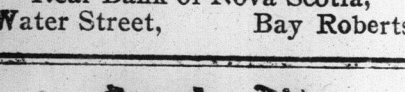

Christmas and New Year Mails

The early mailing of Christmas and New Year parcels for Naval Reservists and members of the Newfoundland Regiment at the front is urged by the Post Office department. The mailing of such parcels should take place before the middle of the present month.

It is possible that letters mailed up to within the last week of November will be delivered to Overseas Troops before Christmas, but irregularities and uncertainties in the Field Mail service cannot be avoided.

Over 7 lbs. to 11 lbs. 72 cents

TO FRANCE,
Up to 3 lbs. 62 cents
Over 3 lbs. to 7 lbs. \$1.00
Over 7 lbs. to 11 lbs. \$1.38

Parcels should be securely packed, and bear, in addition to the name and address of the sender, the value and description of the contents.

These Regulations comprised, amongst other things, the closing of the port and harbor of St. John's at night, and the extinguishing of the lights at certain light houses, and in the city of St. John's.

World Briefs

St. Louis, Mo., has several doctors accused of selling illegitimate babies at \$5 each.

A man became cross eyed after eating a pan of slaked lime in mistake for cottage cheese at Wilkes Barre, Pa.

The Amsterdam Telegraph learns from the frontier that the 1899 class in Germany (i. e., boys of 17 years of age) have been ordered to report themselves for military service.

George Peterson, a tenant on a farm owned by Malcolm McNeil of Chicago, near Dundee, Ill., has just filed a petition in bankruptcy, and among the assets listed is "one dog, \$0.00."

America's longest double-decked reinforced concrete bridge is nearing completion at Cleveland and will be 2,889 feet long, 80 feet wide and at its highest point 581 feet above the river it crosses.

The United States Government is urging that potatoes be used in making bread, but at the present time of potatoes it is a question whether bread containing them would be much cheaper than bread from flour only.

It appears, according to the Bethman Hollow version, that Viscount Grey was responsible for beginning the war. There only remains King Albert of Belgium to be accused.

An Exchange telegram from Zurich says that at Prague, which is called 'the town of a hundred churches,' the military authorities have requisitioned and sent to the melting pot 182 church bells, representing a weight of bronze of seventy-five tons.

In an address to the Canadian Club of Ottawa, Senator Belcourt, who was one of the Parliamentary delegates to England this year, declared that the British Navy could lose half its ships and still be as strong as at the beginning of the war.

British soldiers along the Somme have done something to get the boys out of the trenches before Christmas, even though their methods may not be the methods approved by the pacifists.

Canada's war expenditure last month was \$22,000,000, compared with \$8,000,000 in October of 1915. The need to save and work, to provide for the heavy burden of that expenditure, which is at the rate of \$250,000,000 a year, was never more pressing.

American Tells Why He Enlisted
London—Lieut. Colonel F. C. Bollock, the only clergyman to command a battalion of troops, is now in London, where, without doffing his khaki, he has been preaching in a Unitarian church. He is in command of one of the American Legion battalions raised in Canada.

In answer to a question why he, an American minister, had joined the British army as a combatant, the Colonel said: "I hold it is wrong to tell another man to go out and shoot without you go and do likewise. The men I have the privilege of commanding, and more, came voluntarily. They

realized, as I did, that this was a war of principles, not of nations, and that the United States was affected by the outcome just as much as the Allied nations.

It was a quest on whether the mailed fist should rule civilization, or whether the principles of the man whose fists were nailed to the cross should prevail. But the sinking of the Lusitania was the casting of the die. Then I announced I had furlied my flag, that it never again should be carried by the breezes until the country which had been so long my home should declare itself against such a damnable outrage."

"I then took a commission and combatant rank, and helped to raise a battalion which grew into eight," added the Colonel, with a satisfied smile.

"In America," he continued, "there is a ubiquitous sign 'safety first.' There is no more ignoble cry unless it be that of 'too proud to fight.'"

"As honor comes before safety, right conscience and justice take precedence when it comes to a question of pride and fighting."

Accuse Teutons Of Treachery
Canadian Officer Slain by One He Tried to Save

Ottawa, Nov. 18.—Canadian soldiers have learned to treat with good nature and trust the prisoners captured from the ranks of their German adversaries, but the Teutons officers have gained a reputation for unspookable treachery, according to an official communication issued here by the Canadian War Records Office, describing in detail the taking of Regina trench by Dominion troops at midnight of Nov. 18, after 18 hours' bombardment.

