each school, for this course will not only promote greater knowledge of the lessons, but tend to increased spirituality both in teach-

In every case where it is advisable we would urge that Methodist ing and results. Sunday Schools be established, and that our own usages, doctrines and

literature be introduced and maintained. On several Districts Sunday School conventions have been held with very good results, and your Committee respectfully urges that this admirable practice be adopted in each District, if at all possible.

The number of Sunday Schools in the Conference is 189, with 10,228 scholars, an increase during the year of nineteen schools and 1,000 scholars.

The Committee recommend that J. J. Young be the Secretary-Treasurer for the ensuing year, and beg to report that the amount of money raised by our schools for all purposes during the year is \$8,918.25, an increase over the previous year of \$1,651.14. The amount raised for missionary purposes was \$732.20, an increase of \$104.45. In this connection your Committee is of the opinion that much more might be done by our schools for missions, and would recommend that each school be requested to take

up a missionary collection once a month.

The number of scholars returned as having taken the total abstinence pledge is 3,082, a gratifying increase of 436. As there appears to have been some misunderstanding in regard to this point in the schedule, your Committee recommend that the total abstinence column be understood as intended to include not only those who have taken a pledge during the preceding year, but all pledged total abstainers in our Sunday Schools.

# REPORT OF THE TEMPERANCE COMMITTEE.

We recommend that the following letter on the subject of Prohibition be adopted and issued by this Conference, with a strong recommendation that it be printed in the leading newspapers, and read to all our congregations by the ministers and probationers, as a clear expression of the opinions of the Methodist Church of Manitoba and the North West on this subject.

We further recommend that on the Sabbath that this letter is read, a sermon shall be preached on some phase of this subject, which action should be taken not more than four weeks before the next Provincial elections.

The Manitoba and North-West Conference to the members and adherents of the Methodist Church:-

Considering that the prohibition of the traffic in intoxicating liquors claims the earnest attention and support of all Christian people, we deem it expedient to address to you a few words on this important subject. your loyal support along the line of action indicated.

1. The attitude of the Methodist Church toward the liquor traffic has been from the beginning one of unabating opposition. We declare it to be offensive to God and ruinous to man, a deadly foe to the happiness, morality, and prosperity of any people. We strenuously urge that total abstinence for the individual, and total prohibition for the state, are principles which claim our unhesitating support as a Christian Church.

2. We believe and teach that the liquor traffic cannot be licensed without sin. Into the licensed bar-room men are tempted in social and business intercourse, and speedily the habit of social treating ripens into the habit of drunkenness. We appeal to you to unite with us in securing the outlawry of this abomination of desolation—the licensed bar-room—in every community, by using your vote and influence against the granting of licenses. When the traffic is outlawed we believe it to be the patriotic duty of every citizen to secure the suppression of

all illicit traffic by aggressive legal measures.

3. We are aware of the widespread indignation regarding the very inefficient enforcement of prohibitory laws against the liquor traffic. The burden of securing evidence, and of bearing expenses of prosecution is too frequently thrown upon private citizens. We believe that the Government should as strictly enforce the laws against law-breakers of the saloon as against any class When the Government refuses to do this it is guilty of an executive weakness against which we protest. This weakness cannot be remedied if we lessen our efforts or compromise with the foe, but only by patient, persistent agitation directed toward clearing out of all public offices incompetent idlers and sympathizers with the liquor traffic.

4. We rejoice in the fact that an advance has been made by the Manitoba Legislature in calling for a plebiscite vote upon Prohibition, and we pledge

ourselves to use our votes and influence in favor of Prohibition.

5. We regret to learn that the Prohibitory law, imperfect though it was, in the North-West Territories has been repealed in favor of a license law. This has been followed, we are credibly informed, by a greater flood of intoxicating liquors than has ever before been witnessed. We urge the Temperance people of the Territories to roll back this flood of iniquity, and unite with Manitoba in bringing this great land under the rule of Prohibition, strictly enforced.

