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King George's Army Takes Number of Strong Positions-Attacking Front About Twelve Miles Long-Canadians Capture Fresnoy-French Also Make Gains.

London, May 3—The British began another attack this morning. The war office announces that progress is being made. Some strong positions already have been captured by the British. The announcement follows: "Heavy fighting is taking place all along the front from the Hindenburg ine, south of the Zenze River, to the Acheville-Vimy road. Our troops are making progress and have already captured a number of strong hostili positions."

which the Germans continue to throw in. There was the usual preliminary tonado of fire from weapons of all cal-tibres and then the equally familiar creeping barrage working with abao-late punctuality as the order to the men to go forward was snapped forth simulifameously down miles of trenches. Thousands of crouching fig-ures formed into regular waves for the advance. Then came the inevit-able rattle of machine guns and rifle fire and the crashing of bursting bombs as the infantry reached the parapet of the first enemy trench. The British made progress in sev-eral directions-toward Freenoy and Cherisy, and also toward Builecourt, which is a point on the Hindenburg line. The new British attack takes in virtually the entire front on which the battle of Arras was begun on Easter Monday, and evidently is a major op-erating.
