AVAL SUBMARINE AT LARGE IN THE ATLANTIC

THE "U"-53 CALLS AT NEWPORT, PAYS COMPLIMENTARY VISIT TO U.S. OFFICER, **DEPARTS AND SINKS SIX STEAMSHIPS**

British and French, Acting in Concert, Drive Enemy Two-thirds of Mile in Heavy Fighting Italians Capture Important Mountain Peak Serbians Occupy New Bulgarian Positions, While Russians Continue Their Triumphant Advance Through Turkish Armenia — British Complete Capture of Le Sars and Take 500 Prisoners.

London, Oct. 8.—The British lines on the Somme front north and northeast of Courcelette have been considerably advanced, it was officially announced today.

A small part of the ground lost by the Germans in the recent fighting north of Lesboeufs, was regained by them last night in a counterattack. Otherwise, says the official statement, the British held their gains. They have taken more than 500 German prisoners.

The text follows:

The text follows:

"Yesterday evening the enemy counter-attacked our new positions north of Lesboeufs and recovered a small portion of their lost trenches. Elsewhere we secured our gains. The whole of Lesars is in our hands and more than 500 prisoners already are reported.

"North and northeast of Courcelette we considerably advanced our front. The enemy delivered an attack on the Schwaben redoubt but was completely repulsed.

"Successful raids were carried out during the night by Irish, Midland and Yorkshire troops in the Fauquissart, Givenchy and Loos ares."

RUSSIANS STILL DRIVING TURKS.

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Petrograd, Oct. 6, via London—In today's official statement by the war office no events of importance in Volhynia and Galacia are reported. The situation in Dobrudja also is reported as unchanged.

On the Caucasus front the repulse of a Turkish attack in the Ognott region is announced. The text follows:

"Western front: There has been no movement of importance.

"Caucasus front: In the direction of Ognott an attack by Turkish secouting detachments, supported by artillery, was successfully repulsed. Deserters who have been arriving lately in great numbers state that desertions among the Turkish troops, in the rear—have considerably increased with the beginning of the frosts. There were instances of the desertion of entire platoons.

"Dobrudja front: The situation is unchanged."

NIGHT WAS RATHER QUIET.

Paris, Oct. 8, 3.07 p. m.—Neither the French nor the Germans along the Somme front were active last night, which was raining and uneventful, according to the afternoon's war office bulletin, which reads:

"The night was rainy and without any important event on the Somme front. The enemy displayed little activity.

"Our aeroplanes have regulated the fire and corrected the range of many of our batteries in the Somme area. They fought several aerial engagements and have bombarded Moislains and Vaux Wood north of Peronne."

HUNS DRIVEN BACK 1,000 YARDS.

London, Oct. 7—The British forces made an advance of from 600 to 1,000 yards behind Gueudecourt and Lesboeufs on the Somme front to 1,000 yards benind gueuecourt and Lesboeurs on the Somme Front today, and captured the village of Lesars, on the Albert-Bapaume road, according to the official statement from general headquarters tonight. Paris, Oct. 7—An attack by the French, in conjunction with the British north of the Somme carried forward the Entente line about two-thirds of a mile, says the official statement issued by the war office tonight. The attack resulted in the capture of all objectives.

The text reads:

"North of the Somme our Infantry, in conjunction with the British, attacked from the front of Morval-Bouchavesnes, and brilliantly attained all its objectives. Our line was carried forward 1,000 metres northeast of Morval. It crowns the western slopes of the Salily-Salilisei ridge, the whole of the Bapaume road to about two hundred metres from the entrance to Salily and skirts the western and southwestern fringes of the St. Pierre-Vaast wood, whence it continues over Hill 130 to south of Bouchavesnes.

ROUMANIANS TAKE TRENCHES.

ITALIANS CAPTURE MOUNTAIN PEAKS.

