Daily Hints For the Cook

CELERY SOUP.
For celery soup, take 3 stalks of celery, break in 1-inch pieces and cook in 1 pint boiling water until real soft. Rub through a sieve. Take 1/2 onion and 2 1/2 cups of milk. Sauté milk and then remove the onion. Add celery to the milk and thicken with 3 tablespoons of flour blended with enough water to make a paste. Add 2 tablespoons of butter and pepper and salt to taste.
VEAL STEW.
Put in a stew pan two pounds of veal, cut into pieces, just cover with cold water (for in a stew the juice is wanted in the liquor rather than in the meat), allow it to simmer until the meat is tender and the water reduced one-half; season with salt and pepper, add a tablespoon of flour, mixed smoothly with a little cold milk, and also a dessert spoon of butter, and serve with split common crackers, dipped in the gravy.
LETTUCE AND TOMATO SALADS.
Peel medium-sized tomatoes and empty their contents, wash up some celery and cabbage very fine, add a few broken walnut meats, a pinch of salt and a pinch of red pepper. Fill the tomatoes with this mixture. Serve cold. Use one tomato for each guest. Make a salad of lettuce and slice three tomatoes on top. Cover with mayonnaise dressing.

CALLS ON MAYORS OF ALL NEW BRUNSWICK TO ASSEMBLE HERE
Fight Telephone Request Before Commission — Crown Lands Official Resigns

NO EMERGENCY

The strongest endorsement of the attitude of the Liberal party in Canada is found in the speech of the Rt. Hon. Winston Churchill, First Lord of the Admiralty, when he introduced the naval estimates in the British parliament yesterday. He was not then replying to a set series of questions from Mr. Borden, calling for a certain kind of answer, but was speaking to the British Empire and to the world concerning naval affairs.

Does Mr. Churchill say there is an emergency? Quite the contrary. He invites for a year, but adds "this is no appeal of weakness pending behind which we make, but strength standing in front."

While the machine politicians of the Democratic party are disposed to resent his attitude, the leading journals of the country hail the announcement as a blow to the spoils system and a promise of greater efficiency in the conduct of the government.

One Democratic paper, however, asserts that the Democrats should hold all the offices that are not protected by the Civil Service, and that President Wilson should carry out their wishes. The New York Globe takes a very different view. It declares that in thus reversing the policy which was introduced by Andrew Jackson, President Wilson has effected a revolution, and declares that if he has the courage to stand by his convictions his administration will be successful.

Many newspapers which might be expected to stand out for the spoils system are said to approve of his course. The President has at all events shown that he has no desire to secure a personal following by the use of federal patronage. It is another evidence that he is determined to maintain in office the principles which he endorsed before he was made President.

The mechanics of Boston desire very much to secure Canadian export trade. This is quite natural, but Canadian ports should see to it that the business comes their way.

THE PRISON FARM Mr. Archibald, the Dominion parole officer, says that a prison farm should be established at St. John. This is the view of a man who is perhaps better qualified to express an opinion than any other man in Canada. It is also the view of the majority of the people of St. John, and it was a great surprise to them when they found some of their representatives in the legislature opposing a reform for which the Municipal Council had expressed a desire, and for which it was quite willing to pay.

The action of the Edmonton city council in deciding to place a term jail on a farm is commended by the Ottawa Journal, which observes that the success of the Ontario prison farm at Guelph is being appreciated in the country at large. The Journal anticipates that the experiment will be adopted by other cities, and points out that the man who is merely kept in jail represents a loss to himself, his family and the community.

In several of the American states prisoners are not only set at work, but are given a chance to earn a wage which goes to their families, or if they are unmarried is given to them on their release. The New Brunswick legislature having declined to permit the municipality of the city and county of St. John to establish a farm for the purpose, on the ground that it should be made a provincial institution, the next step should be to secure such an expression of public sentiment throughout the province as would encourage the government to bring in at the next session of the legislature a bill providing for a provincial prison farm.