6. We recognize the fact that a prohibitory law without a Government in sympathy with it, to enforce it as part of its policy, would be a dead law upon our statute books. The inconsistency of professedly temperance voters, who preached Prohibition and voted against it in the election of their candidates, has in the past defeated their own desire for a prohibitory law. Also, by duplicity and craftiness designing politicians have in times past deceived and duped the people in their dealing with this question. We therefore urge the Christian men of our Church, and of others also, who love their country, to use their votes and influence to secure the election of legislators whose past record is clean, and who have shown before their nomination a sympathy with the Prohibition movement. Sudden conversions of candidates for office to this cause on the eve of an election are often spurious, and followed by grievous backs'iding. The time has, in our opinion, come when the Church of God, of which the Methodist Church is an influential part, should definitely and forever separate itself from the liquor traffic, and oppose any Government which leans upon the liquor traffic for support.

7. We further, as a Conference, pledge ourselves to support, so far as is consistent with the fundamental principles of the Christian religion, those Governments which will secure and efficiently enforce in Manitoba and the North-West a law prohibiting the sale, manufacture, and importation, of intoxicating liquors.

8. We recommend those interested in the Prohibition movement to correspond, for information regarding organization, with Mr. W. R. Mulock, President of the Prohibition League, Winnipeg, or with the Secretary of the Alliance.

### REPORT OF SABBATH OBSERVANCE COMMITTEE.

1. Your Committee beg leave to report that they have given their best attention to the consideration of the important question of Sabbath observance, and regret that in many particulars the public conscience requires education, even nominal Christians often taking too low ground in the matter of keeping the Lord's day inviolate.

2. We would call attention to the evils arising from the perusal of improper literature—secular and Sunday newspapers of irreligious and unprofitable character—and would urge our people to abstain therefrom and discountenance such customs in others.

3. We deplore also the tendencies in many to social visiting and amusements that are contrary to the spirit of the decalogue, viz.: Boating fishing and shooting.

4. We would especially urge the need of rest from all labor, save that which is absolutely needful and in spirit with the teachings of Christ.

5. We pray that the time may soon come when legislation will prevail, prohibiting all traffic and travelling upon the Lord's day by public conveyance, railroads and steamboats and street cars, except in cases of positive necessity.

6. We call attention to the Saturday night business custom as being a great wrong and an evil of such magnitude as to deserve consideration, and would urge agitation upon the need of closing all stores and shops at six o'clock on Saturdays in preparation for the proper observance of God's day of worship and rest.

7. We sincerely deplore the fact that no less than six communications regarding the opening of post offices and distribution of mail upon the Sabbath have been forwarded to this Conference, Lethbridge, of the Territories, being a special case.

Your Committee believe that a strong protest should be made by this Conference against the action of the post office Government officials in this matter, as no good can accrue to the people by such a procedure, but much that is harmful.

And whereas an earnest effort on the part of the Christian people of that community has been made to have the order of the Postmaster-General rescinded, and urgent requests from them to secure the support of this Conference.

We recommend that the following resolution be adopted by this Conference and forwarded by the Secretary to the proper authority:—

That whereas, a great wrong is being done to the postmaster and violence to the public conscience of the town of Lethbridge, in the necessity laid upon them by the order of the Postmaster-General to keep the office open during certain hours of the Christian Sabbath, and as it has

### REPORT OF EPWORTH LEAGUE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee met as directed and carefully looked into the work committed to them. In comparing the present position of this Society with that of a year ago, we find that only in one point was there any tabulation of League statistics last year, viz., that of finance; hence our comparison must be very limited. But the amount of money raised by the Society is over four times that of last year, and we have reason to believe that the strength of it in the Church, and its usefulness to the Church have increased in a similar ratio.

We find within the bounds of this Conference thirty Leagues, with a membership of 1,154, and the sum of \$607.65 raised by them. Besides these there are a number of Societies of Christian Endeavor which have not taken upon them the name Epworth League, although the work they are doing is identical with that done by many of the Leagues.

