





The evidence of activity and cheer-fulliess in Wall street is in the nature of a prospect and too great hopes of largely increasing general business soon, should not be cherished. There has, without question, been improvement in the steel business and this may be expected to continue, but not by leaps and bounds. February is usually a month of some recession and if the advance in business operations is not steadily continued for a while, this is not an indication of reversal. The business of the country during the year should increase, but it would be remarkable if in that time full capacity was again attained.

The stock market has done remarkably well and is now in a state of orderly halt, awaiting the interstate commerce and supreme court decisions, as much as anything else. This is a case where the future cannot be forecasted, as no one can begin to guess the exact outcome.

The condition in money is not one, by any means, of absolute case; in fact, some firminess has developed. The Pank of England's rate was not reduced this week, as many expected and the attitude there indicates that the money outlooks calls for conservative action. If England expects, as it evidently does, greater activity in business here, it would not be surprising to see the rate maintained as at present for some time. This, after all, indicates a belief in our trade revival.