P. E. ISLAND PROHIBITION The Charlottetown Patriot declares that no serious attempt is made to enforce the prohibitory law in Prince Edward Island, and that drunkenness of late has rapidly increased. It says there are many clubs at which drinking is evidently the chief feature, and that in Charlottetown young men may be seen staggering along the streets on week days and on Sunday. It declares further that the railway authorities have found it necessary to take strong steps to prevent drunken squabbles on the trains. Summing up the situation the Patriot says:—

"Under present conditions, with drunkenness abounding, with liquor being sold in many places and the law becoming bye-word, it would be far better—if nothing else can be done—to repeal the act and see if some other measures cannot be taken to save the boys. We know of nothing, however, that can approach prohibition, as a means for decreasing the sale of liquor and preventing drunkenness. We repeat this sentence so no mistake can be made as to our meaning. No better law could possibly be framed, but like any other law, it is absolutely worthless, if it is left in the hands of those to administer who apparently are not in sympathy with it, and who care not whether drunkenness increases or not."

The Patriot concludes the provincial government for its failure to enforce the law, and calls upon the Temperance Alliance to take such steps as would bring about enforcement. It is quite obvious, however, that unless public opinion demands the enforcement of the law, it will not be enforced, and the conditions to which the Patriot refers will continue to exist. The act, and not merely the government,

BIRTHDAYS OF NOTABILITIES

THURSDAY, MAR. TWENTY-SEVEN

The Hon. R. M. Meredith, member of the famous Meredith family of London, and a judge of the High Court of Ontario, was born in London on March 27, 1847. He practiced law for some years in his native city in partnership with his brother Edmund and was appointed to the bench in 1899.

Commander P. C. Law, retired officer of the royal navy, and for many years official secretary to the lieutenant-governor of Ontario, was born on March 27, 1841. He entered the navy in 1854 and served in the Baltic and Black Sea during the Crimean War. On retiring in 1874 he took up the practice of architecture.

F. W. Cowie, chief superintendent engineer of the Montreal Harbor Commission, and an authority on navigation and harbors, is fifty years of age today. He is a graduate of McGill, and commenced work with the Niagara Falls Park Commission in 1883. He became chief assistant engineer of the Department of Public Works of Canada, having charge of the St. Lawrence channel between Quebec and Montreal in 1889, and has since been continuously associated with the work of improving navigation on the St. Lawrence.

**QUEBEC PROVINCE**  
**PICTURE CENSORS ARE**  
**GETTING TO WORK**

Montreal, March 27—No murders, no attacks on any religious body, no burgeries, no highway robberies in fact, no presentation wherein vice or violence in any form figures—such is the rule which will be followed by the newly created Quebec Board of Moving Picture Film Censors, which will open up for active work within a few days. Sheriff Lemieux, the chairman of the board has been looking after the details of equipment, and, as a result, commodious quarters at the corner of St. Gabriel and St. James streets, have been fitted up.

The censors' examining bureau will comprise a fully equipped theatre on a small scale, with the most up-to-date film apparatus obtainable, the whole located in a fire proof vault on the second floor of the building chosen by the censors.

The powers of the censors will permit them to reject any film or to expurgate any portions which they consider objectionable. All films dealing with murder or any other crime will be cast aside, whilst films of prize fights will also be placed under the ban. Any film containing a caricature or reflection on any religious organization or openly attacking any religious practice, will also be thrown out. All lewdness or immorality under any shape or form will be strictly frowned down and films dealing with such subjects will be rejected.

Every son of Utah who is eligible to vote but who does not exercise the right will be compelled to pay a poll tax of \$3 under the terms of a bill passed by the state senate. The tax will be assessed against women as well as men.