The following recommendations are made by the Committee:

1. That all young people's societies connected with our Church be as far as practicable affiliated with the Epworth League of Christian Endeavor, that we may be able fully to report the work done by our young people.

2. That the spiritual side of the work be kept uppermost, pointing to the fact that the departments of Christian Endeavor and Religious Work may be organized without the other departments if necessary.

3. That we urge the desirability of establishing Leagues as far as

practicable in every place.

4. That local and district unions of Leagues be formed in which to discuss methods of work and subjects of interest to them. All of which is respectfully submitted.

### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE WORK.

The experiences of former years have in a general way been repeated during 1891-2. There have been advances all along the line. Our Church has shared in the general development of the country. The returns show an increase of 1,512 in the membership, which gives us a total of 12,962 as composing our communion roll. This increase is due partly to immigration, but in a larger degree is the result of faithful evangelistic effort.

Honorable mention might be made of the labors of Messrs. Crossley and Hunter, at a number of towns along the main line of the C.P.R.; of those of the Misses Judd, in Southern Manitoba; and of the successful work of Misses Williams and Hossie, in the north-western portion of the province.

Whilst acknowledging the advantages of special evangelistic effort, the quiet, persevering, everyday work of pastors and their associates in the membership of the Church should not be overlooked or undervalued—the sowing of the seed, and the conservation of the results being as important a work as the gathering of the harvest. Many a small appointment, distant from the pastor's home, has had regular preaching and other service, the year round, often at considerable self-denial, especially to the minister. This has been accomplished, as well as much other work of a commonplace nature and destitute of any striking present results, so far as appears, yet of great importance to the few at present concerned, and possibly to multitudes who in the future shall reap benefits from these self-denying labors.

There are indications that a considerable increase in the staff of preachers will be required to occupy new fields, which have lately been formed.

Recent railway extensions have opened up some very desirable sections of country. Settlement is increasing rapidly in the Red Deer and Edmonton country, and in southern Alberta, in the vicinity of Prince Albert, and in other sections of the Regina District. The opening of the Souris Branch of the C.P.R. has been followed by a rush of settlers into southwestern Manitoba and the south eastern portion of Assiniboine. A new mission was formed in the early part of the year, in the north-western portion of the Birtle District, among settlers who had lately emigrated from South Dakota. Most of these were members or adherents of the Methodist Church, in former years, in the Province of Ontario. Brother Lawford was sent to minister to these new-comers. His zeal, prudence, and success are worthy of special mention. Though his ministry commenced in this new field only last fall, he reports one church built, and another in course of erection. A gracious revival almost immediately followed the dedication of the church, and a membership of thirty-nine is reported on this mission, which is scarcely nine months old. This and other instances similar, with more or less striking evidences of early and signal successes, justify the wisdom of our Church's policy in occupying the Territory as fully as possible and as early as possible, no matter how weak the beginnings, nor how crude and unpromising the surroundings. We "know not which shall prosper, this or that." More efficient and more comprehensive work might have been done had our ministerial supply been more complete. It has been difficult to procure all the young men who were needed to supply the demand. The outlook for the coming year is more hopeful in this regard. Not only are doors being opened on every

hand in this new country, but within the last few weeks a larger number of young men than usual, and so far as can be judged, of the right kind, have responded to the call and said, "Here are we, send us" Surely these, as well as all others in this Conference, shall have the prayers, sympathy and practical support of the people among whom they may labor during this year—and that this work, which is second to none in importance under the care of our Church, may more fully attract the attention and awaken the sympathies of our Methodism throughout this entire Dominion.

Notwithstanding the scarcity of money there has been no diminution in the contributions of our people for all local and connexional purposes.

The amount raised for all purposes was \$165,995.69, being an increase

of \$31,025.97.

