RECENT DEATHS.

Professor Brashear Announces its Appearance and Predicts an Electrical Disturbance.

PITTSBURG, Pa., Feb. 15—Professor John A. Brashear, of the Allegheney Observatory, announces the discovery of one of the greatest, sun spots ever called to the attention of astronomers, which may result, he says, in electrical disturbances throughout the country about tomorrow night.

These disturbances, Professor Brashear declaras, may take the form of a display of the aurora borealis, of telegraph and telephone communication may being seriously affected. The present spot is so large it can be seen through smoked glass and is one of the most active of solar spots. In his statement Professor Brashear says:

"A very large and beautiful sun spot, or solar disturbance, is now crossing the face of the sun and is approaching the central meridian. This is the largest spot that has been seen for several years. Its approximate length is 118,000 miles, and it is 30,000 miles wide, covering an area of about 3,500,000 square miles. There is considerable activity in the spot, and there may be some electrical disturbance on the earth about tomorrow night, but this is rather difficult to predict on account of the position of the disturbance in relation to the earth.