ITALIANS CAPTURE MOUNTAIN PEAKS.
Rome, Oct. 7, via London—A mountain, 8,187 feet high, at the head of the Vanoi Cismon Valley, northwest of Trent, has been captured by Alpine troops attached to the Italian army, says the official statement given out today. An Austrian attack in the Upper Boite Valley, it is added, was checked by the machine gun and rifle fire of the Italians. The statement follows:

"On our offensive in the rough mountain region between the Avisio and Vanoi Cismon Valley resulted in further success yesterday, when at the head of the Vanoi Cismon Valley Alpine troops captured one of the stake of Cima Busa Alta, 2,456 metres (8,187 feet) high. The enemy, who was strongly entrenched, put up a stubborn resistance, but was virtually annihilated. Twenty survivors, including the commanding officer and some men were made prisoners.

"On the slopes of the Lesser Laga Suoi, in the Upper Boite Valley, enemy detachments attempted a surprise on our advanced lines. They were allowed to come within a short distance of the trenches, and were overwhelmed and scattered by concentrated machine gun fire. In the Travignolo Valley the enemy artillery yesterday continued to bombard our new positions without interfering with the work of consolidation. "On the remainder of the front there were the usual artillery actions. At Gorizia considerable damage was done to buildings, including a military hospital."

British Passenger and Freight Vessels Fall Prey to Underwater Craft Which Gives Sailers Scant Time to Take to Boats Before Opening Murderous Torpedo Fire on Non-Combatant Craft-A New Development of the German Underwater War - So Far as Known No Lives Have Been Lost.

STEAMER STEPHANO OF NEWFOUNDLAND LINE ONE OF THE VICTIMS OF THE HUN VISITOR

Boston, Oct. 8.—The submarine arm of the German navy ravaged shipping off the eastern coast of the United States today. Four British, one Dutch and one Norwegian steamers were sent to the bottom or left crippled derelicts off Nantucket Shoals.

Tonight, under the light of the hunter's moon, the destroyer flotilla of the United States Atlantic fleet was picking up passengers and crews of the destroyed vessels and bringing them into Newport, R. l. So far as known there was no loss of life, though at a late hour the crew of the British steamer Kingston had not been accounted for.

A submarine held up the American steamer Kansan, bound from New York for Genoa, with steel for the Italian government, but later on establishing her identity, allowed the American to proceed. The Kansan came into Boston harbor late tonight for her usual

The hostile submarine is believed to be the U-53, which paid a call to Newport yesterday and disappeared at sunset. Some naval men, however, declared that at least two submarines are operating close to the American shore, though outside the three-mile limit.

WHAT THE U-53 ACCOMPLISHED.

The record of submarine warring as brought to land by wireless despatches, follows:

The sensation created yesterday, when the U-53 quietly slipped into Newport harbor and as quietly slipped away, three hours later, was less than the shock in shipping circles when wireless repprits of submarine attacks began to come in to the radio stations just before noon today. Within a few minutes the air was literally charged with electricity, as wireless messages of warning shot up and down the coast.

The submarine or submarines had taken a position directly in the steamer lanes, where they could hardly miss anything bound in for New York, or bound east from that port.

Vessels of the Allied nations and neutral bottoms carrying contraband of war scurried to get within the three-mile limit of the American shore. Several who were following the outside courses shifted and made for the inside lane. The Stephano, of the Red Cross Line, however, was caught outside the neutral Zone.

The destruction of this vessel was perhaps the biggest prize of the day. The craft had been sold to the Russian government and would have been used as an ice breaker on her first trip. Throughout the day and up to late tonight none of the patrolling fleet maintained by the British and French to protect their own shipping appeals were sent to Halifax, but the commander of the British naval station there refused to divulge what steps were being taken to meet the submarine attack. The work of the patrolling fleets was directed from Halifax, and ever since the war began cruisers and auxiliary vessels of the British and French navies have moved up and down the coast line.

The passengers and crews of the destroyed vessels who are being brought into Newport were not expected to reach there until midnight.
