

Conference Deplores Practice of

The report of the Committee on Evangelism and Social Service, which was presented to the Montreal Methodist Conference in Brockville this week, precipitated one of the most animated debates of the conference. The principal clauses in this report were as follows:

"Whereas the temperance situation in the Province of Quebec is in a very unsatisfactory condition owing to the great increase in the traffic in alcoholic beverages, made possible by the administration of the Quebec Liquor Act as at present carried out.

"Therefore, resolved that we hereby petition the Quebec Government to pass such legislation as shall result in the reduction of the sale of liquor to a minimum, with the object of its entire sup-
