Will of Mrs. D. Lynch, Distributing Estate of \$27,400 is Also

In the probate court today, the will of Thomas Gilbert was proved. The will was dated in 1906 and a codicil was made a little time before his death but makes no change excepting in the appointment of the trustees, one of whom, the late Allan O. LETTUCE AND TOMATO SALADS bbage very fine, add a few broken walof red pepper. Fill the tomatoes with this mixture. Serve cold. Use one tomato for each guest. Make a salad of lettuce and slice three tomatoes on top. Cover with mayonnaise dressing.

For celery soup, take 3 stalks of celery, break in 1-inch pieces and cook in 1 pint boiling water until real soft. Rub through a sieve. Take 1-2 onion and 2 1-2 cups of milk. Scald milk and then remove the onion. Add celery to the milk and thicken with 3 tablespoons of flour blended with enough water to make a paste. Add 2 tablespoons of butter and pepper and salt to taste.

NO EMERGENCY The strongest endorsement of the atti-





During the night the work of rescue continued. The authorities are taking steps to uncover all the wreckage at once in order to remove any bodies that may be covered.