Your Committee learn with deep gratitude that the ministerial ranks of our Conference have been unbroken by death during the year, yet some who have been intimately identified with our work, though not formally connected with our official staff, have passed from labor to reward. The Methodists of Manitoba, with very many others, mourn the death of the Rev. Bidwell Lane, D.D., distinguished no less for his personal worth than for his pre-eminent abilities as a minister of the gospel. The efficient services rendered in various parts of this Province by Dr. Lane during the last months of his life will long be held in appreciative regard by thousands who were privileged to enjoy his ministrations.

Miss Nettie Judd passed away in the bloom of early life, and in the midst of successful labors. She "ceased at once to work and live." During the year many were led to the Saviour through the instrumentality of this devoted Christian, and her no less devoted sister. "She rests from

her labors, and her works do follow her."

The following, from the pen of Rev. John McDougall, will reveal the

condition of the Indian work:

Our work during the year amongst the Indians living within the borders of this Conference has gone on in such manner as to cause great encour-

agement to those engaged in it.

Steadily and surely the people are coming out into the light of gospel truth, and there has been awakened in their whole life a strong desire for better things. The years of planting have been followed by anxious periods of watching and working and waiting on the part of your missionaries, but now they are rejoiced to see that the seed is germinating, the plant is growing, and the recently barbarous and heathen man is grasping the blessed truth. And thus we who are in the field are being brought face to face with the fact that heartfelt Christianity is becoming established among the different tribes to whom we minister in connection with this Conference.

In the west a new Mission among the Stonies and Crees has been undertaken, and we hope during the present summer to have erected suitable

Mission buildings at White Whale Lake and Riviere Qui Barre.

The long-looked-for Industrial School at Red Deer is now being built, and we have reasonable hope that it will be occupied during the coming year. In the north all our mission field was gone over by the Rev. Messrs. Semmens and McDougall, and both the missionaries and Indians at our Missions were greatly encouraged and stirred to more active

Christian work. A strong desire was formed in the minds of our people for more and better educational facilities, which we hope will be open to them in measure when the Industrial School at Brandon is ready for work.

METHODIST CONFERENCE.

The school and mission work begun a short time since at White Cap's Reserve, near Moose Woods, has developed wonderfully. Order has come out of chaos, and Christianity and civilization are now working hand in hand at that spot, and nowhere has the Church more faithful or successful workers than Bro. Tucker and his noble wife.

During the year the Indian Department was applied to for the transfer of some day schools (hitherto under the management of the Department) to the management and control of our Church, and as this request was granted we hope to very much improve those schools, and make them more helpful to the people than heretofore.

Application was also made to the Government asking that all our day schools be put on the same basis as those of other denominations, which request was also granted by the Department. This will be a considerable help in income to our Missionary Society. Also an additional grant of \$12.00 per capita per annum has been secured from the Government for the McDougall Orphanage and Industrial School at Morley.

Altogether the Church need not be in any wise ashamed because of her Indian Missions in this new land. The work is growing, the people are advancing; Christian lives and triumphant Christian deaths are surely manifest evidence that God is with His people in this matter.

Your Committee conclude their report by recording their profound gratitude to Almighty God for the success of the year, and ventures to express the hope that increased influence, riper experience, and greater activities on the part of both ministers and people may, with the blessing of God, result in yet more glorious conquests in the future.

# REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON A CHURCH PAPER.

Your Committee are of the opinion that the time is approaching when it will be necessary to start a Church paper in the Conference, and while we recognize the enterprise of the publishers of the *Methodist Gleaner*, yet we are not clear as to the expediency of any publication without the direct supervision and control of the Conference.

We therefore recommend that this Conference appoint a Committee to gather such information as to the publishing of a Church paper for this Conference, so that the whole question may be intelligently placed before our next Annual Conference and preparatory to General Conference action.