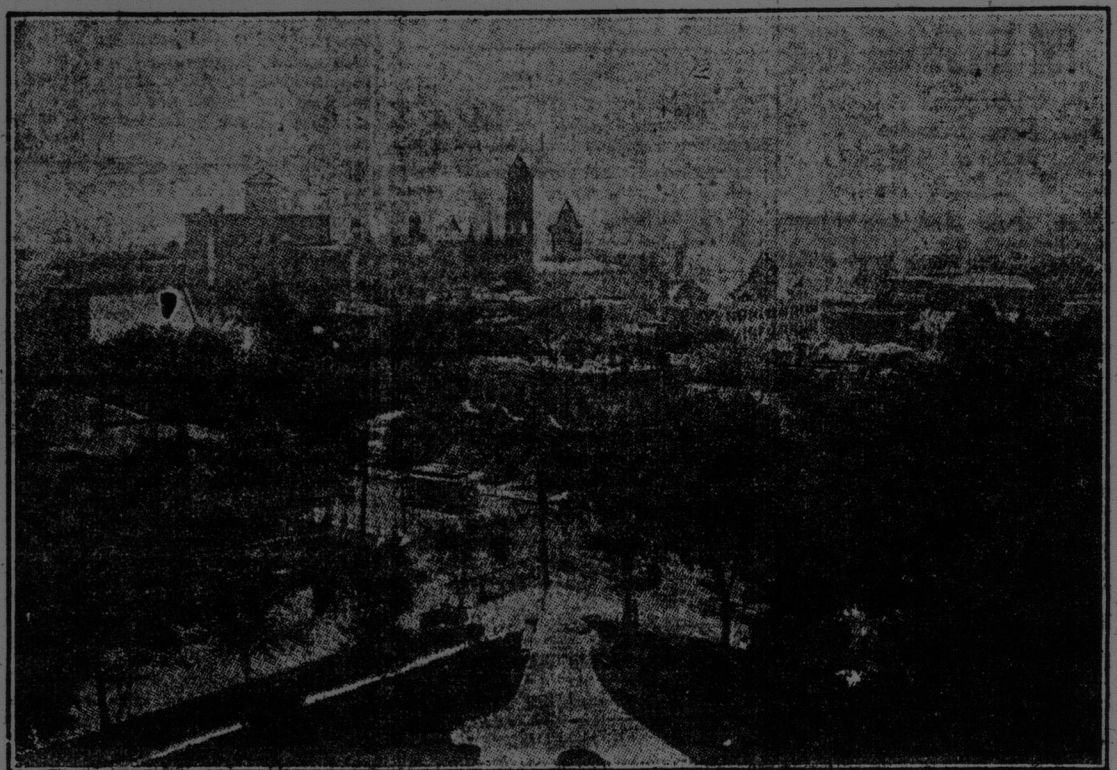

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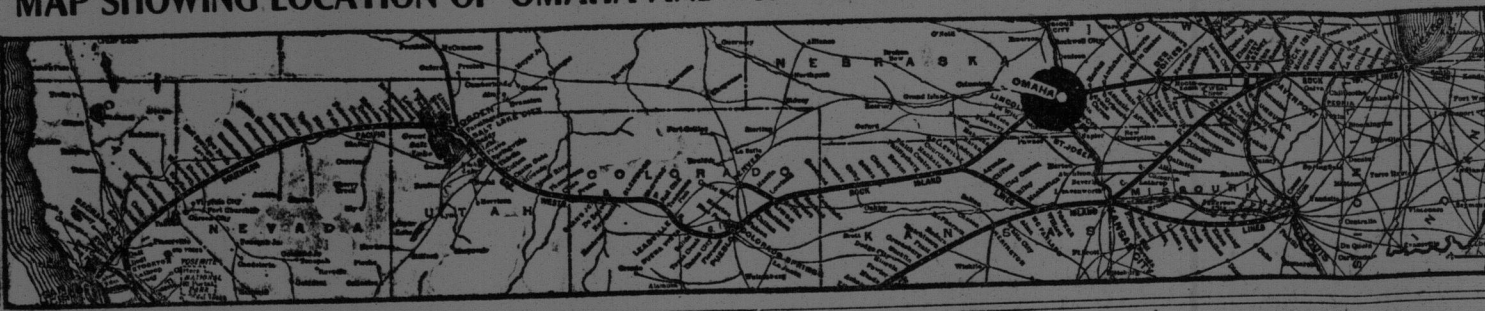
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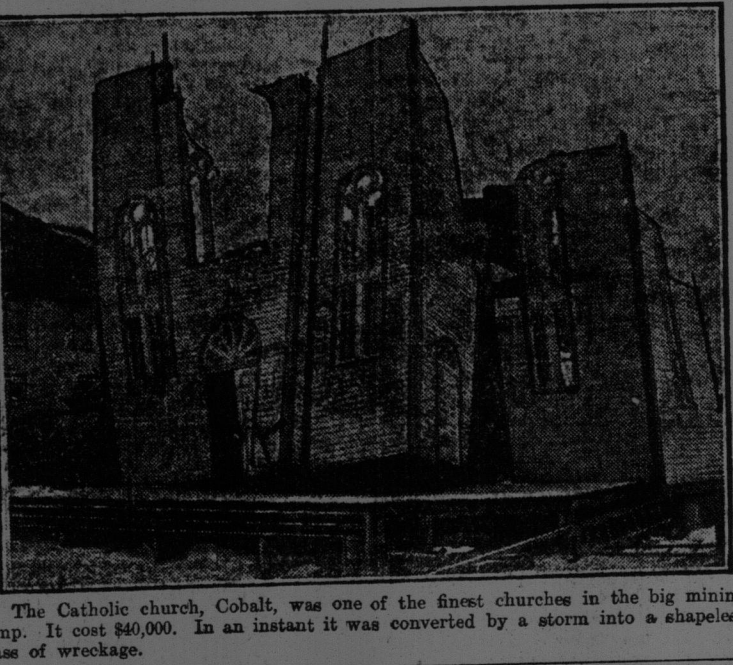

## MR. CHURCHILL'S SPEECH ON NAVY

### References to Germany — The Battleships of the Overseas Domains

London, March 26.—Hon. Winston Churchill, introducing the naval estimates, stated the reasons for an increase in the naval expenditure, and spoke of the congestion of the shipyards because of the extraordinary demand upon shipbuilding plants and skilled labor supply. It would be necessary, he said, to provide for a continual large increase in the number of officers and men in all ranks of the navy. Mr. Churchill said he feared there was no prospect of avoiding large and continued increases in naval estimates, but Britain was perhaps the best able of all the nations of the world to stand such a strain. The first lord then repeated the question and the answer of last year. Why should not all nations take a naval holiday as far as naval construction was concerned? No navy would sustain the slightest injury, nor would the relative naval strength of the powers be altered in any respect, while the finances of every nation would be greatly relieved. To suggest this course was, he said, no appeal of weakness painting behind, but of strength striking ahead, and no nation was it made with more profound sincerity than Germany. He welcomed the calm and friendly tone and temper of German naval discussion, and said Britain and Germany both desired peace.

