

LONDON, Sept. 23—Charles Rowell, in his best days the finest long distance runner in the world, died last week at Cambridge, after a long illness. He had fallen on evil days, and died practically destitute.

"Charfie" Rowell, who was fifty-six years of age, started when E. P. Weston was popularising long distance running. On a visit to America he accomplished some extraordinary records and made £20,000 prize money in the late seventies and early eighties.

His specialty was the six day go-asyou-please contest, and the famous Madison Square Gardens, New York, were between 1879 and 1883, the scene of some of his greatest triumphs. Notable among these was his defeat of Corkey in a six days race, and another big feat was the covering of over ninety miles in twelve hours. On one occasions the partisans of some of his opponents managed to drug his food, causin ghim to lose the race in which he was engaged.

To the present day his records from eighty-five miles to 150 miles, from 160 to 231 miles, from 240 to 350 miles are still standing. At one time he was reputed tobe worth over £70,000, but after retiring from running he devoted himself to the Turf, and speedily lost the whole of his fortune.

At one time Rewell was a very fine sculler, and later, in life he owned a few racehorses, one of which was called Jake Kilrain, after the American boxer of that name.

He was greatly interested in pugilism, and trained Charles Mitchel for the latter's celebrated contest with bare fists, with John L. Sullyan, near Chantily, on March 10, 1888. Rowell was amongst those arrested in connection with that encounter. He was intimately associated also with "Pony" Mcore, and trained Jake Kilrain for his fight with Smith.

Rowell was married to a sister of Ernest Cooke, who met with remarkable success as a jockey in France.