The instances of this treachery are all too numerous, the statement says. The following must suffice as a specimen of the breed we are out to suppress. One of our captains in a lull in the fighting found a Prussian officer lying desperately wounded, bleeding to death. He knelt down under heavy shell fire and gave his enemy first aid, bandaging his wounds so that he could be moved. Then he turned away to get the stretcher bearers.

The moment his back was turned the German propped himself up on his elbow, drew a bomb from his pocket and threw it with deadly aim. The Canadian officer was blown to pieces. The Prussian evidently thought his villainy would pass unobserved in the confusion of flying death, but several of our men had seen the whole affair and he paid the penalty.

"It is not strange, therefore, if the German officer when captured does not always find quite so amiable a reception as greets his rank and file.

The victory in gaining the Regina trenches is described as a very smart and complete one, well rounded off, with no ragged edges to give trouble afterward and securing to us a desired post of vantage. Moreover, it was gained and held at relatively small cost. The number of unwounded prisoners was small, something like 50, but included three officers."

The statement says that this victory "confirmed the men in a sense of dominance over their opponents, whom, with lofty amiability and subtle assurance of supremacy, they call 'Fritzy.' The communique concludes with the declaration that "in the temper behind such an attitude dwells the certainty of triumph."

Inquire into Coal Deliveries

It is announced from Ottawa that a Royal Commission has been appointed to investigate and report upon conditions with regard to the delivery of cargoes of coal to the coasting vessels in the Maritime Provinces. It consists of Wilfrid Tupper, inspector of subsidized steamship services; Sir Archibald Tipples, officer in charge of harbor commissions; and J. F. McDonald, Customs collector at New Glasgow.

For some years there have been complaints that the sailing vessels were not getting their fair share of coal cargoes but that, instead, there was discrimination in favor of steamers.

The agitation has been especially strong in Prince Edward Island where, last session, the Legislature passed a resolution calling for a Royal Commission.

Americans Shot Down 22 Machines

Squad Now on the Somme 'Fighters Purely'

With the French Army on the Somme Front. Nov 8 (Correspondence)—The little squad of American volunteer aviators today the French commander of the squad, Capt. Georges Tancoult, had just landed from a flight along the Somme front, during which he had brought down a German machine. Five of the American airmen were seated in their machines waiting for the word to start on a two-hour patrol of the fighting line.

They were under charge of their most famous colleague, Adjt. Raoul Lufbery, who has achieved the distinction of becoming a French 'Ace'—a destroyer of five German machines. (Since the receipt of this despatch Adjt. Lufbery has been credited with the destruction of a sixth German airplane.)

Two of these two-hour trips are made daily by the Americans. As the correspondent watched the airplanes flew off at half minute intervals, and within 10 minutes had risen to an altitude of approximately 10,000 feet. They soared and circled over the French lines, ready to give battle to any German flyer who might attempt an attack on the French observation airplanes or kite balloons.

The Americans are fighters purely and take no part in the technical observation work or despatch carrying. Between flights the squad is housed comfortably in large huts, where each man has a cubicle. Their comfort is looked after by soldier servants.

In one of these huts lives a six months' old dog, the mascot of the squad. He is named 'Verdun,' in commemoration of the fact that the fliers obtained him when they were on duty near the famous fortress, 'Verdun' has an understudy in the form of a bag wolfhound, and the two are inseparable companions.

Borden Appeals to American Lawyers

For Neutral Aid in Defining International Law

New York, Nov 18—An appeal to the bar of the United States, a great neutral Nation, to aid in defining international law and the right in such terms that world peace might be maintained, was made by Sir Robert Laird Borden, Premier of Canada, in an address at a luncheon given in his honor at the Lawyers' Club here today.

Premier Borden said he spoke as a kinsman to the lawyers, since on either side of the hazy and invisible boundary between the United States and Canada the National Life found its inspiration in like ideals of democracy.

'It is true there are tariffs,' said the Premier, 'but during the past decade we have manifested our neighborly spirit by purchasing your products to the extent of \$3,000,000,000. And as a final proof of our friendship we have recently borrowed from you \$16,000,000 of the sum thus paid. We have exchanged immigrants both East and West. The arrows of the little winged divinity shoot ceaselessly across the frontier. In short, the citizens of these two neighboring and kindred commonwealths have developed a reciprocal understanding, good will and respect so complete that it would be difficult to find a parallel in history.'

'We in Canada were entirely masters of our own destiny, but just as in the Motherland when the hour of waiting there was no wavering and no waiting, so in Canada the decision was never for a moment in doubt. Our resolve is as fixed and unshaken today as at the first and whatever loss or sacrifice we may still have to bear we will not waver or falter.'