Mr. Churchill discussed the naval programme and said that any contributions made by the dominions would be in addition to the 60 per cent. standard which had been adopted in relation to Germany.

"Let me say at once and without reserve how much we welcome the calm, friendly tone and temper of the recent German naval discussion. Britain and Germany have the conviction that the desire of both is to preserve peace. It could not be supposed, however, that the naval development of the dominions could be restricted on account of any European standard. They too, like us, must be absolutely free. It is for them to choose the method of their development. It is also for them to choose whether their naval force shall be additional to the British standard or whether they shall be a contribution to aid the heavy burdens of the British taxpayer. Therefore, we can answer regarding this false dilemma of the requirements of the 60 per cent. standard. They are not additional to the world-wide requirements of the British Empire."

Turning to the proposed Canadian ships, Mr. Churchill said: "While they will be directly controlled by the admiralty, we propose to form them, with the Malay and New Zealand ships, into a squadron of five ships of high uniform speed, to be called the imperial squadron. It will be based at Gibraltar, and thence able to reach Halifax in five days, Quebec in six days, Jamaica in nine days, the South American coast in twelve days, Cape Town in thirteen days, Alexandria in twenty-three days, Sydney in twenty-eight days, New Zealand in thirty-two days, Hong Kong in twenty-two days and Vancouver in twenty-three days."

