RUSSIAN OFFENSIVE SUCCESSFUL, REPORTED FROM CZAR'S CAPITAL

Situation In Roumania Still Regarded as Critical, However, Though Ferdinand's **Army Has Made Stand**

Petrograd, Dec. 1.—The Russian offensive has been successful, along the whole Roumanian frontier south of Kirlibaba, says the official statement issued today by the Russian war department. In spite of violent German counter attacks, the statement adds, the Russians occupied the whole range of heights. don, Dec. 1.-A Roumanian communique mentions violent fighting on

the Glavatziotzu river. This is regarded here as showing that the Roumanian retreat has halted and that a stand is being made on that stream to contest the advance on Bucharest from the west. There is nothing to indicate, however, whether this action is intended as a final effort to save the capital or whether it is merely a cover to permit the main Roumanian forces to take positions on the joined near the frontier north from Bucharest and along the whole Moldavian front, where the Russians are known to b operating with large forces.

Successes claimed by the Germans at Campulung and south of the capital impress the critics, however, more than any other feature of the struggle. It is admitted that Bucharest is in immediate danger and that the wasle situation in Roumania is very serious.

AID THE EMPIRE

Captain Ash of Calgary Has Had Interesting Career-Going to England to Break in Cavalry

Captain George Ash, a native of Calgary, a Texas Ranger, cowboy and soldier of fortune, arrived in the city yesterday, almost directly from the Mexican border. For twenty-four years he was in the saddle as cowboy, and has had a varied career as a member of Madero's army, and as a captain of 2,000 rangers from the Lone Star State.

When but a lad of ten, he left his home in Calgary to act as kitchen boy on a large ranch in El Paso, Texas. As he grew older he_left the kitchen crew to join the prairie riders. By dint of thrift and economy he was able to purchase a ranch of his own and stock it with 9,000 head of steers. Four years ago, at the time of the Mexican rebellion, his cattle ranch, known as the Bar L, was raided and his herd rustled off by 100 Mexican bandits. In the fight between the seven cowboys stationed at the ranch, and the bandits, eight of the latter were killed. He appealed to the Mexican and the American governments, but they were unable to aid him.

Making his way into the interior of Mexico to Juarez, then to Cascas Grande, and finally to Chichua, he joined a band of raiders and plundered Mexican towns. He took an active part in the Mexican rebellion as a member of Madero's forces. At the battle of Chichua he worked a machine gun unceasingly for thirty-six hours. In this battle, which took place in 1913, 1,000 Mexicans were killed. Captain Ash can not only vividly describe the harrowing scenes, but in the course of his travels he has accumulated pictures, which bear him out in his statements. For his brave work at Chichua he received a medal from Madero's which he now wears. Another gift that he prizes highly is a similar taken, given him by J. K. Turner, the author, for leading eighty-five Americans against a band of 400 Mexican outlaws at Mexicalla in 1914, and giving a severe thrashing to the larger force.

One of Captain Ash's most noteworthy feats is his horseback ride from Houston, Texas, to New York, a distance of 2,221 milles, in the remarkable time of sixty-six days. For nine months h