British Victory In Snowstorm

With the British Armies in France, Nov. 18, via London, Nov. 19—British and Canadian troops won a battle in a snowstorm this morning. Advancing on both sides of the river in easterly and northerly directions, they took about 500 prisoners and established a new line on both sides and at the edge of the village of Grandcourt, for the possession of which severe fighting continued throughout the day.

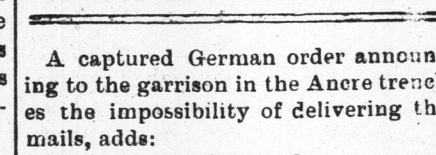
The attacks from the south were made before daybreak, while a stiff wind sent furies of snow into the faces of the British soldiers as they pushed down the slope towards the marshes along the Ancre. It was the first snow of the season, following two days and nights of intense dry cold, which hardened the swamp of No Man's Land after nearly three months of constant rainfall, thus giving the attacking infantry a firm foothold on the frozen ground.

They advanced nearly a quarter of a mile on a three-mile front to the German position south of the villages of Grandcourt, Petit Miramont and Eys, and occupied the trench without great resistance, except south of Grandcourt, where the batteries and machine guns holding the sunken Posters road checked the British.

Eisewhere the German trench was virtually destroyed by the preparatory bombardment, the surviving Germans including Saxons, formally surrendering through their officers, who met the British as they came over the ruined parapet. Infantry detachments working up the river bank from the western end of Grandcourt got a footing in the ruins and craters and took the lower end of the main street paralleling the Ancre, of which the Germans hold the remainder. On the north side of the Ancre the advance was made from the eastern end of Beaucourt. Capturing Holland Wood, the patrols pushed forward to the Pusieux trench, a part of the original German second line, the end of which at the river bank the British now hold. Today's successes give the British command of ruined villages, fortified farms and other strong German points in the Ancre valley.

A captured German order announcing to the garrison in the Ancre trench the impossibility of delivering the mails, adds: 'Owing to the British fire we cannot even bring up the barest necessities.' The Germans are working hard in improving the original second line in front of Parieux and Miramont. The perfidious character of the German counter bombardments and infantry resistances along the Ancre give the impression that the Germans have little intention of offering serious opposition.

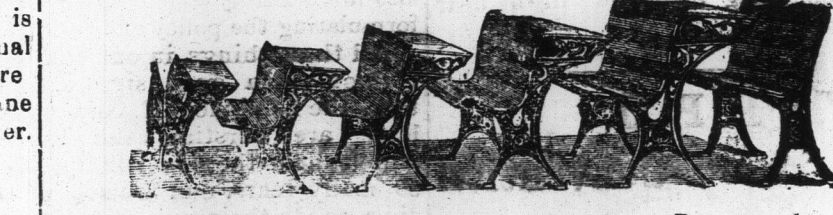

Is It Coming?

The news contained in yesterday's despatches that Admiral Sir John Jellicoe had been appointed as First Sea Lord of the Admiralty and that the command of the Grand Fleet had been turned over to Admiral Sir David Beatty was received with freely expressed satisfaction by all who take a live interest in the conduct of the war, but especially by those who follow the fortunes of the navy, the part which has played, is playing and still has to play before the end of the present titanic struggle.

The new Sea Lord has a splendid record. He is a sailor of an old school, but at the same time an up-to-the-minute modern navy man. He knows his ships thoroughly, he is a gunnery expert of wide research, he possesses the entire confidence of the officers and men of the navy, and also of the nation.

It appears as if Balfour would still retain the position of First Lord of the Admiralty, an arrangement which does not seem to give general satisfaction. We think the nation would like to see the entire Admiralty Office administered by men who have been schooled in the navy, know their profession thoroughly, and who could be relied upon to uphold the traditions of the most efficient branch of the service under their control. The nation has many such men who would gladly give their services. But they will not be dictated to by laymen should responsibility for their blunders.

Probably the Government is waking up to the fact that things have not been going right. Public opinion has long since been alive to the situation. Let us hope that this is but the first move towards placing the control of the navy in the hands of navy men.

The confidence of all, both at sea and ashore, is also firmly reposed in Admiral Beatty, the new commander of the fleet. He has proved his metal on more than one occasion, and is at present the "darling of the navy." We await developments under the new regime, and would not be at all surprised if "something happened" in the near future.

The F. P. U. Convention

The Fishermen's Protective Union Convention opens at Catalina on Monday next, December 4th. Delegates from a large number of Unions (some from Conception Bay) will meet to discuss various business, economic and political matters of vital importance to the fishermen of Newfoundland.

