CASTRO FAILS IN PLOT TO RECOVER POSITION OF THE AEROPLANE Recent Progress of Aviation Brings Many Enquiries From Women Anxious To Fly—No Reason for Tenuity.

Paris, Nov. 7.—At the close of the Reims meeting French aeroplane manufacturers received many applications from women, who are very anxious to learn how to control an aeroplane, and it is said that at various factories there are about a dozen women now taking first lessons in aeronautics. One of them is Mme. Presta, who attracted attention at the aviation meeting by her unusual costumes, which consisted of knickers, puttees and a close fitting Norfolk jacket. She has decided views on women's special fitness for aviation. "Some poor creatures," she told a reporter, "lack pluck and their nerves seem to bother them. Now, I don't think women would be in the least frightened by flight in an aeroplane. I believe that in this respect they would acquire themselves better than men. We women have just as much pluck as any man aviator I have yet seen." She is now seeking practical experience. What would delight her more than anything else in the world, she says, would be to pilot an aeroplane unaccompanied. So far she has been coldly received by aviators and aeroplane manufacturers.

GREATER CHILDREN TURN UP SAFE AND SOUND IN BOSTON

F. E. McDonald, Superintendent of Boys' Industrial Home, Receives Word Long Lost Infants Are With Relatives—Were Taken To New York In Sailing Ship—Mother Knew Of Whereabouts—The Sackville Mystery Recalled.

McDonald, superintendent of the Boys Industrial Home, at Crouchville, has received word from a friend in Boston that the children are alive and are at present in Boston, with relatives.

NO ENQUIRY INTO HESTIA WRECK WILL BE HELD IN ST. JOHN

Deputy Minister Gets Idea Survivors Are In Montreal—Men Still Here Awaiting Result Of Latest Bungle.

According to advices received last evening from Ottawa the inquiry into the wreck of the steamer Hestia will not be held in St. John at all. If one is held it will probably take place in Montreal.

The survivors were still in the city and had no intention of leaving and Mr. Schofield wired the Deputy Minister to this effect. He had received no further word last night and will hold the men here until the matter is definitely settled.

That the inquiry is not likely to be held here is further indicated by a telegram from Capt. Leger to Mr. Schofield last night from Halifax, stating that he had instructions to go to Ottawa and would leave Halifax to do so at 8 o'clock this morning.

FIRE DESTROYED HOUSE AND ELL ON POKIOK ROAD

Blaze In William Patterson's Home Saturday Evening—Much Furniture Lost—Partly Covered by Insurance.

On Saturday evening about nine o'clock, fire which broke out in a house owned and occupied by Mr. William Patterson, on Pokiook road, gutted the house and ell and destroyed some of the furniture and bedding. The loss is partly covered by insurance.

Shortly before 9 o'clock Mrs. Patterson went out to do some shopping, leaving the kitchen fire lighted, and it is thought that some of the coals must have dropped on the floor, starting the fire, which gained rapidly. It had made considerable headway before it was noticed by Mrs. Patterson's son Charles, who was returning to the house. He immediately ran down and rang in an alarm from box 121. The North End fire department responded quickly.

As the water supply had to be taken from the reservoir at Stetson & Cutler's mill, some 200 yards away, it took some time for the department to get a stream on the fire, which by this time had spread to the front part of the house and the roof.

After half an hour's hard work the stream began to tell and the "all out" was sounded a few minutes later, but not before the ell of the house had been completely gutted and the front and roof damaged considerably. The house was formerly owned by Mr. James Taylor and was purchased from him some three years ago by Mr. Patterson, who with his family have lived in it ever since.
