Il Jews Engaged In Drug Peru And Ecuador Decide To **Business Subject To Strict** Be Good And Accept Arbitra-Inspection — Expelled On tion Of United States In **Boundary Question.**

Washington, June 3.—Both Peru and Ecuador have agreed to withdraw tomorrow the troops which for some time past they have been mobilizing on the frontier of the two countries, preparatory to war over the question of the boundary between the two South American states. This information reached the state department today, the fact that Peru had consented to withdraw its forces coming from Senor Pardo, Peruvian minister, while Ecuador's willingness to follow her neighbor's example was communicated to this government from the American minister at Quito. The withdrawal of troops means that the two countries accept the offer of mediation of the boundary question by the United States, Brazil and Argentina According to a statement issued late today by the state department the cessation of warlike preparations by Peru and Ecuador was "not only the first and paramount condition of the offer of mediation, but evidently was the most important step essential to temoving the imminent danger of war."



TELEPHONE RATES AND THE UTILITIES ACT.

The Public Utilities Commission has completed or-ganization and has given notice to companies within its jurisdiction to file their rates and charges. In will be open to any person to object to these rates and have an inquiry instituted by the commission. Even and have an inquiry instituted by the commission. Even before the rates are filed, any person requested to pay them may appeal to the commission. We believe that the commission is now in a position to begin proceedings, and the question is sometimes asked why the Board of Trade does not at once proceed in the tele-

Mr. J. N. 



New York, June 3.—General demoralization and heavy liquidation were the features of today's stock market. Initial prices compared favorably with the previous day's close, but it soon became apparent that the leading stocks were receiving little support other than scattered buying to cover short contracts. This encouraged the bear element to make another vigorous drive at the market under which prices crumbled in a manner suggestive of some periods of panic. Losses ranged from 3 to 8 points in the active list, the heaviest perhaps being those in such stocks as Reading, St. Paul and U. P. The complete absence of support in these stocks carried an irresistible invitation to the bears who were not slow to improve their opportunity. In the present temper of the financial community such events as the introduction of further radical amendments to the pending railway bill, and announcement of heavy retrenchment policies by the leading roads do not conduce to a restoration of investment confidence. It is clear that if the railways are not permitted to advance rates there will be a wholesale curtailment of pending plans for additions and betterments and consequent damage to business. The wide decline which already occurred discounts much and many stocks are verging upon what ordinarily would be termed the bargain point. There is as yet, however, no evidence of a sustained investment temmand and until this appears in considerably larger volume the course of the market is likely to continue downward. Of course, the usual raillies rom time to time are to be expected.