"Our intention is that this squadron shall, as opportunity serves, cruise freely about the empire visiting the dominions, ready to operate at any threatened point, at home or abroad. The dominions will be considered in all movements not dominated by military considerations. Special facilities will be given for Canadians, South Africans and New Zealanders to serve as men or officers in this squadron. In this way the true idea will be given of a mobile imperial squadron of the greatest strength and speed, patrolling the empire, showing the flag and bringing effective aid wherever needed. "There is no more valuable principle than imperial federation and inter-dominion action. We cannot control these developments. Each dominion is absolutely free to take its own course. The admiralty will do its best to work loyally with the responsible ministers of any government that may come into power in any part of the empire. That is our duty. But it is also our duty, with our knowledge and experience in naval matters, to state clearly what we believe to be the right sound plan for these important developments to follow, and to combine as far as possible what is best for each with what is best for all."

He announced that the admiralty had arranged to lend to first class British liners, guns, ammunition and trained gunners to enable them to protect commerce against armed foreign merchant steamers in time of war. He deplored the delay in sanctioning the Marconi contract. Mr. Churchill concluded by desiring to

## U. S. EXPORTS SHOW FALLING OFF OF FIVE MILLIONS IN FEBRUARY

Washington, March 27.—Imports into the United States last month aggregated \$149,917,083 an increase of approximately \$15,000,000 over the imports of February, 1912, according to figures issued by the department of commerce.

Of the imports \$69,237,693 worth came from Europe, while \$80,151,673 came from Canada. Asia was next with \$22,868,308, followed closely by South America with \$20,409,826.

The exports of the United States for the same period amounted to \$149,917,083, a falling off of about \$5,000,000 from the exports for the same month a year ago. Europe received the bulk of the exports of this country for the month, \$113,666,912 being the value of articles sent to that quarter of the world.

In the same month of 1912 Europe received articles from the United States to the total of \$128,328,269.

## REPORTED BIG OFFER FOR FRIEDMANN CURE

### New York Drug Concern Said to Have Bid Two Millions

New York, March 27.—A drug concern with headquarters in this city, it is learned, has made Dr. Friedmann Franz Friedmann an offer of \$2,000,000 for the exclusive privilege of distributing the German savant's turtle germ vaccine for the cure of consumption.

Dr. Friedmann and his cabinet held a conference with a representative of the drug firm, at the conclusion of which the bacteriologist said briefly: "I shall announce plans within the next two or three days for a country-wide distribution of my vaccine. Until then there is nothing to be said."

The drug firm's representative, it is said, told Dr. Friedmann that if the initial offer of \$2,000,000 was not satisfactory to the savant his company would raise the bid "up into the millions." The company will allow Dr. Friedmann to set the retail price of the preparation himself, only specifying that it be allowed a "reasonable profit."

Plans were discussed for holding huge medical clinics either in New York or elsewhere to instruct scores of American physicians in the methods of injecting the vaccine.

Referring to the death of Prof. Frank Osterlander, after he had received the Friedmann vaccine, he said:

"I have no doubt that the vaccine is a most valuable one, and that it will be of great benefit to the human race."

## Buy Seeds Abroad

Toronto, March 27.—The Ontario Vegetable Growers' Association virtually declared war upon Canadian seed merchants, when they appointed W. J. Kerr of Woodroffe, Ontario, purchasing agent for the entire membership of the association, aggregating 1,600 and voted to place their seed orders, aggregating \$80,000, with European growers, whose prices are said to be from 300 to 400 per cent. lower than the quotations of domestic houses in many cases.

