

This map of the Salisbury Plain military district serves to indicate the positions of the several camps and the location of the Canadian companies. The cavalry and artillery are at Pond Farm Camp (7). To the south at West Down North Camp (4) were the 9th, 10th, 11th and 12th, until the heavy and continued rains forced them to move to Bulford Camp (8). The Highlanders, 18th, 14th, 15th and 16th battalions are at West Down South Camp. The 1st, 2nd, 8rd and 4th battalions and the Army Medical Corps are at Bustard Camp (6). The Princess Patricia Canadian light infantry was also encamped at this point. The latter regiment is now at Winchester. Some of the Canadian companies will go into shacks at Lark Hill Camp as soon as the structures are ready. The prisoners are situated about midway between Bustard (6), Rliestone (2), and Hamilton Camps. The distance from Bustard Camp to Salisbury is nine miles.

# MORNING CABLES ON THE WAR; DETAILS OF THE SEA VICTORY

London, Dec. 17, 10.50 p. m.—"The Russians are retiring along the entire front in Galicia and Poland." This statement, officially issued at Vienna, is the outstanding feature of tonight's news from the battlefronts.

While there is no confirmation of this from other sources, such a move on the part of the Russians would be quite in line with the announcements in despatches from Petrograd that the Russians, threatened on both flanks, had decided to take up new positions where they would better be able to meet the onslaughts which are being launched against them by the Austro-Germans from the Carpathians to the East Prussian fronties.

Should the Austro-German armies, as on previous occasions, follow the Russians in Poland another big battle will soon be in progress, which may decide whether the Germans are to get to Warsaw or whether the Russians are

again to threaten an invasion of Germany.

The delay of the Russians in fulfilling expectations that they would prove a serious menace to German territory is a disappointment to the peoples of the allied countries, but military men express the view that it is better for Russia that she should meet her foes in her own territory where the means of comications would be more on an equality.

HOSPITALS FILLING UP AS ALLIES ADVANCE.

The German and French official communications do not disclose much of what is going on in the west, but it is apparent that the Allies are still on the what is going on in the west, but it is apparent that the Allies are still on the offensive from the coast to La Bassee and at various other points along the front. While not very marked advances are reported, the French claim to have made some progress and to have organized the ground which they gained during the preceding days. The Germans on the other hand assert that the attacks by the Allies have been repulsed.

From the number of wounded reaching the hospitals of both the Germans and the Allies, it is evident that the fighting in Flanders today was of a more severe character than shown in the official statements. The correspondents report that the hospitals are again filling up, while along the Dutch border continuous firing can be heard.

The long expected proclamation bringing an end to Turkish suserainty ever Egypt and the establishment of a British protectorate over that country was officially issued tonight. The last straw was doubtless the action of the Khedive, who was the Sultan's representative in Egypt, but, with little or no power, in taking sides with Turkey aginst Great Britain.

Lt.-Col Sir Arthur Henry McMahon who has been appointed High Commissioner, although a soldier by profession, has had long and varied experience as a political officer in India and other parts of the Rast. He has been foreign secretary to the government of India since 1911.

DETAILED ACCOUNT OF BRITISH VICTORY.

Buenos Aires, Argentina, Dec. 17-

The British squadron arrived at Port Stanley, Falkland Islands, on Dec. 7, to take on supplies. The next morning the Canopus, which was guarding the entrance to the port, sighted a hostile warship. Four others quickly came into view and were recognized as the squadron of Admiral Von Spee. The German warships had left the Chilean islands of Juan Fernandez on Nov. 15 for the Falkland Islands, to take possession of the islands and destroy the wireless station. Only the Canopus was visible at first to the Germans, who steamed straight at her. The Canopus opened fire and the other British warships rushed to her assistance.

The Scharnhorst, Gneisenau and Leipzig formed in battle line. The Nurnberg and Dresden, however, dropped back from the firing line.

The British warships concentrated their fire on the Scharnhorst, which sank after an hour's fighting. When it became evident that the Scharnhorst, Admiral Von Spee's flagship, was doomed, her crew assembled on the forward deck. The Scharnhorst refused to surrender, and soon plunged beneath the waves. The crew preserved its formation as the ship went down, and cheered as the waters closed about them.

The Glasgow engaged the Leipzig, and sank her. The Gneisenau went down eighty miles from Port Stanley. The Nurnberg attempted to escape, but after a pursuit of two hours was sunk. The Carnarvon pursued the Dresden, but was not swift enough to overhaul her, and the German warship escaped.

After the battle the British picked up 194 Germans, including a few officers. Of these survivors 100 were from the crews of the two German colliers. An opportunity to surrender was offered the colliers, but it was refused and they were sunk.

The cruiser Cornwall was damaged slightly below the wat r line. None of the other British warships was damaged.

On Dec. 10 funeral services were held for the eight British sailors who were killed, in the presence of the commanders and crews of the squadron.

The British admiralty report of the battle stated that only seven men of the British squadron lost their lives.

There are six such ships building which are expected to shake out their colors within six months. Construction is so perfectly organized that it is estimated they can be built in eighteen months from the time they were started. I am unable to learn whether all, or only one, of the new battleships will be able to fire all ten of its large guns from the bow. I am informed, however, that besides these six new battleships, the Devonport and Portsmouth dockyards alone are to produce eight battle-cruisers by next spring or early summer. At Devonport 9,000 men are employed, with about 5,000 soldiers and marines always on guard.

Winston Churchill, First Lord of the Admiralty, recently said in the House of Commons that Great Britain could lose a super-dreadnought every month for twelve months without diminishing her relative superlority over the German navy, even though the Germans kept all their ships intact. From what I learn, this was no idle boast.