Leaving the matter of politics aside for the moment, the fact that in our Island Home today the fishermen, or at least a large body of them, can meet together to talk over and confer on matters in which every fisherman in Newfoundland is interested augurs well for the future of Newfoundland.

Every fisherman and every fisherman's son should feel a thrill of pride go through his frame as he looks back and recounts the days that are gone and then considers the present. Looking into the future he should feel confident that no longer will the fishermen of Newfoundland be content to be as in the past merely "hewers of wood and drawers of water."

The great work already accomplished by the organization of companies to engage in various lines of commercial and industrial enterprise is beginning to attract attention even from the most prejudiced.

The Publishing Co., Union Trading Co., Union Export Co., Union Ship building Co., and the Union Electric Light Co. are but the beginnings of gigantic enterprises operated by the fishermen themselves or by others on their behalf if the fishermen with a combined savings of millions of dollars will only loosen their purse strings a little and allow the necessary capital to be accumulated in order that these enterprises may become successful.

We are especially pleased with the efforts being made in the matter of *outport development*. Catalina has been selected as the principal place for the various companies' operations, and we have been informed by certain persons who have visited the place that great things have already been accomplished there.

The outport people have been engaged all these years in building up St. John's, until today every foot of water front there is utilized to the fullest extent. Now the time has arrived when we have decided to do something a little nearer home, and the results in many instances are already apparent.

The delegates assembled will also consider the political situation, and this is another step in the onward and upward march of the fishing classes.

Time was, and not a great many years ago, when a few individuals in St. John's controlled the political destinies of the country. A few of them met together, discussed and outlined a policy, formed a party and actually selected the candidates for the various districts. Then just before an election (but never at any other time) the fishermen were proclaimed to be "great fellows," and away a swarm of candidates would rush to the outport districts to endeavor to the support and votes of the "men."

The matter was treated in but a business-like way by the candidates or the electors. Politics (the insignificant which was understood) was considered more or less as a joke, and subject which in many cases treated in such a way that bad feelings were engendered that resulted in dimensions and discord among the people.

Now this is changed, to a large extent, and the outport electors themselves are having some say in not only voting for a candidate but also in selecting a candidate and formulating the policy of his party.

All these things, in our humble opinion, is a good sign, a sign that the fishermen of Newfoundland are bursting the bands which held them in bondage for so many years, and are commencing to do their own thinking in political matters as well as commercial, industrial and economic matters.

W. P. A. Notes

A meeting of the W. P. A. will be held in the C. of E. Schoolroom, French's Cove, Thursday night next at 7.30.

The following articles have been sent forward by the Association since it started work Bay Roberts—1082 pairs sock, 292 shirts, 94 pairs mitts, 30 belts, 200 mufflers, 43 pillow slips, 37 pillows, 8 suits pyjamas.

Another shipment of mufflers, shirts, socks and mitts will be sent next week.

A meeting of the Association will be held on Monday night next, at 7.30 o'clock, in the C. of E. Schoolroom, Coley's Point.

Measles are very prevalent at Twillingate, and Mr. W. B. Powell, Principal of the Meth. Sup. School there, and well known here, has recently had an attack.

Thanksgiving Day

Sunday last was observed by the Church of England throughout Newfoundland as a day of Thanksgiving to Almighty God for the blessings and mercies of the past year. At St. Matthew's church there was a celebration of the Holy Communion after the 11 o'clock service.

The congregations at both the morning and evening services were large and reverent, and entered heartily into the services. Special prayers, psalms and lessons were read, and the usual hymns of thanksgiving sung.

The Rector, Rev. A. B. S. Stirling, preached at both services, his sermons being eloquent and impressive, and greatly appreciated by the large number of willing listeners. The collections taken at both morning and evening services were in aid of the Home and Foreign Mission Fund.

Fur Bearers Bringing High Prices

Trappers will be well paid for their time and efforts this winter. An unusually good demand and high prices will prevail for furbearers. Every member of the fox family is popular and bringing high prices. Fisher is a close second, and the price is very high. It will take millions of muskrat to satisfy the American consumption. The Hudson seal coat is in the height of its popularity. American dyers are enlarging their shops to increase their capacity for seal-dyeing more muskrat than was ever known. Roumanian Situation

This visit will certainly be a pleasant contrast to the isolated region of the North and will no doubt be very beneficial to him in many respects. There will certainly be a happy welcome awaiting for him in the Northwest.

Mr. Mercer will return again to work on the Labrador next spring. He loves the work and the people he ministers to. The Guardian wishes him a very pleasant holiday.