### REPORT OF EVANGELISTIC COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg leave to report as follows:-

1. Re Brandon District resolution on Conference services. That inasmuch as full and adequate provision is now made in the ordinary routine business of Conference for all necessary discussion on the subjects of Temperance and our Sunday School interests, and inasmuch as it is exceedingly desirable that our Annual Conference gatherings be made as profitable as possible to the members in attendance, and also to the people where the Conference may be held,

We therefore recommend the Committee on Conference services next year to arrange for the Educational Meeting and the Missionary Anniversary as formerly; also that sufficient time be allowed the young men at the Friday night meeting, to permit, if possible, all to speak, and that the remaining evenings during Conference sessions be set apart for religious or evangelistic services.

2. While we recognize with deep gratitude to God the very efficient services rendered by many special evangelistic agents on several Circuits and Missions during the past year, we would urge our people to heartily unite with their own pastors in seeking to promote the work of God on their respective fields.

We would further recommend that the first week in August be observed by our ministers and people as a week of special prayer for the Baptism of the Holy Spirit upon our work this year, and that wherever practicable arrangements be made at the Financial District Meeting, in accordance with section 167, sub-section 4 of Discipline, so that systematic and united efforts be made for the promotion of the spiritual interests of the Church by means of special Revival Services on every field of the District.

# PASTORAL ADDRESS.

# TO THE MEMBERS AND ADHERENTS OF THE METHODIST CHURCH IN THE MANITOBA AND NORTH WEST CONFERENCE.

Dearly Beloved,—"Blessed be God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who according to His abundant mercy hath begotten us again unto a lively hope by the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, to an inheritance incorruptible, and undefiled, and that fadeth not away, reserved in heaven for you, who are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation, ready to be revealed in the last time."

By the mercy of God, the history of another year has been recorded, and with profoundest gratitude we are able to report that our Divine Master has blessed the consecrated toil of His people, and given His work success. Our Church in this country has so rapidly extended that there are now 12,962 members, an increase of 1,512 during the past year. Associated with these are adherents to the Methodist Church, forming a constituency of about 38,886 Methodists within the boundaries of our Annual Conference. The liberality of our people has been shown in the contribution of \$165,995.69 for the maintenance of the work of God among us. There has been a gratifying increase in every department of our work, for which we are deeply grateful to God.

Our privileges lie in a country of immeasurably glorious possibilities. We are helping to make history that ought to be resplendent with the fruitage of the Gospel. Remember that the opportunities of life are fugitive, and that if we are unfaithful, and tardy in honoring our privileges, the agencies of evil stand ready to mar the history of our land with the features of sin.

Be a spiritual people. Communion with God and obedience to moral law are of supreme importance. Let scriptural holiness characterize your life. Carry religion into your business, and whether you eat or drink, or whatever you do, do all to the glory of God. Then carry business into your religion. No matter how few you may be, organize, and begin aggressive work for God in your community. Be all at it, and always at it. Draw largely from the store of heaven, and divinely-equipped, plan and push on toward glorious conquest. After every method has been tested, the practical verdict of the Churches is, that you cannot improve upon the plan of work followed by our own Church. So in evangelistic, Sunday School and social work, let us adhere to our own literature, and constitutional methods.

Be pronounced in your temperance principles. Carefully and prayerfully use the franchise for the total suppression of the liquor traffic. Let every

home be supplied with our own Church papers, and let your homes be sanctified by the Word of God and systematic prayer.

We commend Wesley College to your liberal support. A great work for the present, and especially the future of our Church in this land, is

being done by Wesley College. And now, dearly beloved, profoundly grateful for the success with which the Great Head of the Church has crowned our past toil, let us, by absolute devotion and unqualified trust and prompt obedience, make the future a glorious improvement upon the past.

"Now the God of peace, that brought again from the dead our Lord Jesus, that great Shepherd of the sheep, through the blood of the everlasting covenant, make you perfect in every good work to do His will, working in you that which is wellpleasing in His sight, through Jesus Christ; to whom be glory for ever and ever, Amen."