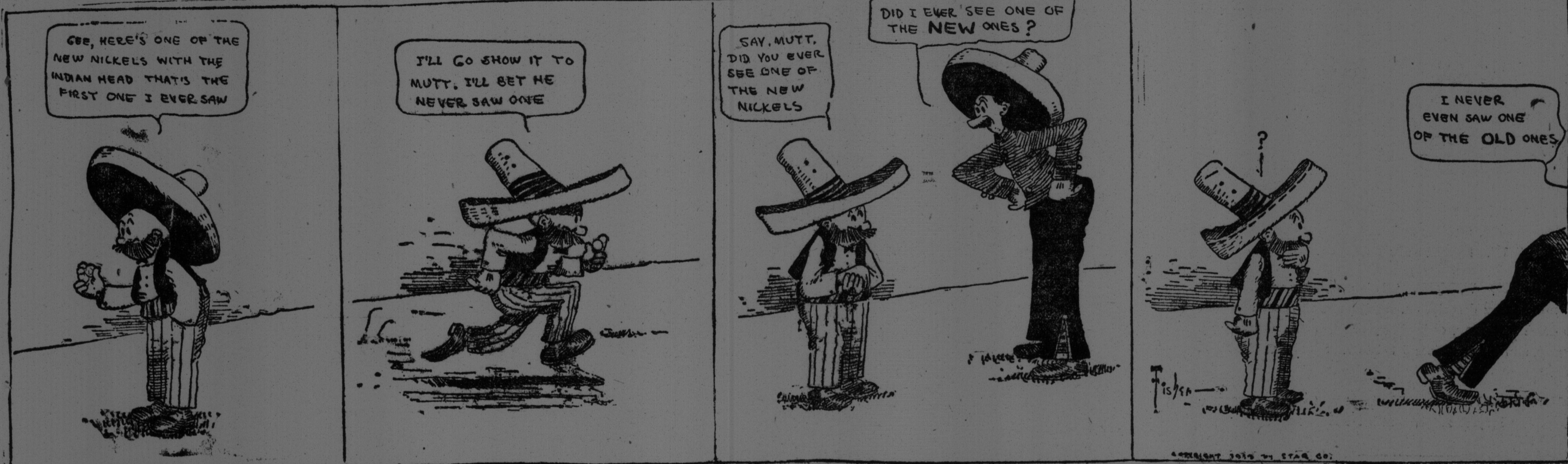

## FEWER LOGS

## DOWN RIVER

## TO ST. JOHN

## The Lumber Season Has Been Good For Some and Not so For Others

The exceptional mildness which has distinguished the winter of 1912-1913 has had a marked effect on the lumbering operations of this province, both for good and for ill. In the northern section of the St. John and on the Miramichi, the Nepequin and the Restigouche, where the average snowfall of about six feet always has provided a handicap to the operators, this year's fall of two and a half feet has provided unexcelled conditions for the loggers. In the southern part of the province, in the district between Fredericton and the Bay of Fundy, where there is seldom more than enough snow, the mild winter and the late arrival and early disappearance of the snow has played havoc with the operations. The lumbermen in this section usually are able to depend on at least six weeks of good sledding weather, but this year they had only three, the snow disappearing almost entirely about a fortnight ago.

### Fewer Logs to St. John

The cut in the northern section of the province will be average while that of the southern section will show a falling off. But, while the cut at the head of the St. John river will be well up to the average, the quantity of logs handled in the booms at Fredericton and rated to St. John will be smaller than in many years. The estimate for this year is 65,000,000 feet, while last year it was 100,000,000 and the previous year about 100,000,000. The reason for this is partly due to the fact that while there are fewer mills sawing at St. John than in other years, the mills on the upper reaches which ship their lumber to the United States market by rail are handling more than ever. Another reason for the difference was that last year the booms contained not only the total cut for New Brunswick, but the logs which had been hung up during the previous spring.

As logging operations are still being continued in some parts of the province it is impossible, as yet, to estimate the total cut for New Brunswick, but the prospects are that it will be about the average. Regarding the prospects for stream driving it is still too early to make any predictions. The early warm spell which has caused the disappearance of most of the snow may be detrimental if followed by colder weather. The lumbermen still have to depend on the spring rains for frosted conditions in the shallower streams and cold weather would shut off the supply of water from this source.
